WEST-TEX FIREMEN TO MEET IN DEL RIO **JANUARY 27**

Austin - The responsibilities of local firemen in national defense organization and the importance of an intensive fire program during war-time will be thoroughly discussed at a regional meeting of fire chiefs and fire marshals in Del Rio. Tuesday, January 27.

Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner and Fire Defense Coordinator of the National Defense Committee for Texas. today in announcing the meeting, said mayors and other city officials have also been invited to attend.

The meeting in Del Rio will cover fire defense district 16, including all towns and cities in Terrell, Valverde, Edwards, Real, Kinney and Uvalde counties.

Colorful Antelope, Formerly Rare, Staging Come-Back

The Texas Antelope, almost extinct a little over a decade ago, is staging one of the most remarkable come-backs in history, a recent survey made in the West-of-the-Pecos country re-

It was only 20 years ago or less when only one or two small bands of these beautiful, fleetfooted little animals roamed the broad Alpine valley and there were a few more small scattered bunches in other parts of the

Now one can drive a few miles out of Alpine, particularly east

In Hudspeth and Culberson

counties the most remarkable increase, probably, has been noted, according to Dr. Lee W. Fisher, game manager for this district. In a recent survey made in Culberson county an estimated total of 700 to 800 was counted, while on the large holdings of the Hueco Cattle Co., in Hudspeth county, consisting of some 800 sections, there are an estimated 1500 head roaming the hills and the ranchmen are calling on the State Game department for relief.

Extensive trapping and transplanting of the antelope has been carried out by the game department the past few years and ranges in the overstocked counties of Brewster, Presidio, Hudspeth and Culberson have been relieved.

Thrive in New Homes And the little animals are

thriving in their new homes to an almost unbelievable degree, Dr. Fisher reports, with an increase of as high as 100 percent. in one year noted. A 40 percent. gain in one year is common, Dr. Fisher says.

A trapping campaign started last November has yielded a total of over 450 in Brewster and Presidio counties, with 91 having been taken from the Kimball & Son ranch a few miles north of Alpine, the remainder coming from the Fischer, Mitchell and Bunton ranches in Presidio county. The game department will take from 200 to 300 more out of this area during the present trapping campaign.

PRIORITY RATINGS NOT NECESSARY FOR RANCHMEN

During the 26th Annual Convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, held in Del Rio, December 11, 12, 13, officers of the Association were requested to investigate the need of priority ratings for ranchmen. This has been done and the following information has been

According to B. F. Vance, State Chairman of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Defense Board, ranchmen do not need priority ratings to buy essential ranch equipment such as that ordinarily sold by local or available dealers. These local dealers should have a priority rating on such materials especially if they are finding it difficult to receive delivery on these goods. Such priority ratings are issued upon application to the Office of Production Management, Washington, D. C. Ranchmen needing heavy equipment however, such as a drag line track-type tractor, and similar materials not ordinarily held in stock by local dealers, must have a priority rating for this kind of machinery. These ratings are also issued by the Office of Production Management, and should be made on the OPM Priorities Division application blank known as P-D-1.
