- 6. Always fly your kites in open fields away from power lines and busy highways.







Texas registration law requires that owners of cars and trucks desiring to register same must present a Texas Certificate of Title to the Tax Collector in order to secure 1944 License Plates. The only exception to this rule is for new cars and trucks brought into Texas from another state. In the case of cars and trucks from out of state, the owner must present title from the state where last registered or from owner's home state.

The United States Army and other Federal Agencies have requested that we secure for them certain additional information regarding truck, trailer and bus registration, as follows: Primary Use, Type of Commodity Hauled, Dump, Cubic Yard Capacity, Speedometer Reading, Gallon Capacity of Gas Tank, Number of Axles, Number of Driving Wheels and whether for private use or for hire.

It is our desire to handle registrations speedily and with the minimum inconvenience to the public. Please check your papers and if you do not have everything required we urge you to come early that we may have time to assist you in getting your papers in proper shape.




