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TERRELL COUNTY DEFENSE COMMITTEES ARE ANNOUNCED

Judge R. S. Wilkinson, County defense coordinator, designated by Governor Coke Stevenson, has announced that the following committees have been named to aid in the defense of life and property in Terrell County in case of an emergency:

Defense Council—T. R. Kuykendall, chairman; Clyde Griffith and R. B. Farley.
Air Raid Warden—Sheriff J. S. Nance.
Fire Control—Fire Chief Wallace Henshaw.
Emergency Medical Care—Dr. William Aston.
Local Tire Rationing Board—J. M. Hayre, chairman; C. B. Cochran and W. C. Vaughan.

In the present emergency, the following steps are indicated for the protection of life and property in Texas, and according to Gov. Stevenson, should be taken in order:
1. Industrial and public works protection by private guards;
2. Protection by local police authorities;
3. If local police are unable to handle an emergency situation, the State Police will assist;

4. If all police protection proves inadequate, the Governor will order out the Texas Defense Guard;
5. If State forces require assistance, the United States Army will take over.
It is incumbent upon all business establishments, organizations, individuals, county governments and municipalities to provide for their own defense and protection as far as possible.

When the emergency becomes so great that the State Police are needed, they can be relied upon to move in quickly and render effective service.
In case of major catastrophe, or the threat thereof, the officers and men of the Texas Defense Guard will be found quite able to give adequate reinforcement to the State Police force.
If the situation is so serious that State and local forces combined prove inadequate, the Governor will call upon the United States Army for assistance.
Co-operation of the Veterans' organization is essential as these men are trained in discipline and action under fire and can doubtless be of great assistance.
As progress is made in the organization and details are worked out citizens of Terrell will be kept informed and instructions will be given as to what procedure they can follow to be of the most help in the work.

School Fire Drills May Turn to Air Raid Drills Now

The local school authorities are following the instructions of the U. S. Office of Civilian Defense in preparation for the remote danger of possible air raid. Although no actual danger is anticipated in this locality, the safe thing is to be prepared. The instruction given to teachers and pupils are for the fire drills to be turned into an air raid drill. Pupils and teachers are required to report to an air raid refuge, usually an inner corridor of the building which has more than one exit. No one is permitted to leave the building during an air raid alarm. Parents are requested not to go to school building or telephone.
The country is suddenly and unexpectedly in war and every effort should be made to organize and win by furnishing security and defense at home, according to the U. S. Office of Civilian Defense.

Local Schools Attempt to Offer Courses for the Times

The Sanderson Public Schools, in attempting to offer courses of instructions in keeping with the times, will offer instruction in some new work beginning with the next semester, January 19. Most of this work will be for boys, although some will be open to girls.

The Navy Department of the United States recommends that the public high schools offer courses in the following: Morse code, elementary telephone communication, elements of radio communication, elementary principles of radio, plane trigonometry, solid geometry, quadratics, physics, chemistry, shop mathematics, vocational training in machine shop work and internal combustion engines, and elementary navigation.

The Sanderson High School has offered instruction in solid geometry, quadratics, physics, chemistry, shop work, internal combustion engines, and wood work, model airplanes and numerous other courses in the past.
Some of this work was for high school credit and some was for club activities. Beginning next semester club credit will be offered in the Morse code, elementary principles of the radio, aviation, shop mathematics and internal combustion engines. A course in first aid will also be offered. Probably a course in photography will be made available.

School for National Defense Instruction To Be Held Jan. 12

Local law enforcement officers of Sanderson and vicinity will be given special national defense instruction which will qualify them to organize and train local Civilian Volunteer Auxiliary police, at a special school of instruction conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, to be held in Del Rio, on January 12, according to an announcement today by M. W. Acers, Special Agent in Charge of the San Antonio FBI District Office.

The six-day intensive instruction course, to be conducted by F. B. I. Special Agent J. C. Kennedy, is based on elaborate studies made by the FBI in England and other warring countries, and includes instruction and demonstration in a wide range of civilian defense police subjects, ranging from traffic problems to blackout enforcement.

