Surveys by the State Board of Water Engineers have indicated soft water of excellent quality in wells in the vicinity of Twelvemile Mesa, at a distance of about 11 miles from Fort Stockton.

Alpine Avalanche—Many hunters are in the Big Bend-Davis mountains area for the deer-hunting season which opened yesterday.

A number of kills have been reported, with approximately 25 blacktails on storage at the CP & L plant yesterday.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—Plans of the members of the First Baptist Church of Fort Stockton to build an adequate modern church home, inaugurated four years ago, are entering final stages and an open meeting of the local building committee and other interested persons is planned for Sunday afternoon at 4:30 for study of preliminary sketches and estimates to be submitted by Charles T. Freese, Fort Worth architect who is working on other local projects.

The proposed building, which with furnishings is expected to represent an investment of probably \$40,000, would be built on a corner of a block of land which the church bought some time ago from non-resident owners. The site is between Fourth and

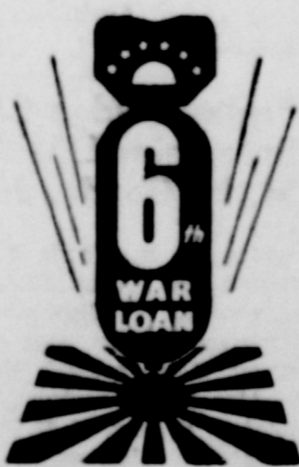

CLEMENTE F. GARCIA

Son of the late Simon Garcia and Francisca Garcia, was born November 23, 1916, in Cisco, Texas. With his family Clemente moved from Cisco to Strawn during the first year of his life, and on June 27, 1917, the Garcias made their home in Sanderson, where they have lived ever since. Clemente attended the Sanderson Public Schools for some time, and later he was employed here by the T. & N. O. Railroad. On September 9, 1942, Clemente left Sanderson to enter the Army at Fort Bliss, Texas and received training there and at other bases before going overseas from San Francisco in the latter part of 1943. On the U. S. A. T. Seapike, Pfc. Garcia crossed the equator December 12, 1943, and was duly initiated into the Shellbacks, receiving a certificate and membership cards. Landing in New Guinea January 20 of the following year, Clemente took part in the campaign for this territory and later was put on a ship bound for the U. S. to receive medical treatment. He died August 9 of this year in the Central Pacific on his way home. Interment was September 1 in the Santa Rita Cemetery here.
