



Volunteered for service with the United States Army Air Corps February 5th. 1942, at Kelly Field. He received his primary and basic training at Phoenix and Tucson, Arizona, and was graduated July 28. 1943, from the Army Air Forces Advanced Flying School at Stockton Field, California. receiving his silver wings and a commission as a second lieutenant. He arrived in England in December of that same year, serving as a co-pilot of a Flying Fortress, and carried out operational missions over Germany. In April of 1944 word was received that Lt. Shelton had been awarded the Air Medal and an Oak Leaf Cluster to the medal for his achievements while on these raids. In June word was received that he had been missing in action over Germany since May 24, 1944, and further word the latter part of June told of his returning to England on June 16. He is now back in the United States and is stationed at Santa Monica, Calif.
