CHISOS MOUNTAINS CCC DISBANDED FOR DURATION

Alpine Avalanche — The CCC camp in the Chisos mountains, Big Bend National park area, has been ordered abandoned, it was learned here this week, effective Feb. 22.

Practically all the CCC camps in the state engaged in "non-essential" programs are being discontinued, with one or two exceptions, it was stated, and the personnel is to be converted into army labor battalions, "for the duration."

OZONA METHODIST CHURCH DESTROYED BY FIRE

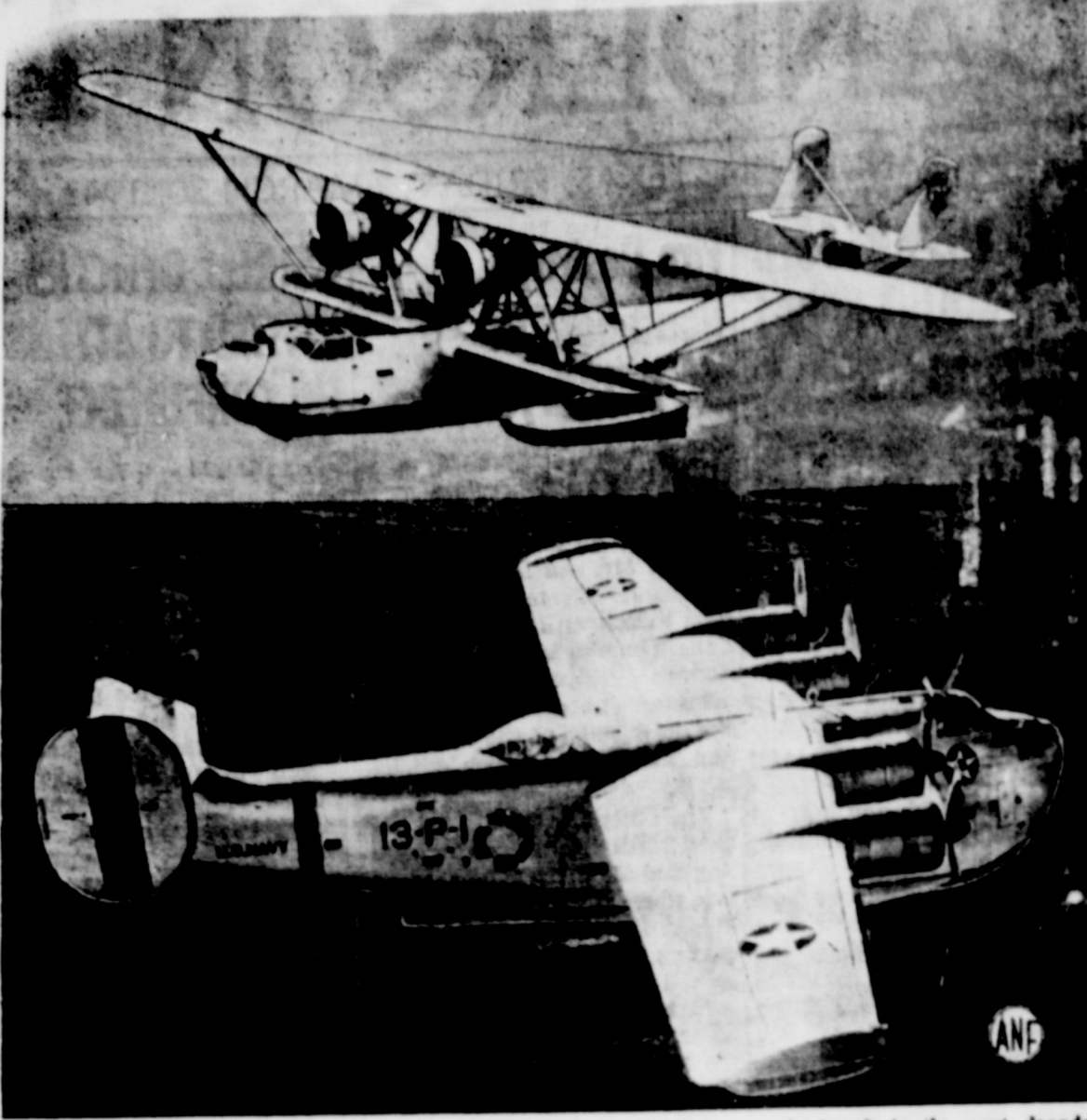
Ozona Stockman—Fire blackened walls, with gaping openings where once had been its beautiful stained glass windows was all that remained of the \$50,000 Ozona Methodist Church after flames had ravaged its interior early Sunday night in one of the most spectacular fires Ozonans have seen in more than a decade.

