## ALUMINUM FOR NATIONAL DEFENSE SHIPPED WED.

Aluminum which has been gathered in Terrell County to be used for national defense, was shipped to El Paso Wednesday with the hauling done by Jack Turner, gratis.

There were 219 pounds of the metal gathered at the Courthouse and other points throughout the county. The entire collection was gathered at the courthouse and was shipped as soon as instructions were received.

This aluminum will be shipped to centers and bailed for shipping to points where it can be smelted and used. Practically all of the work in regards to the metal is done without compensation on the part of the workers, and thanks are extended to Mr. Turner for hauling the shipment to El Paso without charge.

Judge R. S. Wilkinson, who was in charge of the collection in this county, stated that in the pile of aluminum could be found almost any type and kind of utensil. He wished to express his thanks for the response to the call that went out for the donation of the metal for national defense.

## E. BENAVIDES APPEAL DENIED

An appeal filed by lawyers of Emeliano Benavides, convicted of the murder of the Henry Calcote family near Eldorado in September of last year, was denied and the conviction affirmed and Benavides will be taken from Austin to Eldorado Saturday.

He will appear before Judge John Sutton Saturday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and will again be sentenced and the date set for his electrocution.

Benavides was captured here by Sheriff J. S. Nance September 20, and was held for Eldorado officers.

## Tax Collector Urges Early Return Social Security Forms

Austin—Some 54,000 Social Security blanks which must be used by all employers of the First International Revenue District of Texas for reporting taxable wages paid to one or more of their employees during July, August, and September, 1941, have just been released, according to Frank Schofield, Collector of this District.

"I wish I could say something through the medium of the press," Mr. Schofield stated, "that would cause each and every one of these 54,000 taxpayers to file returns on time. The completed returns must reach my office on or before October 31, 1941. Returns received after that date are late, and the law provides that penalties and interest must be added."

"Congress has found it necessary in order to finance the supreme defense of this great democratic nation of ours to impose certain new taxes and to increase the rates of certain other taxes already in effect. The Social Security tax rate of 1% for the employer or a total of 2% of the wage has not been increased. However, not many of us have or are going to have surplus funds to any great extent for the next few years, and I am sure every business man stopping to think will realize the penalties and interest added to his present taxes because of late filing will only make his tax burden heavier. This is one added burden that can be avoided; however, taxpayer must realize that we have no alternative—the law provides that penalties and interest must be assessed when a return is late."

"I, therefore, solicit the cooperation of every such taxpayer of this District and wish to urge that he file his return as promptly as possible after receipt of Form SS-1a; by all means that he mark his calendar as a reminder that the complete return and tax remittance must be mailed in time to reach my office not later than Oct. 31, 1941."

## CAUTION URGED OF MOTORISTS TOURING STATE

Austin—The Texas Highway Department today appealed to motorists driving throughout the state to be more careful when approaching or passing along sections where highway repairs or construction is underway in an effort to halt a rising toll of serious injuries to flagmen and other highway workers.

Recently an increasing number of flagmen and workers have been struck and severely injured, and in one case a flagman was killed. With the approach of winter, wet weather and the season when driving conditions are more hazardous, extra caution should be used to prevent even more such accidents, it was emphasized.

Flagmen used in connection with work on state highways are there for a dual purpose. They are stationed to protect the workmen and the state's property, as well as to protect the traveling public against injury, personal property damage, or both. Despite the Department's efforts along this line, many motorists continue to disregard warning signs well ahead of the work, and the flagman also if highways were closed and traffic detoured when repairs or construction is underway it would mean many additional miles of driving and added expense to motorists.

Recent unnecessary accidents of this type caused: The death of a flagman on a highway near San Antonio who was struck as he ran to the shoulder in an attempt to avoid the car. Severe injuries to a flagman in West Texas placed to warn motorists of high flood water running across the road from mountains. Injuries to a flagman stationed to safely direct traffic around a crew patching only one side of a highway. Serious injuries to a flagman on a concrete highway near Houston warning motorists of a center-stripping truck and machine ahead, which was clearly visible and had two flasher warning lights in operation.

## CHARLES F. STAVLEY SUCCUMBS TO HEART ATTACK MON. NIGHT

Charles F. Stavley, 68, succumbed to a heart attack Monday night at ten o'clock at his home in Sanderson. He had been ill for almost a year suffering with heart trouble.

Funeral services were conducted from the Baptist Church Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock with the Rev. J. Y. Bowman in charge. Interment was in the Cedar Grove Cemetery and arrangements were in charge of the Joe Oberkamp Funeral Directors.

Pallbearers were: Alfred E. Creigh Jr., J. D. Nichols, J. S. Nance, Roy Haley, John Whistler, and D. L. Duke.

