ODT APPROVAL IS NEEDED TO MOVE SHEARING MACHINES

ORDER EFFECTS CHANGES BETWEEN STATE DISTRICTS

Following a meeting Thursday of last week with officials from the regional office in Dallas, John W. Reed, manager of the ODT office in San Angelo stated that a directive requiring that all operators of sheep shearing equipment obtain approval from the Office of Defense Transportation before removing from one district to another was to be issued.

Mr. Reed stated the order was to be issued as a farm of protection for ranchmen who are now just starting into this year's sheep shearing season. There at present a definite shortage of labor on West Texas ranches and there is a threat that some of the shearing crews might move out of their original districts and even outside Texas before the flocks of this part of the Southwest are shorn of their 1944 fleeces.

Authority to move from one district to another must be obtained from the manager of the district office where the operators obtained their certificate of war necessity. Under no circumstances are the operators to leave the state without first getting an order from the ODT.

Reed pointed out that in order for shearing crew operators to obtain approval from the ODT they must produce factual information that they have bonafide contracts with wool growers in other sections of the country. When such proof is established. he said, approval would be given but that in no case would an operator be allowed to move when their services were needed in the district in which they are located.

"It was necessary that this directive be issued on account of the shortage of motor vehicles. DOING SEWING replacement parts, tires and gasoline," Reed declared.

The ODT is asking ranchmen to co-operate with the agency by notifying the office of any sheep shearers planning to leave the state before shearing is completed in Texas.





If an open unit model, see that it is properly lubricated. Check condition of belt and door gasket. Keep unit compartment clean. And if you have reasons to suspect mechanical trouble, have your refrigerator checked over by a competent service man NOW. Repairs take longer these days, and if you wait until the rush season you may find yourself temporarily without refrigeration just when you need it most.



Follow These Tips on the Use and Care of Your Refriger

· Your refrigerator needs breathing space. Place it in coolest spot in the kitchen where there is plenty of air circulation below, behind and above it. If it has ventilating flue at back, see that it is not obstructed.

• If possible, locate refrigerator away from hot stove, direct sunlight or other heat source. This protects finish and saves operating

• Check door seal by closing it on a strip of newspaper. If you can slide paper up and down, seal is imperfect. Gasket should be replaced or door latch adjusted.

• If an open unit model, lubricate motor in accordance with manufacturer's directions. Sealed units need no oiling.

· Keep unit compartment clean. Remove dust and lint from condenser coils.

· Check belt on open model. If too loose, have tightened. If badly have it replaced.

· Defrost whenever in reaches thickness of quarter inch. Keep I covered and defrost dry to retard formatic



Home Demonstration Many Deaths Result Of Fly-Born Diseases Says Health Officer

Must Be Destroyed For Proper Control

Thousands of children and adults die each year from flyborne diseases. Typhoid fever, tuberculosis, summer complaint. cholera, and intestinal diseases frequently resulting in death For County and District follow closely in the trail of the common housefly.

"The control of the fly menace comes at the top of the list of necessary public health measures which should be applied by every city and community in the State," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, "The most effective measure for control is to prevent breeding, and about plete a life cycle. During her lifetime of several months, one housefly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs. Thus, it can easily be seen that in a season which usually begins in the spring of the year, the descendents from one fly number countless of thousands.

To eliminate flies, Dr. Cox said the breeding places must be destroyed. As flies breed in filth. manure piles, garbage, and other organic filth furnish the requirements of warmth, moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drink and by unwashed hands utensils.

"See that your windows, doors and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not endanger your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from Will be in Sanderson flies."