The blaze, discovered shortly before 9 o'clock Sunday night, was fought desperately by Fire Chief Joe North and his crew and volunteer helpers, but had gained such headway that all efforts to bring it under control failed.

1933 — THEN AND NOW — 1942



Many and startling have been the advances made in American naval aircraft in the past decade. These photographs, from the Aviation News Committee, present pictorial proof of those advances. The ship in the upper photo is a Consolidated P2Y-1 of 1933, a flying boat which amazed the world by its long-range flights for the U. S. Navy, including a mass hop from San Francisco to Pearl Harbor. Contrast it with the serial battleship in the lower photo—the Consolidated PB2Y-2—the Navy's newest patrol bomber powered by four Pratt & Whitney engines. Note the numerous external braces, exposed engines and floats of the 1933 patrol bomber, as compared with the sleek, streamlined exterior of the aerial giant which is serving as the "eyes" of our fighting fleet in 1942.

eau will be brought to the group by Acers, who will talk on Alien Enemy Control, Handling of Alien Property, Control of Travel by Aliens, Selective Service Act, Espionage and Sabotage. His talk will begin at 2:15 P. M., lasting for 45 minutes.

For a 30-minute period, talks will be made by officers present, discussing specific national defense cases investigated by them or their departments.

Following the talks by the officers, there will be a discussion of a completed investigated case depicting the different phases of the Investigative Activity from 3:45 to 4:15 P. M.

A round motion picture "War and Order" will be shown following the discussion of the case, and the conference will then adjourn.

Stressing complete cooperation between the local and state peace officers and the FBI, Acers said today that, "Under the present emergency, it is one of

the most important officers to safeguard in regard to national security."

"With the FBI as a coordinating agency, officers are fighting a defensive war against the disturbers of this country's security," Acers said.

On September 8, 1941, was designated by the President as the day of the United States in charge of investigating and connected with matters of espionage, sabotage, and violations of the regulations. The President promptly turned over the nearest representative FBI.

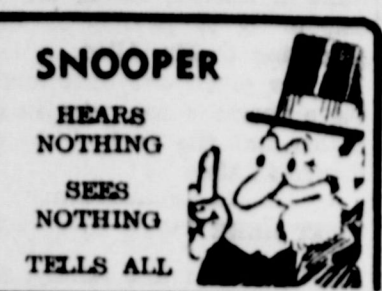

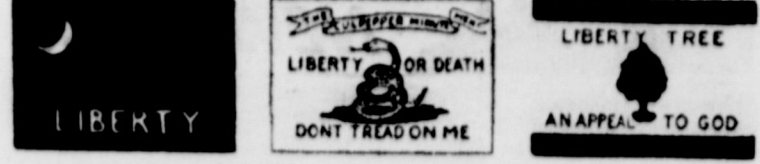

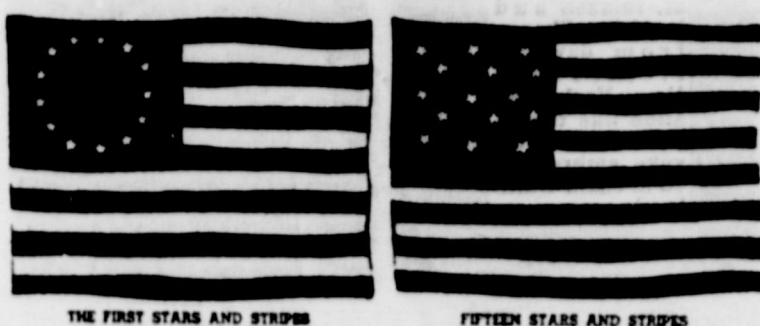
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Picture Story of U. S. Flag



PRE-INDEPENDENCE FLAGS—Depicted above are banners carried by American patriots when they first took up arms in 1775. At the left is the blue flag with its white crescent which was nailed to the staff at Fort Moultrie by Sergeant Jasper. In the center is the Rattlesnake Flag of the Virginia minute men at Culpeper. At the right is one of the New England pine tree flags.



