Reed Responds To Farwell C-C Letter

Thomas Reed, director of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) office in Friona, has responded to a letter sent to him the Farwell Chamber of Commerce's agriculture committee concerning the Madigan Plan which would consolidate three government agricultural offices.

The letter was signed by committee chairman Ralph Franse, Anne Norton, Jerry Don Glover, Tom Nichols and Bert Williams.

Reed said the Madigan plan called for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), SCS, and Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices to be relocated in one building. This is a nationwide plan.

In Parmer County, the SCS office is housed in Friona in a building owned by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation district. The ASCS and FmHA agencies are located in a building they lease in Farwell.

The Friona building isn't large enough to house all three agencies. If the Madigan Plan is approved, it's likely bids will be sought for a building in Parmer County to house all three agencies.

According to Reed, "Secretary of Agriculture, (Michael) Espy has proposed a total re-organization of these agencies which goes far beyond the original Madigan plan. Some details of this plan were released last week and it looks like the ASCS and part of the FmHA will be combined to form a new agency and the SCS will become the Natural Resource and Conservation Service. All this is still subject to Congressional approval but regardless of what the agencies will be called, co-location (moving into one building) of all three agencies will be required. The USDA is forcing all offices serving an area to be co-located to provide one-stop shopping to better serve the farmers."

"The decision to place USDA offices in communities is made by the State FAC Committee which consists of the SCS State Conservationist, ASCS State Director and the FmHA State Director. This committee will

advertise and will consider office space in Farwell and Friona. The decision of where to locate USDA offices will be determined by the quality of space and an economical price. This plan will probably be implemented in the next three to five years."

"Friona, as the largest city in the county, has excellent emergency services, overnight lodging, and numerous dining establishments for employees and farmer customers alike.

"These distinctive features in combination with the benefit of Friona's more centralized geographical location in Parmer County, make Friona the most logical and economical situs for the Farm Services Agency.

"Enclosed herewith for your consideration is a map of Parmer County which identifies the concentration of agricultural industry within a twelve mile radius of Friona.

"The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture asks for your strong consideration in the

collocation of the Parmer County ASCS, FmHA and SCS offices in Friona.

"At your earliest possible convenience we would appreciate your providing to us the bid specifications necessary for this facility. Should you desire more information regarding this proud city, please do not hesitate to contact us."

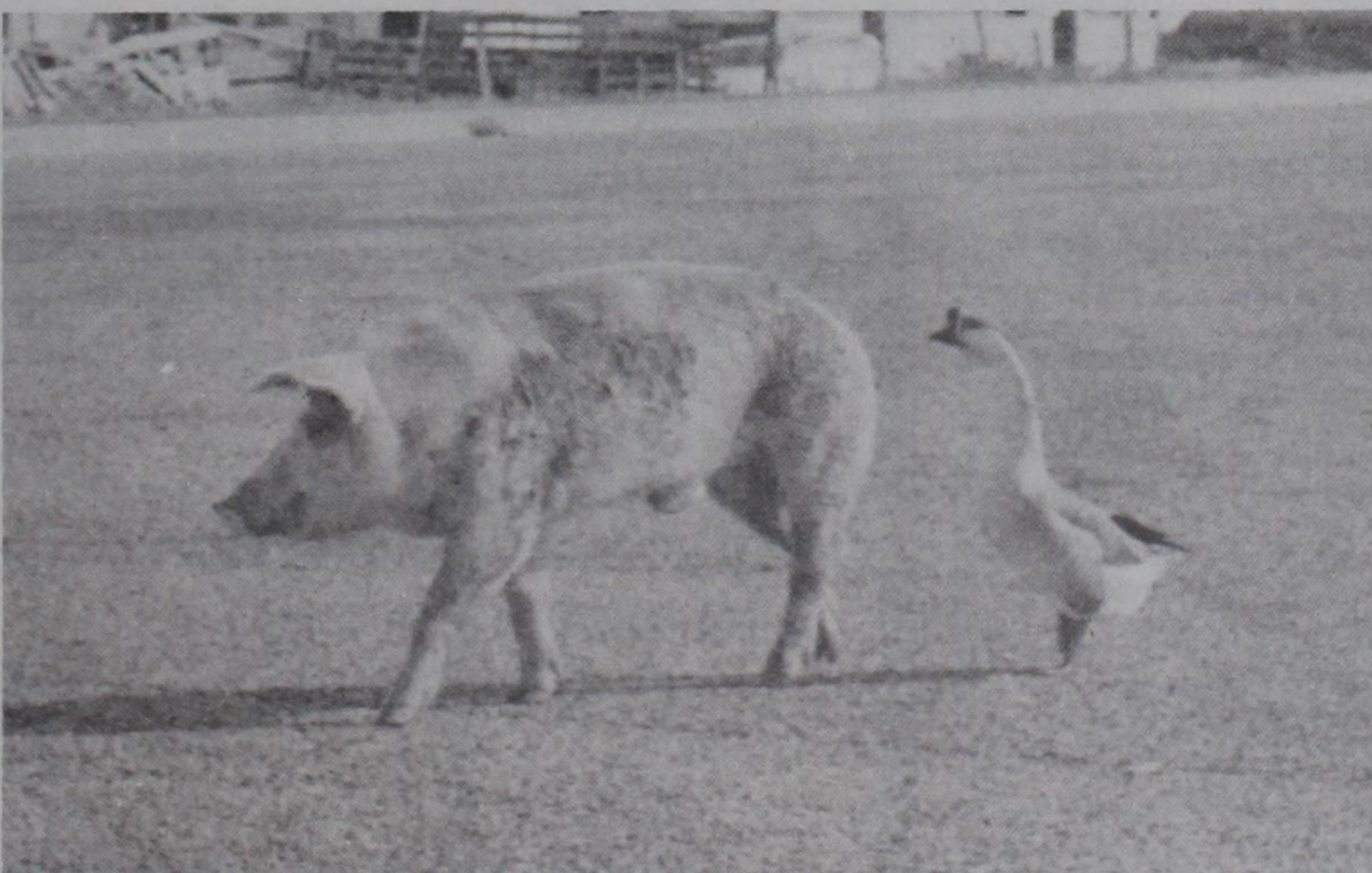
Steve Gartin used his "14" to pull into a tie for the overall lead with Myrtle Melton. Both have scores of 60 after five weeks.

