# Water, Sewer Plan **Gets Council OK**

## County Borrows \$10,000

Parmer County's Commissioners Court Monday passed a resolution authorizing the clerk to borrow \$10,000 from the First National Bank, of Bovina. The money will supplement the county general fund until money is collected later this year.

The short-term loan, which carries an interest rate of 5 per cent, is due December 15 of this year.

Money has also been borrowed for the general fund in past years, due to a continued shortage of tax reveune. However, this situation should soon be alleviated by the increase in revenue which came about last year when the property evaluation for the county was raised, says Hugh Moseley, county clerk.




O Lord, how manifold are thy works! in wisdom hast thou made them all: the earth is full of thy riches. (Psalm 104:24.)

(Continued from page 1) and water lines will be changed in many locations to bring Friona up to specifications, and in such a way to serve double

the present population. In doing away with the present sever site, the plans call for a 4500 foot extension of sever lines to the new plant site. This will be of 12 inch pipe and will handle up to 7,500 population. In the event the population climbs above that mark, Red Smith, consulting engineer for the city representing Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock, told that it "would be cheaper to parallel this line than to construct a heavier one at this time."

Smith went into detail explaining the duties of each of the individual units of the new water and sewer system.

At the new sewer site an Imhoff Tank will be constructed which is the first stage of handling the sewage, then it will move out into three settling basins which will be constructed.

After the full treatment the flow can be turned into the draw where it will be "chemically pure."

This move by the council is another step in the modernization of the city's services made possible by the passing of the \$300,000 bond issue last fall. These contracts represent \$85,000 for the sewer system plus part of the \$90,000 allocated for the water system. "Following the approval of the council the plans will be forwarded to Austin for approval by the State Health Department. Then they will put out for bid. Members present at the special meeting of the council included Mayor R. L. Fleming, Aldermen Glenn Reeve Sr., Bill Nichols, Danny Bainum and Albert Field, city manager.



Her resignation was accepted by the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday morning and it will be effective September 1.


During her stay here, Miss Wainscott has helped to expand the activities of the county's home demonstration clubs and the girls 4-H clubs.



The use of 2-4D for weed control is recommended only when weeds cannot be controlled through cultivation. Sorghum is most tolerant to 2-4D when 6 to 12 inches tall. Severe injuries may occur from treatments applied to sorghum when the plants are less than 3 inches high and also during the advanced stages of growth, particularly in the bloom stage. The sorghum root system sometimes does not develop properly when plants are sprayed with 2-4D and more lodging may occur. 