This is the first Stars and Stripes. The Continental Congress on June 14, 1777, resolved: "That the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." According to legend the five-pointed stars were designed by Mrs. Betsy Ross.

(Continued from page 1) Although the incendiary bomb should be put under control as soon as possible, do not approach within 50 feet for approximately 2 minutes after it strikes. Some few bombs have a small explosive charge timed to go off about 2 minutes after impact. Furthermore, the violent phase of its burning action lasts for about 60 seconds after igniting.

If left alone the ordinary bomb will burn out in 15 to 20 minutes, but the heat generated will set fire to anything combustible within several feet.

Two Methods of Control There are two methods of controlling the bombs, either of which may be effectively used in the home. One is using a fine spray of water and the other is the use of dry sand.

Do not expose yourself to the intense heat. Use a shield such as an overturned table, chair or partially opened door.

To control the bomb action by water, USE ONLY A FINE SPRAY OR MIST from a garden hose or a hand pump with spray nozzle.

metal, the water spray is converted into steam, thereby producing a cooling effect. Water spray will reduce burning time 10 minutes or more. The floor and surrounding combustible materials are cooled, thus preventing the spread of fire until the bomb has burned out.

Never apply a solid stream of water, and never dash a bucket of water on the bomb. THIS WILL CAUSE AN EXPLOSION AND SCATTER BURNING METAL!

If water is not available use the sand method. Be sure the sand is dry! Sand will smother the bomb until it can be carried outside the building.

Use a bucket or other metal container for the sand. Pour a part of it out near the bomb. Using a long-handled shovel, place sand around and over the bomb, enough to smother it. Pick up bomb and sand with shovel and put it in the bucket. Catching the bucket handle with the shovel, take it outside immediately.

Do not use chemical extinguishers on bombs! Don't allow the fire to get out of control. It may be necessary to neglect the bomb to prevent spread of fire to other parts of the building.

In the event of an air raid alarm be sure you can reach the ordinarily inaccessible places in your home. Have your hose connected, but be sure it is long enough to reach any place in the house. Otherwise have sand and shovel ready.

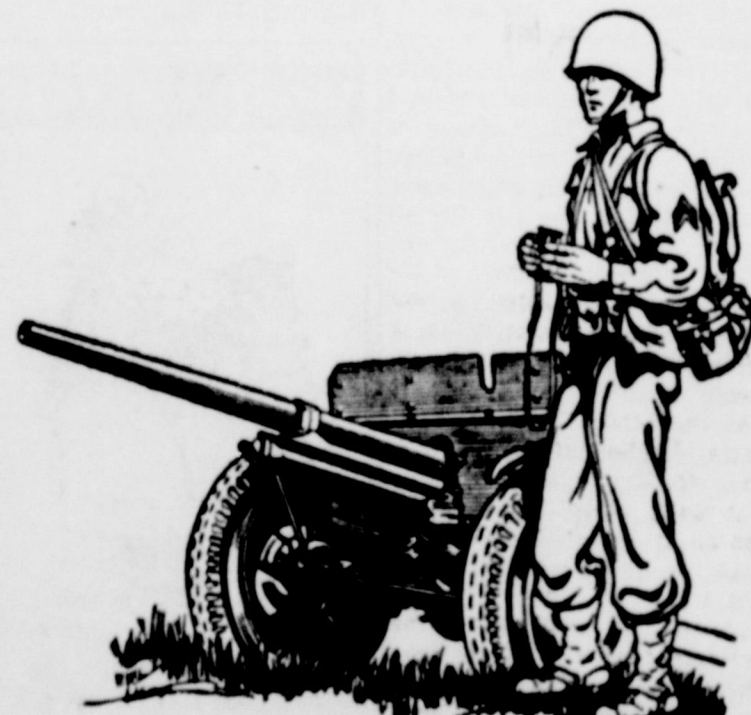

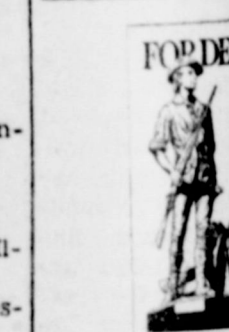