Trees Can Offer Nice Windbreaks

Windbreak trees and trickle systems can be ordered through the Parmer County S.W.C.D. All services are offered regardless of sex, race, creed, color, national origin or handicap.

The club's next meeting will be in the home of Ibbey Lewellen. The members will make holiday decorations for Prairie Acres.



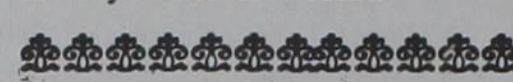

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Start Now Making Plans For Holiday Friendship Cakes

It may seem like we have plenty of time until Christmas, but the holiday season really isn't too far away. Especially, if you're giving homemade gifts this year.

In fact, to have Friendship Cakes ready to give to all of your friends this Christmas, you need to get the original starter going by mid-October. If you've never made or received a Friendship Cake, the process may seem a little confusing

at first. But, I'll try and simplify the directions.

The concept is to give a friend a cake along with a jar of starter syrup and the recipe for expanding the starter syrup and making cakes that the recipient can give to his or her friends.

If you are starting the process from scratch, begin with the Friendship Cake Starter recipe below. At the end of ten days, your starter syrup will be ready to use.

You can make the Individual

Friendship Cake with the fruit from the original starter. Use the original starter syrup to expand the starter and to make up to three cakes using the recipes for Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2. The recipes are slightly different.

Here is a condensed version of the steps you'll need to follow:

1. Make the Friendship Cake starter.

2. Drain the fruit, reserving both the starter syrup and the fruit.

3. Use the fruit in the Individual Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2.

4. Use the starter syrup in either Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2.

5. Give three of the cakes away with the appropriate amount of starter and the recipe.

6. Use the extra starter to make another batch of cakes using the Friendship Cake #1 or #2 recipe.

7. Continue until you and all of your friends, family and neighbors can't eat another bite of cake.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE STARTER

3/4 cup canned peaches, drained and cut into pieces

3/4 cup canned pineapple chunks, drained

6 maraschino cherries, halved

1-1/2 cups sugar

1 package yeast

Place all the ingredients in a large glass container with a loose cover. Stir to mix. Stir two or three times the first day and once each day thereafter. Keep the fruit at room temperature on the kitchen counter or shelf. Do not refrigerate the starter. At the end of two weeks, the starter is ready to use. Drain the fruit and reserve the syrup. Use the fruit in the following recipe:

INDIVIDUAL FRIENDSHIP CAKE

1 yellow cake mix

1 box instant vanilla pudding

4 eggs

2/3 cup vegetable oil

1-1/2 cups fruit mixture from the starter recipe

1/4 cup water

1 cup chopped nuts

1 cup grated coconut

Mix the ingredients together and bake in a bundt or tube pan at 325 degrees for 50 to 55 minutes.

