POSTPONED UNTIL NOVEMBER 19-21 Social Security Tax Not to Be Increased For Year 1943

Employers were put on notice this week in a statement issued by Frank Scofield, collector of internal revenue, Southern District of Texas, that there will be no change in the tax rate on Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance on January 1, 1943, as had been anticipated.

Under the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1942 passed by Congress and signed by the President on October 21, the tax rate remains at 1 percent on payrolls of employers and 1 percent on wages paid to employees which must be deducted by the