"When local officers have taken this special schooling, they will be qualified to set up the civilian auxiliary police organizations, and train them, as called for in every community under the Civilian Defense program," said Mr. Acers. "The mayors, county judges, and the local defense councils are urged to see that local officers from their local communities attend one of these FBI schools and receive this instruction."

In addition to the school at Del Rio, other FBI schools will be held in Laredo and Austin on January 12 and Harlingen and Waco on January 19.

Those eligible to attend include sheriffs and deputies, police utility, railway express, and pullman company law enforcement agencies, and law enforcement officers of banks in the Federal Reserve or Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation systems.

Local School On Southern Association List

The Sanderson High School has recently received its new membership certificate from the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This certificate states that the school is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for the scholastic year 1941-42, and is entitled to all the privileges and scholastic recognition resulting therefrom.

A school must apply for membership in the Southern Association each fall and file an extensive report covering all the work of the school, the financial resources, and the qualifications of the teachers and pupils. The application for membership is examined and considered by the Commission in their annual meeting in December and the school which has applied for membership is notified in December or January.

The Sanderson High School has been a member of the Association for ten years. Only about 250 high schools in Texas are able to meet the standards required for membership.

1941 Sanderson Rain Totals 25.80 Inches; Heat Soars to 99

1942 has three snowfalls to go to catch up with 1941, but the new year has already broken the last year's temperature records. Total rainfall for 1941 was 25.80 inches with May leading the months with a 5.05 inch drenching.

Maximum temperature occurred in August when 99 degrees were registered on the 18 and the 20. Minimum temperature drop came on January 20 with a recording of 25 degrees.

The December records show precipitation of 58 inches on the first, 32 on the seventh, 92 on the tenth, 06 on the twelfth, and 02 on the twentieth, for a total of 1.84 inches. Maximum temperature was recorded on the fourth with 77 degrees; minimum temperature was found on the 26th with 27 degrees.

Funeral Services For World War Veteran Held Here Dec. 31

Funeral services for Charles R. Stevenson, 52, were held Wednesday, Dec. 31, at the Cedar Grove cemetery with the Rev. Sam Bays in charge. The Joe Oberkamp Funeral directors were in charge of arrangements.

Stevenson died from a heart attack at the Mike Couch farm on the Pecos River Sunday, December 28, and was brought to Sanderson where the body was kept until Wednesday during which time efforts were being made to locate relatives or friends. Papers carried by Stevenson showed that he was a veteran of the first World War. Stevenson had been befriended by Mr. Couch who last summer gave the man permission to fish on his place on the Pecos. Stevenson made himself useful about the place, caught enough fish to make his stay worthwhile and vowed he wanted to remain on the place the rest of his life.

A few months ago, Stevenson suffered an attack of kidney stones and being a World War veteran was entitled to treatment in a veteran's hospital. Mr. Couch gave him money enough to get him to the hospital and he underwent an operation and after his recovery returned. He became suddenly ill Sunday and the farm caretaker went to a neighbor's to call for a doctor, but by the time he returned to the house, Stevenson was dead. Dr. H. B. Tandy and Mr. Couch, of Ozona, went to the farm, but found the man dead.

Efforts to Complete Inventory of Trucks Is Being Made Here

The attention of truck, bus, and trailer owners has been again called to the inventory being made of all such vehicles with a minimum capacity of 3,000 pounds, and an urgent appeal made to all who have not yet answered questionnaires to do so at once.

In a letter to Judge R. S. Wilkinson from Governor Coke Stevenson, it is pointed out that many owners of trucks have not yet obtained the questionnaires and many others who have received them have failed to answer them and return them to the War Department, 1222 West Commerce Street, San Antonio. The inventory is being made for possible use of the vehicles in the War emergency.

The letter from Governor Stevenson says in part:

"In behalf of the National Defense Committee for Texas and in collaboration with these other agencies, I wish to urge that you issue public statements in your respective jurisdiction urging the owners of all such vehicles to write the War Department, 1222 West Commerce St., San Antonio, Texas, for questionnaires. Such communications to the War Department should give the owners' exact mailing address and the license numbers of vehicles.

