# FIFTH WAR LOAN SCHEDULED TO START Poppies to be On JUNE 12 AND CONTINUE THROUGH JULY 8 **TERRELL COUNTY**

LARGEST TO DATE A state quota of 464 million dollars for tht Fifth War Loan, June 12-July 8, has been announced by State Chairman Nathan Adams of the War Finance Committee of Texas. This is the largest sum yet and the drive will be " a big and vital effort", Adams said.

Of the total, \$236 million has been set for individual Texans alone, \$125 million of this to be in Series E Bonds.
