"Here are the thing to do to be ready to get the new books:

"In every household, someone must count the cans, bottles and jars 8 ounce size or larger of fruits and vegetables, on hand at midnight. Saturday, February 20. That will be a Sunday mornnig task in some homes. The count must include canned fruits, canned vegetables (including spices) fruit and vegetable juices, soups, chili sauce and catsup. Take from the total five cans for each member of the family. The new total must be reported on the Declaration form, or if there are no more than five cans each, the report will be 'None'

"These are not to be counted: Canned olives, canned meat and fish, pickles, relish and jams, jellies and preserves spaghetti, maraconi and noodles homecanned food, if not canned for

"Persons who are not living as members of their family group must make their own Declarations and get their own ration books. Domestic help is not a part of a family

"Coffee on hand November us one pound for each person whose are stated on Book 1 is 14 or over.

"Remember to take Book 1 of all persons listed on a Declaration to the registrars when applying for Book 2. No Book 2 presented at the place of registration for 'tailoring.'

Fire Record Credit

A good fire record credit of written in Sanderson for 12months beginning March 1 it was announced today by Marvin Hall State Fire Insurance Commissioner. This will result in a direct saving on fire insurance as 25 per cent of the normal premium will be deducted on policies written after the effective

The 25 per cent credit will result in an estimated saving of \$2,251 on fire insurance costs for Sanderosn policyholders during the next year. The estimate is based on fire insurance premium payments in 1942. A 25 per cent credit has been in effect for the past year.

The fire record for a city or town is determined by a fixed ratio between losses and premiums figured on a fve-year average. The maximum good fire record credit is 25 per cent. The maximum charge (or penalty) for heavy losses is 15 per cent.

Hall explained that the fire record credit is not to be confused with the key rate for a city or town. The key rate, he pointed out, is determined among other things, by the type and quality of fire fighting equipment and water facilities, as well as the adoption of fire prevention measures.

Frayed cords and loose plug connections that permit bare wires to come together are among the most frequent causes of short circuits that result in blown fuses. Here's how you can eliminate them and prevent needles interruptions in your electric service.

1. CORD FRAYED IN MIDDLE



Clean away the frayed or crumbled part.



Tape up each wire separately, using electrician's



Then tape wires Adhesive tape of cracks quickly.

2. CORD FRAYED NEAR PLUG



Unloosen screws and pull



Cut off frayed part





WRONG: Wires not put around the prongs first. When lug is pulled, all the strain is on the connection.

RIGHT: Wires put around prongs. When the cord is yanked or jerked, pressure is put on the prongs.

It's a good idea to keep extra fuses on hand and to know how to use them. Your Income Tax

WHEN, WHERE, AND HOW TAXES ARE TO BE PAID

Taxes due on a return filed for the calendar year 1942 may be paid in full at the time for the filing of the return on or before March 15. 1943. The tax may, at the option of the taxpayer, be paid in four equal installments instead of in a single payment, in which case the first installment is to be paid on or before March 15, the second on or before June 15, the third on or before September 15, and the fourth on or before December 15, 1943. If the taxpayer elects to pay his tax in four installments, each of the four installments must be equal in amont, by any installment may be aid, at the election of the taxpayer, prior to the time prescribed for its payment, the whole amount of the tax remaining unpaid is required to be paid upon notice and demand from the collector.

The tax must be paid to the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer's return is required to be filed that is to the collector for the district in which is located the taxpayer's legal residence or principal place of business or if he has no legal residence or principal place of business in the United States, then to the collector of internal revenue at Baltimore Maryland.

In the payment of taxes a fractional part of a cent is to be disregarded unless it amounts to one-half cent or more, in which case it shall be increased to one

The tax due, if any, should be paid in cash at the collector's office, or by check or money order payable to "Collector of Internal Revenue." In the case of payment in cash, the taxpayer should in every instance require and the collector should furnish a receipt.