"Those owners who have already received questionnaires but have not filled them out should do so immediately and mail them to the above address in the penalty envelopes which have been provided.

"Station Wagons are NOT to be registered for this purpose."

Nothing was saved, it was reported, the loss covering many priceless relics gathered over a period of years in the park area. Origin of the fire is unknown, it was said. There had been no fire in the building for some 24 hours before the fire was discovered by a watchman about 3 a. m.

Eagle Pass Guide—Eagle Pass has been awarded a Pre-Employment Defense School for training out-of-school boys between the ages of 17 to 25 in Auto Mechanics Metal Work (Acetylene and Electric Welding), Wood Construction, and Electricity, Mr. Clyde Miller, Vocational teacher of Eagle Pass High School announces.

Each of the four courses will be for 10 weeks each. The first course, in Auto Mechanics, will start Monday, January 5.

Uvalde Leader—News—Mr. and Mrs. B. K. Franklin are one family that will not have to worry about the meat problems any time this winter. A few days ago Mr. and Mrs. Franklin went out hunting and Ben killed a 20-point buck. It was one of the largest heads that we have

seen in years. Ben says the buck was at least eight or nine years old. Mrs. Franklin a short time later killed a 10-point buck which was a larger deer than the one her husband had killed.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—Clyde Smith, director of the Hamlin high school band for the last year and a half, has been elected director of the Fort Stockton High School band and is expected to assume his new duties with resumption of school here Jan. 5.

Big Bend Sentinel—A registry of horsepower, both the type with cylinders and of the equine variety, was made Friday afternoon when sixty to seventy-five Highland section residents, and some from beyond, met in Marfa to discuss the formation of a cavalry unit for border defense work which might be assigned.

Ozona Stockman—The year 1941 was not a remarkable year in many ways, not the least of which was the rain record it piled up in Crockett County.

The twelve months of the year just closed brought an all-time record rainfall to Crockett County—and perhaps to a number of other West Texas Counties.

During the year, records at the Joe Oberkampf gauge showed a total of 38.08 inches of moisture fell in Ozona. This total, although the fall varied at times over the county, is just about the average over all parts of Crockett County during the year, with some sections perhaps receiving less and others more.

Facts About Your Income Tax Return

Who must file a return?
Every single person having a gross income of \$750 or more; every married person, not living with husband or wife, and having a gross income of \$750 or more; and married persons living with husband or wife, who have an aggregate gross income of \$1,500 or more.

When must returns be filed?
For the calendar year 1941, on or before March 16, 1942. For the fiscal year, on or before the 15th day of the third month following the close of the fiscal year.

Where and with whom must income tax returns be filed?
In the internal revenue district in which the person lives or has lived or has his chief place of business, and with the collector of internal revenue.

How does one make out his income tax return?
By following the detailed instructions given on the income tax blanks, Form 1040 and Form 1040A (optional simplified form.)

What is the tax rate?
A normal tax of 4 percent on the amount of the net income in excess of the allowable credits against net income (personal exemption, credits for dependents, interest on obligations of the United States and its instrumentalities and earned income credit) in the computation of the normal tax net income; and a graduated surtax on the amount of net income in excess of the allowable credits (personal exemption and credit for dependents) against net income in the computation of the surtax net income.