Mr. Stavley was born July 12, 1873, in Travis County and lived there until he was 15 years of age when he moved to Val Verde County and accepted work with T. A. Wilson. During the time he was employed by Mr. Wilson, he, with B. E. Wilson, went to Galveston to attend school and was there during the flood of 1900 which washed their school away.

On May 25, 1907, he was united in marriage to Miss Lena Schraffl at Juno where for some time he operated a stage stand where the stage stopped for fresh horses. Later he purchased the general mercantile business operated by Mr. Schraffl at Juno which he operated until 1926 when he sold his business and entered the ranching business, buying his present ranch holdings 20 miles north-east of Dryden. In 1938 he moved to Sanderson with his family and in 1940 was elected constable of Precinct 1. He was active in that office until his health would not permit further work, although he retained the office until his death.

Besides his widow, survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Francis Mansfield of Sanderson, Mrs. Roy Mason and Mrs. Joe Chandler, both of Dryden; four sons, Howard Stavley of Brawley, California; W. E. Ross and Frank Stavley, all of Sanderson, and 9 grandchildren. All were present for the funeral services.

He was a member of the Woodmen of the World with membership in the Del Rio Lodge.

to the other fine rains of mid-September, has put the ranges into good shape for the fall season. Prospects are the best just now.

The Eden Echo—Eden was apparently about the center of a heavy rain belt last night, as meager and early reports from nearby communities told of only light showers or of no rain at all. From one and one-half to two inches, estimated, fell here from late evening to around ten o'clock. Live Oak and south had no rain to report at eight, and only a few miles north there was merely a light sprinkle. Northwest and to the southeast however, the rain was apparently of comparable proportions to the fall here.

The Grand Falls Gazette — A veritable "nest" of meteor craters has been uncovered by the University of Texas geologists near Odessa, as field crews have discovered a second and third pit near crater No. 1, now being explored.

Largest of the two newly-found craters contains as many as six or seven thousand meteorites with a total weight of about six tons. Dr. F. H. Sellards, director of the university's bureau of economic geology, estimated.

## WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

The Fort Stockton Pioneer—Rains totaling 125 inches were recorded in Fort Stockton Tuesday afternoon and night, sending the September total to 5.15 and making the first 9-months of 1941 the wettest in the last 60 years.

Already, with 25.59 inches, 1941 stands as the wettest year of the 20th century, and three months remain. The fall for the first three-fourths of 1941 is within 2 inches of the 1895 total when 27.70 was received, and if weather continues similarly through the three remaining months there is every chance of passing the record fall of 1880, 33.76 inches.

Several parts of Pecos County had a much heavier rainfall than Fort Stockton. Webb Farms has received over 30 inches, and the J. M. Luckey ranch is nearing 40 inches.

The Live Stock News — The Van Horn Advocate states that Van Horn will soon have a new kind of manufacturing plant located there. Cosmetics will be

made from cactus and the plant will employ about 15 people at first.

A DIRE NEED  
The "Stunt Night" program put on by the various classes of the school and by members of several other organizations of the town, was a very enjoyable feature. And it would have been more so, if a patron could have heard distinctly the talking parts, which would have enabled one to better understand the action.

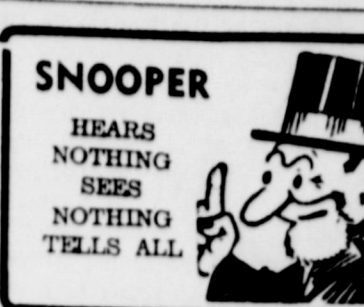

## HOMEMAKERS SHOULD:

Take good care of aluminum cooking utensils, no more aluminum cooking utensils will be made for home use until all the needs of National Defense have been filled. Here are four important things to do to make your present aluminum utensils last as long as possible:

How to clean aluminum properly, prolong its life:

Wash the utensil in hot, soapy water.

Rub with steel wool and soap. Rinse with clear water.

Dry the utensil thoroughly.

Caution! Never use soda, lye, ashes, ammonia, or any washing compound containing a strong alkali. These discolor and injure pure aluminum.

If a utensil becomes discolored through boiling water or foods containing iron or alkali, you can remove this surface stain by boiling a solution of 2 tablespoons vinegar to 1 quart of water in the utensil for a few minutes. Neither the stain nor its removal in this manner is in

any way harmful.

Warping or bulges in the bottom of a utensil may appear if too much heat has been used. To straighten such a utensil, place a wooden block over the bulge and hammer back in shape, or use a wooden mallet.

If handles or knobs become loose or break, new parts for repairing the utensil can usually be purchased in stores.
