First Bale Here

R. C. Davis of the Lazbuddie community took the first bale of cotton to a gin in Parmer county last Thursday when James Mabry ginned out a bale at the North Lazbuddie Gin at 11:20

Davis, who farms a piece of land about a mile east of the gin, also brought the first bale to Friona Tuesday and it was ginned at the Plains Farmers Gin by Steve Hargus' crew.

The Lazbuddie bale, and the bale ginned here Tuesday, were both from a 20-acre patch of improved Gregg variety and was planted April 13 on pre-watered ground, treated with 160 pounds anhydrous ammonia and watered one more time.

The bales were hand-pulled and the Lazbuddie bale weighed out at 458 pounds and the bale

at Friona Gin weighed 600 even. Several other bales were reported to have been ginned over the first part of the week, one at Lawlis Gin in Bovina and one at the Hub.

Davis received a bonus of 50 cents per pound for his bales at both gins.





1. What is a desiccant? A. A desiccant is a chemical material applied to cotton for the purpose of drying the leaves in preparation for stripper harvest of the open bolls. 2. How do desiccants differ

A. Desiccants do not cause all the leaves to fall to the ground. Because of faster action on the tissue of the leaf, it may dry and stick on the stalk.

3. What are the recom-

A. Pentachlorophenol and Arsenic Acid, usually 75%, have been very effective. 4. When should the desiccant

A. Cotton should be fully mature, 60 to 80% open and preferably 90% open. "Penta" is applied with diesel oil after the dew dries. Arsenic Acid is applied with water and can be applied under conditions of higher humidity than "Penta."

5. What is the cheapest material for use as a desiccant? A. Commercial preparations containing about 75% arsenic acid.

6. Is Arsenic Acid poisonous to man and animal?

county this year and most of Increased grain sorghum production has been a trend for a rapidly reaching maturity. A good many years, especially during the last decade, which has seen huge increase in the number of bushels harvested. This has come about not so much from increased acreage as it has been from improved farming methods.

In 1950, on irrigated fields the average yield was 2,500 pounds per acre, while in 1960 the sorghum fields are expected to yield an average of 4,500 pounds. That's an 80 percent increase of per acre yields.

According to Parmer County Agent Joe Jones, increased yields have come about mainly because of: 1) fertilizer, 2) better land preparation, 3) improved watering methods, 4) improved varieties and 5) generally better farming methods practiced by everybody.

The average yields on irrigated fields during the past few vears would hardly have been considered possible a decade

However, this phenomenal grain output has not been a real bright spot of the county's economy, in spite of the fact that, of more than 400,000 acres of irrigated farmland in Parmer County, the biggest percentage is planted into maize.

Since 1955, the government price support has been declining regularly and last year itdropped to an all-time low of \$1.32 per hundred pounds. That's less than half of what the price support was a few years ago, so the harvesting each year of bumper crops has not made for more money in the sorghumproducers pocket.

In fact, the net profit has been somewhat less.
