





REMINISCING AND PLANNING -- Remembering past good times and planning future visits are occupying the time of a Friona couple and their guests. Mr. and Mrs. Dan McEvoy, right and second from left, of Winchester, England, are in Friona for a visit with her brother-in-law and sister. Mr. and Mrs. Walter Loveless. This is the third time the McEvoys have been here and the Lovelesses plans to visit them in Winchester in a year or two.

Another homelike touch they noticed soon after their arrival July 5 was the rain. However. Texas rain is more torrential than that in England, observed Mrs. McEvoy. Mr. McEvoy has a nine-month leave of absence from his job and the couple plans to divide the time between Friona and Albuquerque where their daughter, Mrs. R. K. Williams, lives.

A trip to East Texas and the Gulf Coast is on their agenda when the weather is cooler. and they hope to obtain an extension of their visitors permit so they can spend Christmas in the States.

The visitors commented on Friona's growth. On their first trip here in 1949 they watched elevator construction and saw the first load of wheat go in.

"Space" is the biggest contrast with life in England, say the McEvoys. Houses in Winchester are built with no room between them and front and back yards are tiny. Mr. McEvoy was thoroughly enjoying helping Mr. Loveless mow their large yard when a Star reporter called early this week

An old cathedral city, Winchester is 12 miles from Southampton, the gateway to the world, and some 68 miles from London. It is also a university city and the pace is leisurely and quiet in comparison with the hustle and bustle in the States. "In fact, its almost ull" smiles Mrs McEvov but one has the feeling that dull moments would be few and far

between in her company. When asked if there was a possibility they might move to the States, Mrs. McEvoy shook her head. "We considered it. but I can't leave the grandchildren." In addition to Mrs. Williams, the couple has four

other children. Conversation with the visitors got around to television and the Americans were aghast to learn that licenses are required for both television sets and "wirelesses" in England. But when the visitors pointed out that British Broadcasting Company was supported by license fees and no commercials interrupted the programs, they agreed that it would be worth \$11 a year. Britain's Independent TV network, on the other hand, does have "adverts" and the viewers find them just as annoying as

do we Americans. Mrs. Loveless brought with her from England and it is doubly pleasant with the McEvoys here. Asked if visiting with her sister made her homesick, she replied, "Oh, my, no! But after Libby leaves it will take mesix months to get through missing her." Mrs. Loveless plans a trip home soon to visit Mr. and Mrs. McEvoy and their other

Magnesium In Cotton **Production Studied**

Magnesium is one of the than the Stoneville Z-106 plants. required by higher plants for normal growth and reproduction. Until recently, very little work had been done in relation to the magnesium requirements of cotton.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has completed series of studies in an attempt to learn these requirements. The studies were made under controlled conditions, and should be very useful as a guide for future field experiments. American Upland (Stoneville Z-106) and Egyptian (Pima S-1) cottons, grown in a nutrient solution under greenhouse conditions, were used in the tests.

The characteristic foliage symptoms of magnesium deficiency appeared first in the lower leaves of Pima S-1 plants which were more sensitive to magnesium deficiency

New Cotton Defoliation Guide Released

Effective March 5, 1960, defoliants and desiccants came under the regulations of Public Law 518. The basis for the control program on farm chemicals is to prevent undue risk from residues of the chemicals in the

raw agricultural product. Certain of these chemicals, however, have been granted an extension by the Food and Drug Administration, explains Fred Elliott, extension cotton work specialist. This extension is good until March 5, 1961, he

Any defoliant or desiccant used will eventually have tolerances or an exemption from tolerances designated for its safe use or will be registered on a nonresidue basis. Until official Federal regulations are issued defoliant or desiccant, it should

not be used. Elliott warns. Agricultural Extension Service leaflet, Elliott lists the chemicals that have been granted this extension, and gives a guide for their use. This leaflet may be obtained from the local county agent or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station,

It takes moisture, temperature sale or otherwise: and nitrogen for the bacteria to feed on to decompose organic matter. If you want to get your land in the best possible condition for a 1961 wheat crop, you had better consider addition of a nitrogen fertilizer before turning the straw under. Try to get the breaking job done in July if possible while there is plenty of moisture and warm weather left to rot the straw.



Flocculent May Prove Successful For Removing Playa Lake Sediments

Tests conducted recently on the High Plains indicate that a commercial flocculent, Separan AP-30, may prove successful for removing sediments from plays lake water used for groundwater recharge. Application of the flocculent reduced the amount of silt plus clay entering a recharge well in a 24-hour period by 49 per

During the test, which consisted of a 24-hour recharge period, the flocculent was added at a constant rate of 0.7 ppm to the water at the inlet pipe in the lake. The irrigation pump was operated for one hour at the end of the recharge period. Samples were taken of the unflocculated water at the pipeline intake and of the flocculated water at the well inlet. All samples were mixed for a minimum of 3 minutes, and no dispersant was remain in effect as a condition added. The sediments in the flocculated samples were determined in only two categories: sand and silt plus clay.

Results from this test indicate that, under more favorable conditions, Separan AP-30 may prove to be a successful flocculent for removing sediments from plays lake water used for groundwater recharge. More tests are planned for the future in which conditions will be varied to determine if more efficient results can be obtained.
