APPLICATIONS FOR RATION BOOK THREE BEING DISTRIBUTED

The local postoffice has received and is distributing application blanks for War Ration Book three, according to Postmaster Clyde Griffith. These applications were received from the Office of Price Administration and must be filled out by all persons and mailed in if they are to receive ration book three.

Anyone who does not receive a blank in their mail box may secure the application at the postoffice window. The application is in the form of a card, the stub of which, duly numbered, is to be kept by the applicant. The remainder of the card, which must be filled out in ink, is to be mailed to the OPA mailing center at Dallas, Texas. The address is already on the card and the applicant has only to place a three cent stamp on it and post it. It was also pointed out that only one card is needed for the entire family and not an application for each member.

Full instructions appear on the card. If they are not understood the first time, the applicant should read them again, since the instructions are simple and explicit and it is important they be followed exactly.

The application is to be mailed between June 1 and June 10.

It will be built in gothic style and when completed will form a "T" with the front of the building being 26x40 feet. A graceful spire will be a part of the sanctuary to add beauty and to house the clear-toned bell which for so many years has called people to worship. At the back will be another portion of the structure which will also be 26x40 feet and will complete the "T". In this space will be a fellowship hall and Sunday school classrooms. Total cost of the new edifice is estimated at from \$8,000 to \$10,000.

This man was taught not to drink water

WATER... just plain drinking water... is a mighty scarce item to American soldiers now in the North African deserts. And what little water they can find, often isn't fit to drink.

So before our soldiers were landed in Africa, they were put through a stiff course of training to wean them away from drinking water! Field Ration K provides meat three times a day... veal luncheon meat for breakfast, pork luncheon meat for dinner at noon, and cervelat sausage at supper time. Electric Iron

Back to the old, stove-heated sad iron with its arm-tiring weight and uneven heat? Never, you say! But that's what may happen if you don't take proper care of your electric iron. No new ones have been made in over a year, so guard your iron from neglect and misuse. Make it last for the duration.

TIMELY TIPS ON IRON CARE

- Keep bottom of iron clean. Wipe with damp cloth when cool. If necessary, use mild scouring powder to remove sticking starch, but never scrape sole plate with a knife. Burned rayon may be removed with lacquer-thinner or paint remover.
- Clean top of iron with damp cloth or mild powder like Bon Ami or Bab-O. Never immerse iron in water.
- Avoid ironing over buttons, buckles, zippers and other hard objects that may scratch sole plate.
- Be careful not to drop your iron. Dropping puts more irons out of commission than any other one thing.
- In disconnecting iron pull plug at wall outlet instead of iron socket. Constant plugging in and out at iron socket wears out the terminal points.

- Never let iron cord touch hot iron or rub continuously against edge of the board. Either will hasten cord wear.
- If iron sticks, run it over a little salt sprinkled on a piece of old waxed bread wrapper.
- Keep iron handle tight. A rickety handle causes cord plug to rock on terminals in socket and eventually wears out terminal points.
- Rub the sole plate of your iron about once a month with paraffin or beeswax. Wipe off on paper or cloth.
- Always disconnect iron when not in use. Use heel stand or iron rest when pausing momentarily to fold or arrange ironing.
- Be sure iron is perfectly cold before wrapping cord around it and putting it away.
