Kind of Illness Is Specified; Others to Be Sent to Head Office

Goat Meat is Placed **Under Dollar and Cents Price Ceiling**

Dealers Must Mark Two Classifications; Kid Goat and Goat

A recent regulation issued by the Office of Price Administraplaces dollar-and-cents tion ceiling prices on goat meat, according to Conrad F. Schweppe OPA price attorney in the San Antonio District Office. Formerly, prices were frozen at each individual seller's March 1942

prices. This new regulation, effective now, divides goat meat two classifications, one into being "Cabrito" or "Kid goat' and the other being the meat of the mature goat. "Cabrito' or 'Kid goat" is the meat derived from the milk-fed *kid which is twenty weeks old or less, the whole carcass weighing not more than 15 pounds dres-This regulation requires sed. that the carcasses of the older goats be stamped with the word 'Goat" and the Cabrito carcasses be stamped with the words Kid Goat

This regulation fixes prices at all sales levels. The retail price pound. This regulation provides that Cabrito may be sold only in carcass or side form. Retail

are the same as are made from the mutton carcass. Retail prices of the goat loin is 50 cents per pound; rib chops or rib

> Local ration boards, starting April 6, will issue extra rations produced in the United States. only for persons suffering from certain, specified diseases, it was explained. Illnesses which automatically make a person eligible for more food have been determined in Washington by a

medical board, and persons eligible under their classifications will be issued additional food on the basis of needs for ten-week periods.

Where extra rations are requested for an illness or condition of health other than those specified, the locol ration board will act upon the application only in cases of emergency. All others will be sent to the district **OPA** office for action. Application for supplemen-

Meats, Fats-Red stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, E8, and F8 are good through May 20. G8, H8, and J8 become good March 26 and remain good through June 18. Waste Kitchen fats exchanged for two points.

Processed Fruits, Vegetables-Green stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, and ES are good through May 20. Blue stamps F8 to K8, are good April 1 through June 20.

Sugar-Sugar stamp 30 is good indefinitely for five pounds. Sugar stamp 40 is good for five pounds of canning sugar through February 28, next year. Gasoline - In all states outside of the 17 East Coast states. A-11 coupons are good through June 21.

Tire Inspection deadlines-A coupon holders, March 31; Ccoupon holders, May 31; Bcoupon holders, June 30.

Shoes-Stamp 18 in Book One is good through April 30. Airplane stamps 1 in Book Three is good indefinitely. Another shoe stamp to be good beginning May 1 will be announced soon.

Income Tax-Declarations of estimated 1944 tax are due by April 15.