Note: If you give the cake as a gift, present it with one pint of the starter syrup and one of the following recipes so that the recipient can use your starter to make their own starter and cakes for their friends. If you choose to give your friends copies of Friendship Cake #2, give them only 1-1/2 cups of the starter syrup.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE #1

Starter:

1 pint starter syrup

2-1/2 cups sugar

1 large can sliced peaches

Mix the ingredients together and set on a cabinet or shelf at room temperature. Stir each day for ten days.

On the tenth day, add 1 large can of pineapple chunks and 2-1/2 cups sugar. Stir every day for ten days.

On the 20th day, add two 8-ounce jars of halved maraschino cherries and 2-1/2 cups sugar. Stir every day for ten days.

On the 30th day, pour off the juice into pint-sized jars and give it to friends along with the following cake and a copy of this recipe. The fruit from this recipe is enough to make three cakes.

For one cake:

1 yellow cake mix with pudding (or one box yellow cake mix and one box instant vanilla pudding)

4 eggs

2/3 cup vegetable oil

1-1/2 cups fruit mixture from the starter recipe above

1 cup chopped pecans

Mix all the ingredients and bake at 350 degrees in a bundt or tube pan for 40 to 60 minutes. Repeat the process to make 2 more cakes.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE #2

Starter:

Pour into a 1-gallon glass jar the following ingredients:

1-1/2 cups starter syrup

2-1/2 cups sugar

1 medium-sized can fruit cocktail and juice

1 large can sliced peaches and juice

Stir the mixture every day with a wooden spoon.

On the tenth day, add the following:

