WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

Ward County News—Voters of Precinct No. 1, which includes Barstow, voted in a special election last Saturday for the prohibition of the sale of beer not exceeding four per cent by weight. The unofficial count was 79 to 32 in favor of the prohibition.

As Saturday's election called for prohibiting the sale of beer not exceeding four percent, there remained a question in the minds of some as to the status of beer not exceeding that percentage. It was generally believed however, that the sale of beer would henceforth be illegal.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—With a low bid announced on the remaining 18.3 miles of Highway 285 northwest of Fort Stockton in Pecos county, and a work order received for laying of base and topping of 5.6 miles of Highway 67 in the west part of the county, a busy winter is in prospect for the highway staff here, and for the workmen.

Low bidder on the Highway 285 (Pecos road) project last week in Austin was Cage Brothers and F. M. Reeves & Son, Bishop contractors who once held a paving contract in Pecos county when No. 290 was being built.

McCamey News—At a meeting of the Commissioners' Courts of Pecos and Upton counties, held in Rankin last Monday, an agreement was made to repair the highway and bridge crossing on the Pecos River, ten miles south of McCamey, in Crockett county. The highway and the bridge have been impassable since early September, this year, when the Pecos River overflowed out of its banks due to heavy rains, which has just recently receded within its banks, making it possible for road repairs.

Marfa Big Bend Sentinel—An appeal was made this week by F. G. Catron, Inspector in Charge U. S. Border Patrol, for a better understanding by the general public of the work being done by his men who are stopping automobiles on highways near here and asking questions of the occupants.

Mr. Catron explains that orders have been received which require the men of his service to make a complete check of vehicular traffic, questioning travelers whether local or transient as to their citizenship status.

Uvalde Leader-News—Establishment of one of the largest colonization projects ever planned for this part of the state appeared assured this week with the announcement that an option had been taken by the War Veterans Relief Association of Dallas on approximately 3,000 acres of the Lane Taylor ranch, known locally as the Pecan Plantation property, and plans are now under way on preliminary details in connection with the proposed project.

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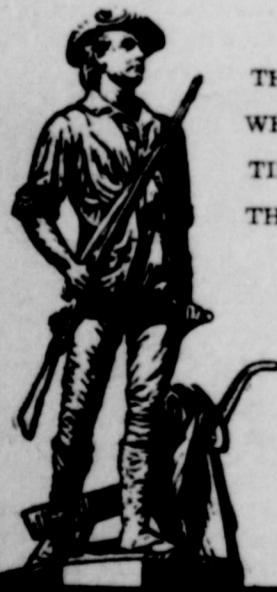

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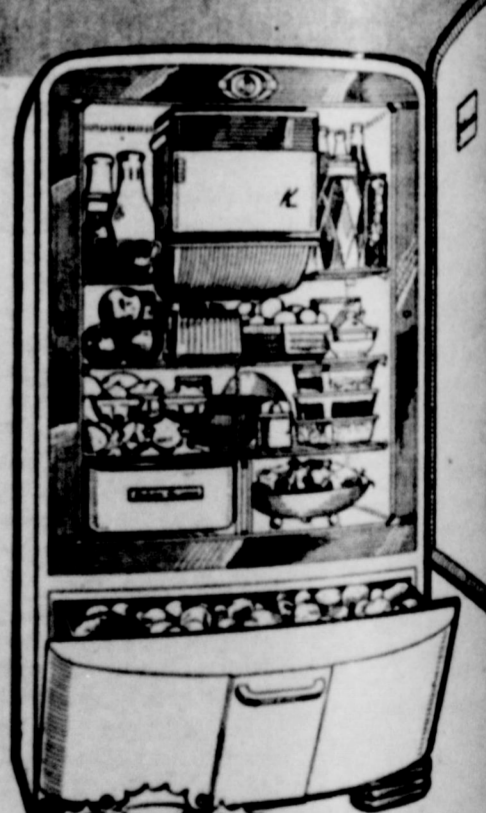

Austin-Bascom Giles, commissioner of the General Land Office, today announced a statewide sale of approximately 200,000 acres of surveyed school lands for April 7, 1942, by the School Land Board of which he is chairman. Governor Coke R. Stevenson and Attorney General Gerald C. Mann, members of the board, had concurred with Commissioner Giles in the advisability of a sale at this time.

The land is located in more than half of the counties of the state, and will be purchased for one-fifth down payment and forty years to pay the remaining four-fifths.

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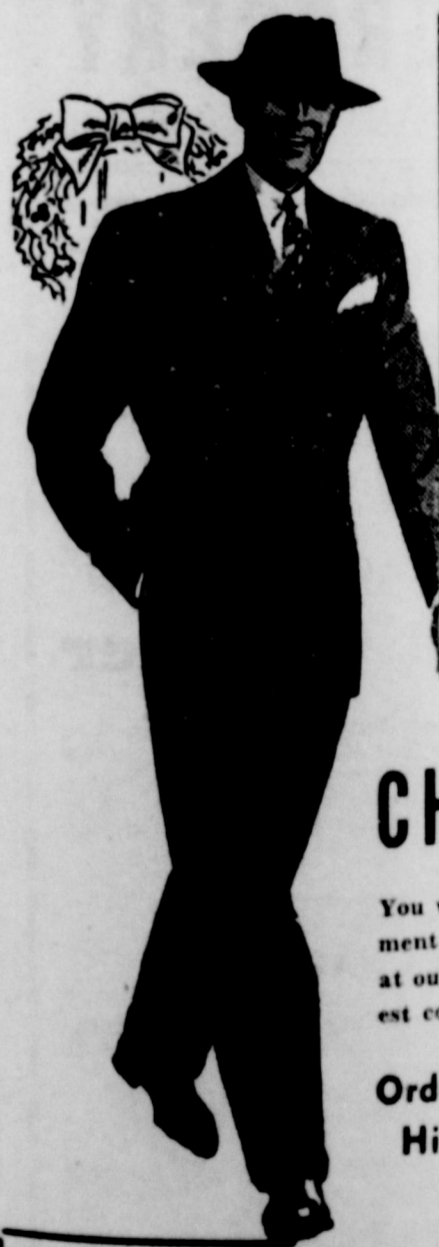
