DEED TO BIG BEND PARK IS DELIVERED TO PRESIDENT FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT

PRESENTATION IS MADE ON INVASION DAY BY TEXANS

Big Bend National Park in Texas Tuesday became a reality as President Roosevelt interrupted his invasion day conferences to accept the deed to the park from the State of Texas.

The deed was presented to the President at the White House by Amon Carter, president of the Texas Big Bend National Park Association. With him at the ceremony were Speaker Rayburn, Senator Connally and Representative Ewing Thomason of El Paso, in whose district the park is located.

The President expressed keen interest in the new addition to the national park system and asked the group numerous questions about the type of land in the park site, how it will be reached by the public, and what provisions will be made for handling the public.

Told of the rugged nature of the land, the President said that he believed it would make a great

Floods Cause Drop In Shipment Cattle to Pasture

Farmers Income For April Below That of Year Ago

Traffic-halting floods in Kansas and Oklahoma this spring produced a sharp drop in the anticipated cash income of Texas farmers during April since shipment of Texas cattle north for summer pasturage was almost completely stopped, a University of Texas agricultural statistician reported recently.

Income for farmers in the state during April was \$69,000,000, well below the \$75,000,000 level of April a year ago, Dr. F. A. Buechel, economic analyst for the University's Bureau of Business Research, pointed out.

"Part, at least, of the decline in marketings was the result of serious flood conditions in central and eastern Kansas and northern Oklahoma during the latter part of April.

"It is a distinctive characteristic of interstate cattle marketings from Texas in April that the bulk of the forwardings are destined for summer pasturage in the Flint Hills of Kansas and the Osage Country of Oklahoma.

"This year, because of flood conditions, many of the cattle were delayed in transit and instead of reaching their destination on schedule in April did not arrive until early in May."

April's farm cash income showed a \$15,000,000 gain over March, Dr. Buechel explained, while the total income for the first four months of 1944—\$244,936,000—was approximately equal to the same period last year.

Sheep forwardings during April were moderately above and hog shipments substantially above those of April, 1943. Sheep and hog prices, however, were below those of a year ago.

More than \$18,000,000 was received in April for fruits and vegetables, of which \$11,000,000 went to the Lower Rio Grande Valley area.

addition to the national park system and expressed hope that he would be able to visit it some day.

The President, noting the comment of Carter in his letter of presentation, agreed that it was unusual in these days for a state to be giving the federal government something, instead of the government giving something to the state.

Carter was designated by Governor Stevenson to represent Texas in making the presentation. In his letter to Carter, the Governor said that "it is a great honor and rare privilege for me to hand you a deed of cession conveying jurisdiction over Big Bend National Park from the State of Texas to the United States Government."

"This magnificent park of 691,338 acres of unriveted scenic beauty is truly a gift of the people of Texas to the people of all her sister states through the instrumentality of the United States Government."

Carter explained to the President that the nearly 700,000 acres of land, lying in the "Big Bend" of the Rio Grande River, is being ceded to the government through the co-operation of thousands of citizens of Texas.

While the State of Texas appropriated \$1,500,000 toward purchase of the land, school children, people in all walks of life and many land owners themselves joined in making the contribution possible.

"I feel that this occasion reflects great credit upon all those public-spirited Texans who cheerfully and often to their own cost, have participated in the project," Carter told the President.

He pointed out that the park land will remain unchanged under plans of the Interior Department's bureau of national parks.

Texas counts the advantage of assurance for all time that the region will be kept unchanged while being made accessible to universal visitation," he said.

Tuesday's ceremony marked the climax of a nine-year drive to establish the hugh park in the wild western area of the Lone Star State and preserve its natural state of posterity.

In 1935, Congress adopted a resolution sponsored by Representative Thomason creating such a park. Conferences were held with the Mexican government and that government agreed to provide a park along the Mexican side of the region, with bridges across the Rio Grande connecting the two parks.

National park officials have indicated that they are ready to proceed immediately with plans for the park. Already, an administration building has been set up in the area and a small staff employed under an appropriation by Congress last year.

"This is a happy day for me," remarked Thomason. "We have dreamed of this park for many years and now our dreams have been fulfilled."—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Young Men of 17 Eligible For Air Corps Enlistment

Aptitude Test to Determine Training Which Will Be Given

"Enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve is again open to qualified young Americans now 17 years of age . . . who want to win their wings on the 'greatest team in the world'—an AAF air combat crew." This announcement came from the West Texas Recruiting and Induction District, Lubbock.

Young men of 17 who want to fly with the AAF may apply at any AAF Examining Board for enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve. Upon passing the preliminary qualifying physical and mental tests, they will become members of the U. S. Army Air Forces on inactive duty. This means that they will not be called for training until they have reached their 18th birthday. If at work they may remain on the job until they are 18. If in high school, they may elect to complete the semester they entered prior to their 18th birthday. If they are high school graduates, not over 17 years and 9 months of age, they may elect to take advantage of the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program, which provides free college training for men approaching military age.

When called, they will first be given basic training. During this period, they will take aptitude tests to determine whether they will be classified for training as gunner, pilot, bombardier, or navigator.

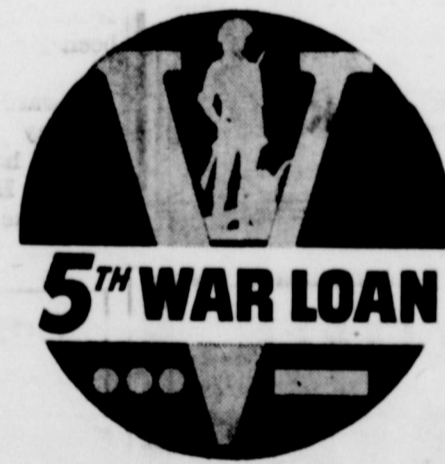
