Increase in Old MIARD BABB Age Pension Is Sought By Connally

WASHINGTON, D. C., Senator Tom Connally today introduced in the Senate a bill which would double the federal contribution toward Texas old age pension payments. This bill is in line with President Roosevelt's recent proposal to vary federal pension grants according to the per capita income of the States rather than on a fifty-fifty basis. This will enable the poorer states to receive proportionately a larger share of federal funds than that received by the richer states Under the present act the



> While the amendment to the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940 recently adopted by Congress precludes induction of men who were 28 years of age or older on July 1, 1941, these registrants must still live up to the obligations imposed upon them by the Act, General Page said. They must keep their registration certificates with them at all times, and keep their local boards advised of any change of address.

> Although registrants who were 28 years of age or older on July 1, 1941, must fill out questionaires. General Page explained when it become evident that they are deferred because of age, they will be placed in the proper deferred classification by their local boards.

It is intended,, he said, that hereafter registrants who are deferred by reason of age will continue to be classified in the same! manner as other registrants, except that they will be given no cept that those of such registrants who are being classified for the first time and who are not classified in Class I-C, Class Deaton and second high score IV, Class III, or Class II will be placed in Class I-H. A Fabens fumble in the second led to the first Sanderson score, the 20-yard pass from Staveley to Cochran. This pass was significant especially in the fact that it was the Eagles' sole complete toss. After an exchange of punts, Fabens began to feel out the Sanderson line and in a series of plays, carried the ball from their own twenty to the Eagles' thirtyfive. Again the power faded and Sanderson stopped the play as the half ended.

Sanderson began the second half with a kick to Fabens, and the Cats again showed life only to lose the ball by a fumble. The Eagles then began to pulverize the opposing line with smashes that culminated in the second score from the 17-yard line. -0-They were also used as beasts of burden through the Big Bend Country when a detachment followed the old Comanche Trail through the country to Old Mexico. On this trip one of the animals was bitten by a rattler and as a result died. The detachment returned by way of Fort Stockton, history tells us. Camels also were used when a new trail to California was sought. A few of the older camels were turned loose in California, and roamed at will until death rereleased them from Army duty

-0-The book records but one effort to use the camels in war against Indian raiders. A commanding officer entered a complaint that the presence of the animals frightened the horses which became almost unmanageable when it came to marching against the enemy.

At that early date slaves were being shipped into this country by the boat load. It became popular to ship in a cargo of slaves and bill them as camels. A shipload of camels were actally brought over by tradespeople not commissioned by the government. One such load not having a ready buyer at hand. was turned loose to run at leisure on the prairies near the coast. In time they became so numerous, ranchmen considered them a nuisance and a determent to the grazing of cattle, so they instructed the cowboys to rope and kill them to free the range of their presence.

Some of the causes of fire are: People being careless where they throw matches. Not using ash trays as they should be used, instead of putting the lighted match or cigarette in the tray it is sometimes put on the floor. Rats chew on matches and cause a flame to start, or a rat's nest built by a chimney sometimes catches on fire. Oil rags that are used in the homes to oil furniture with is sometimes thrown in a closet, and they smolder and burst into flames. Coal and coal dust become heated and ignite if not properly stored. Old shingle roofs catch on fire easily. Defective chimneys cause many disasters. Stoves that are placed near a curtain often cause fire It should be kept in the middle of the room. 
