Building Restrictions Do Not Prohibit Remodeling, Repairs

The recent conservation order isued by the War Production Board, restricting the use of lumber and building materials. has caused a great many people to believe that no civilian construction will be permitted for the duration of the war. This is not correct.

The order places absolutely no restriction on necessary maintenance and repairs to existing structures of any kind. In addition to this, the order permits construction of a new residence costing not more than \$500.00. or alterations and additions to existing structures, costing not in excess of \$500.00.

A farmer or rancher may build new barns, goat sheds, poultry houses, and any other type of farm building, except a residence, just so long as the cost of such building does not exceed \$1,000.00.

A new commercial, industrial or recreational building may be constructed if the cost is not in excess of \$5,000.00.

The limits on costs as set by the order include both labor and materials.

The War Production Board recognizes the need for every property owner to maintain and keep his properties in good condition, hence there is no restriction set on such work.




