I'll write any message they want on one of our bombs and sign their name on it; and have our bombardier drop it down Adolf's throat when security permits. I'll write them the name of the target we dropped them on. Okay? Believe me, I'm proud of Sanderson for going over the way bond quota. It means some thing to us over here and we're giving Jerry hell, too







In addition, a declaration must be filed by any person who was required to file an income tax return for 1943 and who ex-pects his wages subject to withpects his wages subject to withholding in 1943 to be less than the wages received in 1942. Q. How accurate must my estimate be?

A. It should be as accurate as you can reasonably make it, especially since by December 15 there will be only two weeks of the year left. However, no pen-alty will be assesset if the tax is not underestimated by more than 20 percent in the case of a non-farmer or 33 1-3 percent in Mass every Sunday at 8:30 and the case of farmers. Q. How much is the penalty

for underestimating? A. Generally 6 percent of the deficiency.

Q. When will the penalties, if any, be determined? A. After the taxpayer files his

March 15 annual income tax return showing the correct tax for the year.

Q. Suppose I overestimate, what happens?

A. If an overestimate results in overpayment of the correct tax shown in the March return, the Collector will then give you a refund or credit.

Q. Suppose I made a big mistake and overestimated in September, what can I do?

A. You too may file an amen-ded declaration by December 15.
