

### LOW TEMPERATURE MADE THE DIFFERENCE

The roasts weighed the same before they were cooked and were cooked to the same degree of doneness (medium). Oven temperatures made the difference. The roast on the left was cooked in a moderate (300° F.) oven. The roast on the right was cooked in a hot (500° F.) oven. The advantages of roasting meats in a moderate oven are (1) less shrinkage—more servings, (2) meat is juicier (note the larger amount of drippings from the roast cooked at the high oven temperature), (3) better flavored.