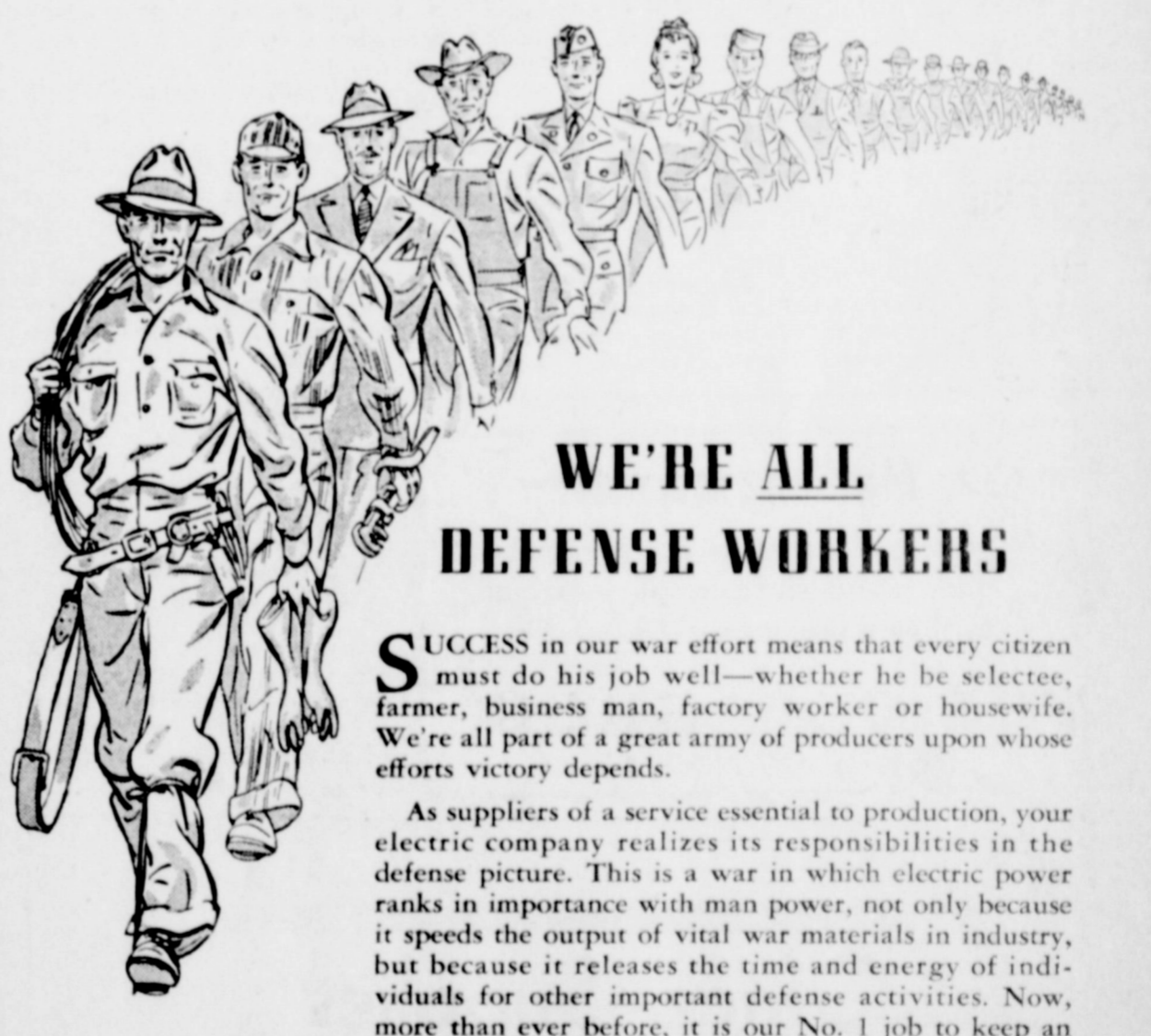

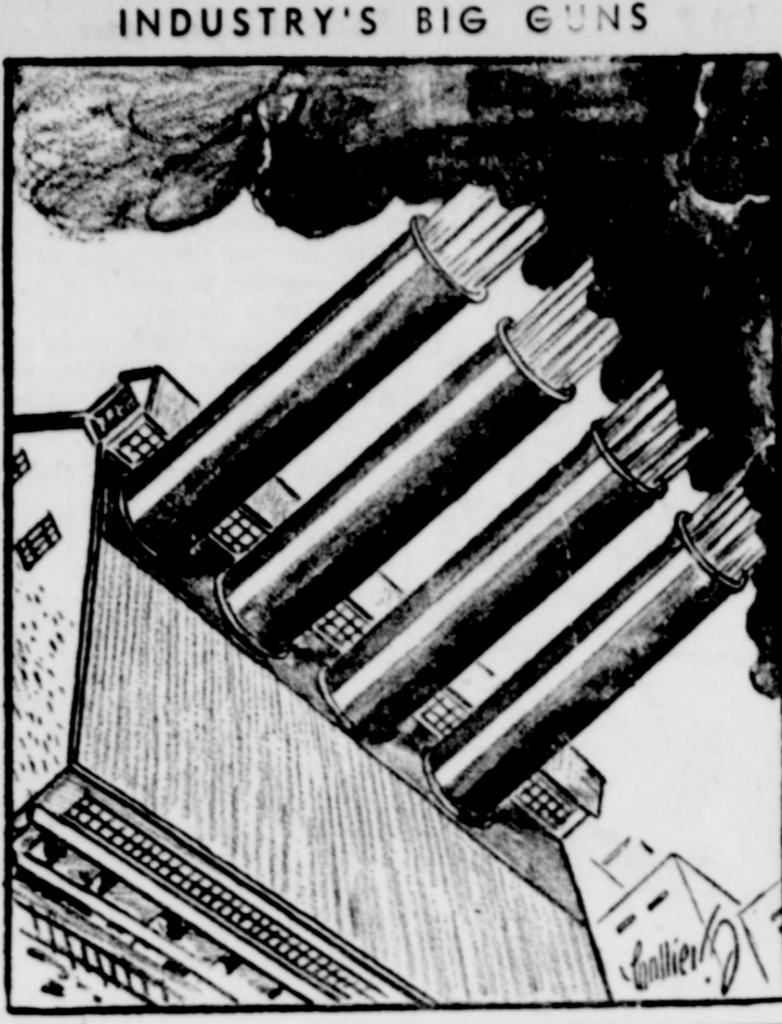

