The board submitted the letter to the Times with the belief that it will be of interest to Billy's many friends here in Sanderson. The text of the letter follows:

"Terrell Co. Selective Service Board

Sanderson, Texas Dear Friends.

"This is just a short note to let you know that I am quite well pleased with my new location here in the army.

"I have been stationed here at the Midland Army Flying School for about three weeks. This particular field is a bombadier school primarily, as well as a ferry command station.

"We have several hundred bombadier students here at a time, but each group stays a comparatively short period. Their work is divided into two phases: (1) several weeks of ground training, followed by (2) several weeks of actual practice. At present, the first group have just started their actual practice, while the second class to attend school here are just entering upon their ground train-

"I wish each of you would see the tremendous bombers and powerful fighting planes which land on this field. Within a few days time, a person can see most every type of combat plane which is in production in the United States today.

Before the stamps of the War person for whom it was issued must sign it as indicated in the book. The name of a person under 18 years of age may be signed either by himself, by his father, mother, or guardian.

For future reference, make and keep a record of the serial number of your book and the number of your issuing Ration Board as indicated in your book.

Your first War Ration Book will be issued to you containing twenty-eight Ration Stamps. Other books may be issued at later dates, and the following instructions will apply to your first book and to any later books unless otherwise ordered by the Office of Price Administration. Instructions received from the Texas Rationing Headquarters at Austin informed them that the Ration Books were to be turned over to the chairman of the local County Rationing Board as he had been designated as County Custodian and he in turn transwho is County School Superinchairman of the local Rationing Board, will also assist in the distribution of the booklets to the different places of registration. They are authorized to call upon the local sheriff's department or other persons eligible for tires for voluntary aid in the distribution of the books. The County Custodian is also required to keep in the central office in the county at least 5% of the supplies to be used in furnishing the school districts supplies needed during the actual reg-

istration. The registration will be held in Sanderson at the American Ward and the Mexican Ward Schools and will be conducted by teachers of those schools. Persons who desire may also register at the Dryden School or at the Independence School. No other places will be maintained for registration and all persons in the county are urged to register at one of the above mentioned schools when the date is announced. It was also pointed out that the Ration Books are not sugar rationing booklets. lets and may in the future be used for any number of things, such as hostery, radios, bicycles, etc. To further stress the importance of registering, it was stated that without the booklets, persons would not be able to secure other articles than sugar which may be rationed at a later date.

To prevent this unfortunate state of affairs the instructions suggested that all persons who have on hand more than two pounds of sugar per each person should return it to their grocery who would refund the done stamps will be torn from the book representing the amount of sugar on hand above the allowable two pounds per mount of sugar on hand may

Registrants are advised to take especially good care of their Ration Books as they have the same value as United States currency, according to the Washington Office of Rationing. The books should be kept in a safe place and no stamp should be removed from the booklet except in the presence of the retailer, his employee, or person authorized by him to make delivery. If stamps are detached from the booklet contrary to these regulations the stamp will be void. Punishments ranging as high as ten years imprisonthe law pertaining to the Ration Book.

## H. E. Girls Learn Of Clothes Budgeting

When a girl chooses her wardrobe she must think of all the things she has on hand that she can wear and that can be made over. She wants to know what accessories she has to wear with each dress. 