2 cans crushed pineapple and juice

2-1/2 cups sugar

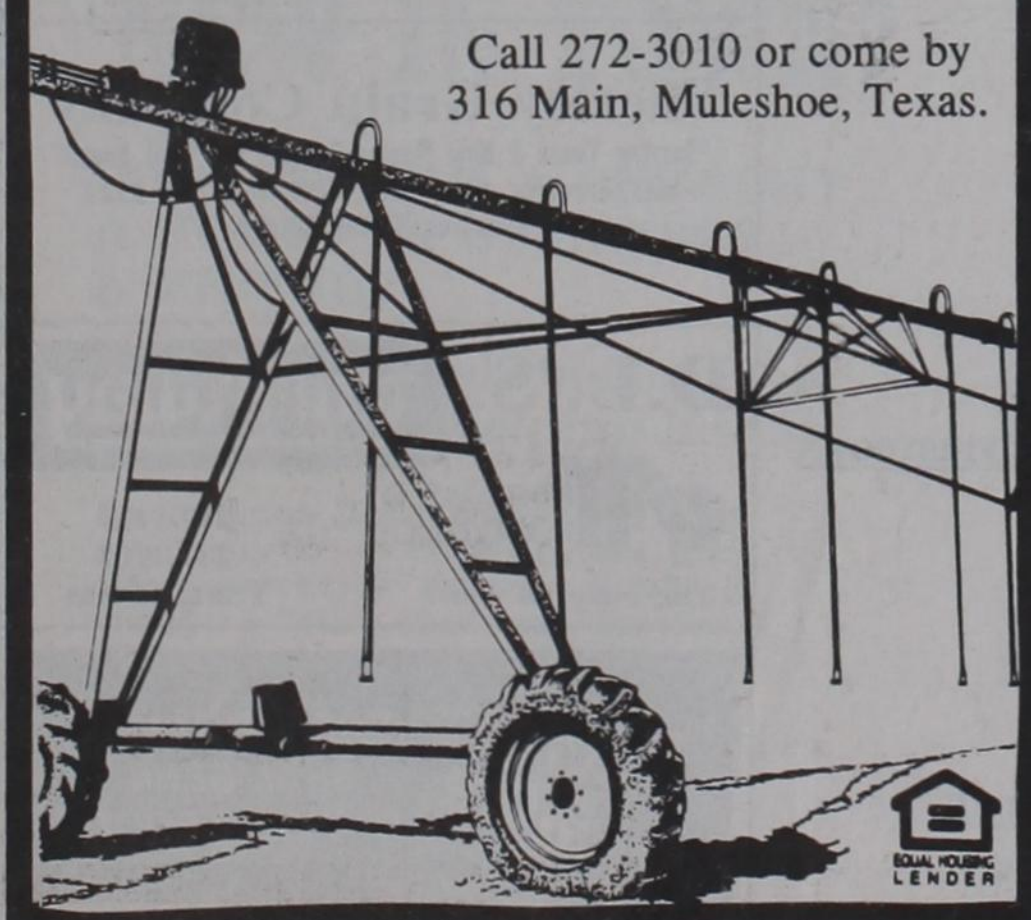

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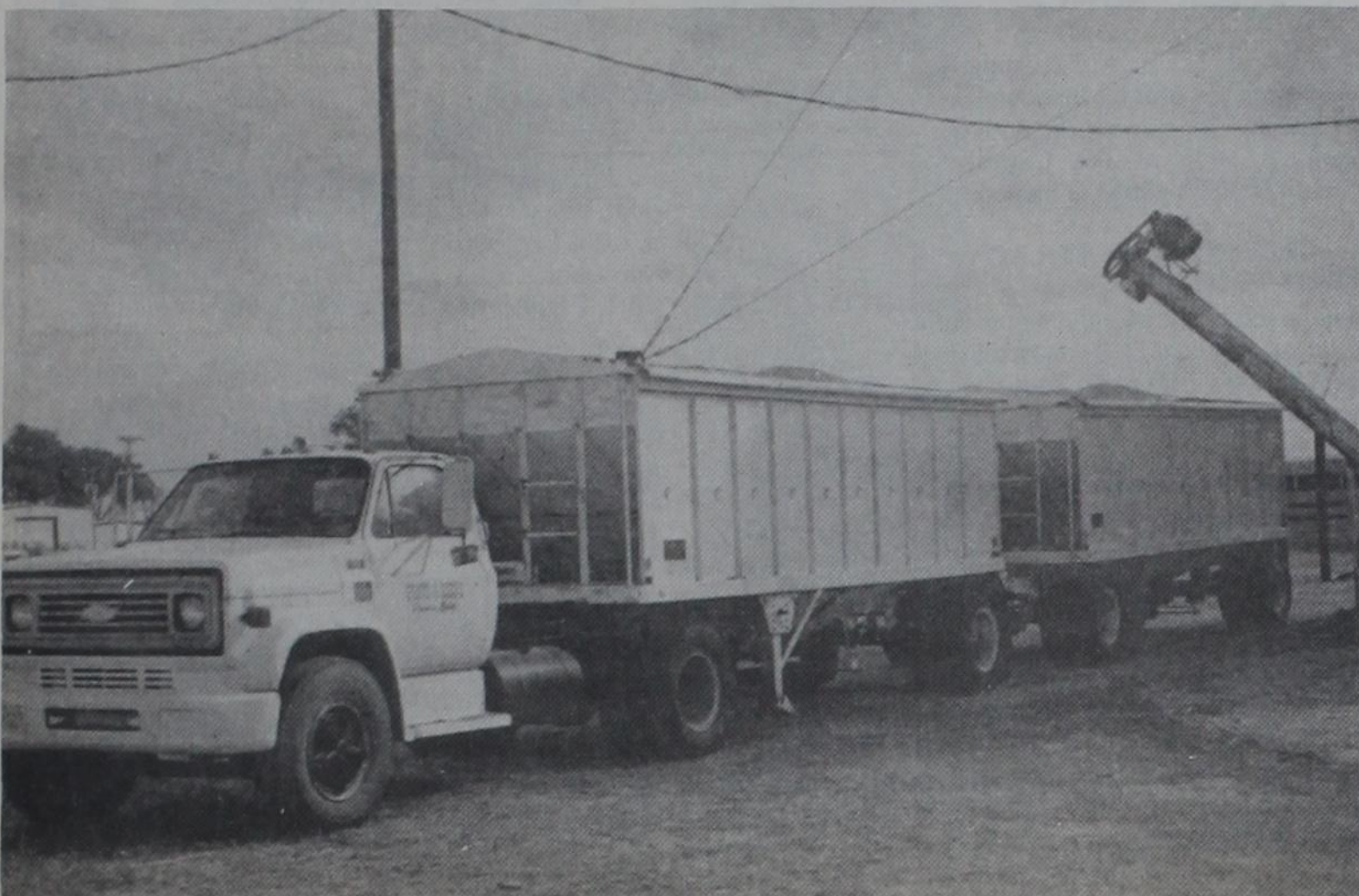

into the end zone, Carthel made a great catch of a pass that was deflected, but Friona was called for a motion penalty, which nullified the score.