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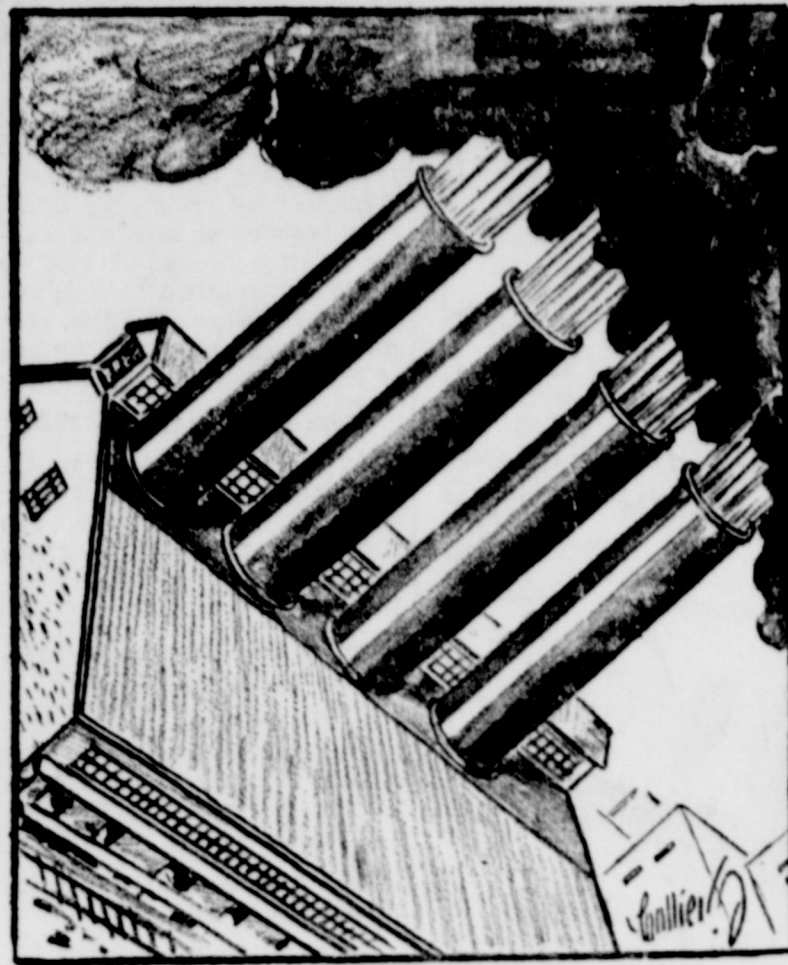