Leonard Alvarado set up the chieftain score with an interception, then Blair Burney hit paydirt over the left side of the line from five yards out. The two-point play failed, but the Chiefs got right back up again, 20-7.

Fritch staged a comeback by scoring early in the fourth quarter. But "ball shark" Colby Carthel blocked the PAT making the score 20-13.

"Coach (Morton) told me I could get one. I got through and got lucky," said Carthel. Fritch scored again with 2:48 left in the game.

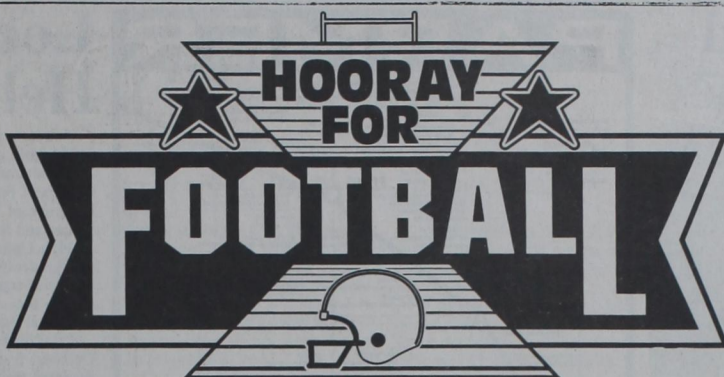

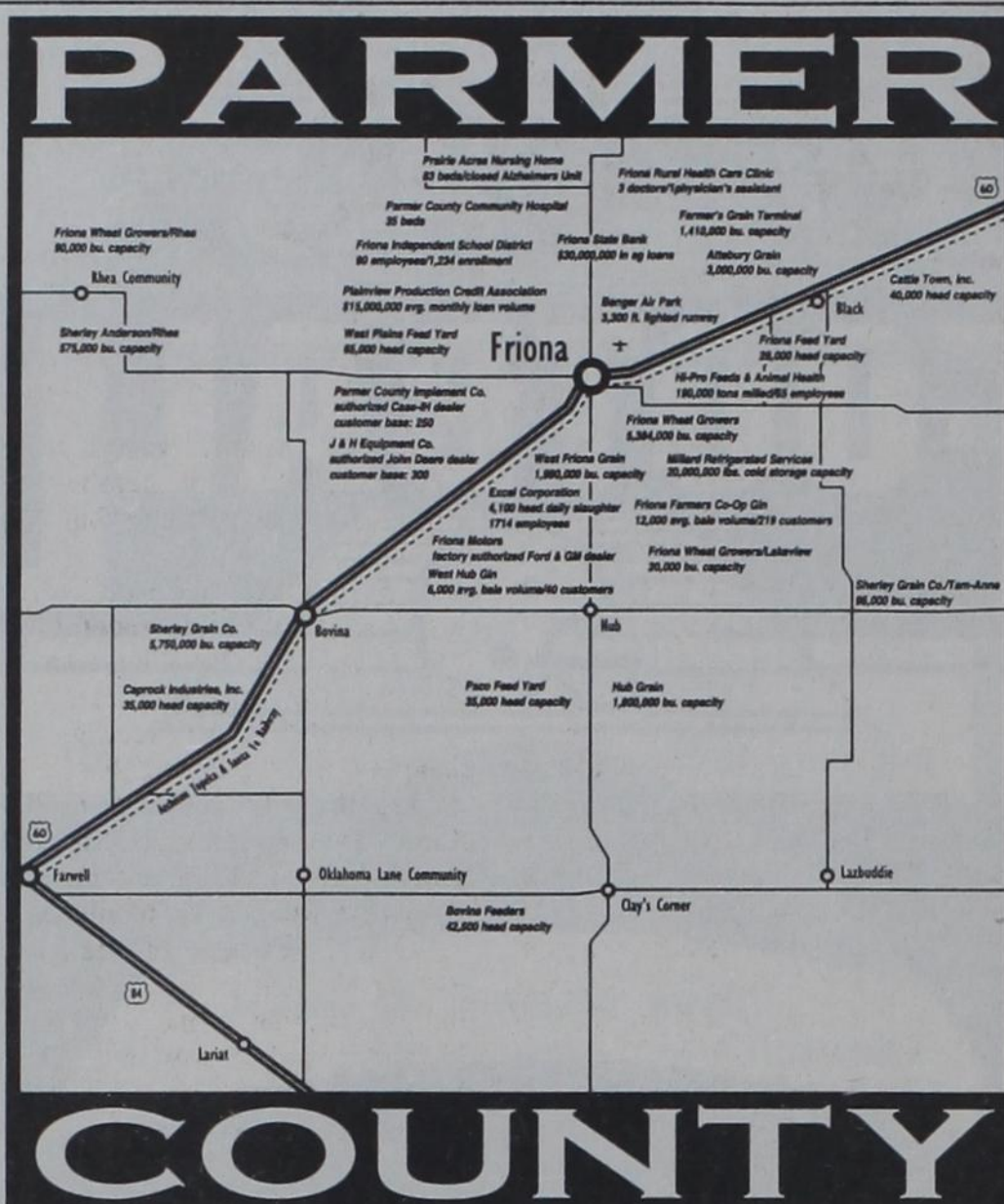

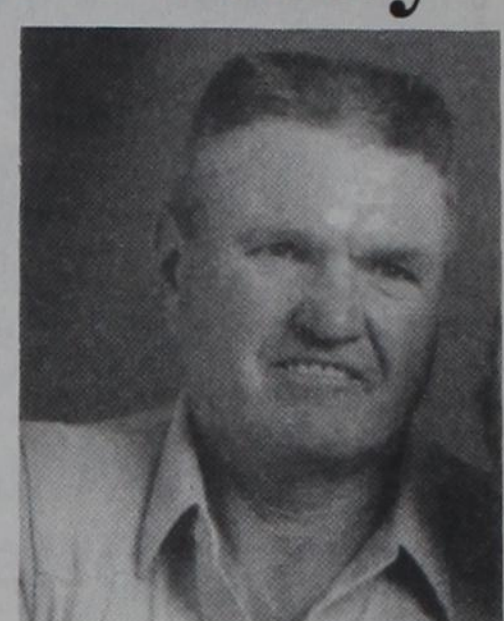

Short-term, Tax-free Bond Funds Offer Income to Traditional Savers

High-income taxpayers may be able to significantly increase their investment income by considering limited-maturity, tax-free mutual funds.

As interest rates on certificates of deposit (CDs) and similar investments have declined, investors have been forced to look elsewhere for acceptable levels of income. Short-term or limited-maturity, tax-exempt bond funds may be a reasonable alternative for many of these investors.

At this writing, the top income-tax bracket is 31 per cent, but this is likely to increase to 36 per cent in the future. Short-term CDs are currently paying about 3 per cent taxable income. At today's tax rate, a 4.85 per cent tax-free mutual fund is equivalent to 7 per cent in a fully taxable investment.

The additional income offered by limited-maturity, tax-exempt funds, however, does not come without limited volatility. Unlike traditional savings vehicles, where your principal remains stable, the share price of tax-exempt funds fluctuates. That means your principal could at any time be worth more or less than your original investment. The risk so far has proved relatively small, according to one portfolio manager, who suggests that savers owe it to themselves to check out the extent of the risk.

One way to do this is to examine the fund's high and low share price during the year. For

example, if a fund is offered at \$10 a share at the beginning of the year, and the range between its high and low price during the year is 25 cents, its risk that year is 2.5 per cent (.25 divided by 10). In this example, the additional tax-free income, even after any possible loss of principal, would still be better than conventional savings vehicles.

There is no way to accurately forecast future performance, but a simple look at highs and lows can give you an idea of possible risk. Of course, price fluctuation also can work in your favor by increasing principal value.

Another quick check of risk is to examine the fund's portfolio. Conservative, short-term funds typically buy only investment-grade bonds. The managers concentrate on quality issues and try to avoid any bonds with credit problems. In addition, the maturities are typically short. This limits the normal market swings and credit problems that can arise in long-term issues. Even though risk cannot be entirely eliminated, short-term investments take a lot of the uncertainty out of investing.

Some savers are strongly opposed to any risk of principal. To them, conventional, insured savings vehicles offer more peace of mind. In return, they typically settle for much less income. On the other hand, many investors, particularly those in high tax brackets, understand and are willing to take reasonable risks. To them, short-term, tax-exempt bond funds could be the solution to low interest rates.
