# Joe Kerr, "Hell Hawk" Pilot, Tells of Combat; Is With 365th Fighter Group

# **Recently Awarded** Air Medal; Has 22 **Missions to Credit**

Captain Joe Kerr, Jr., a member of the famed 365th Fighter Group, known as the "Hell Hawks", is very busy in Belgium these days. Recently awarded the Air Medal for five missions. he now has three bronze clusters added on, and as of February 3. twenty-two missions successfully completed. Joe is assistant chief of operations. The "Hell Hawks" have dis-

tinguished themselves time and time again in combat. They were presented a Presidential Citation for shooting down twenty-one German planes on one mission, not losing a single one of their planes. "Time" "The Saturday Evening Post" and "Collier's" have all devoted

The driver of the rig sat up straight and pressed his horse for a bit of extra speed going by. which was funny. The car owner made the change and drove into town far ahead of the DUggy.

Between 1928 and 1938 the United States, the world's outstanding industrial nation of all time, had an industrial depression. Meanwhile the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics was moving forward; not rapidly but at an increasing rate. In those years it was being transiormed from an agricultural nation, a stage through which America had passed, half a century before.

#### A Wind-Broken Nag

Russia was driving a horse named "Central Planning." The rig made an interesting dash for improvement, not very fast however, nor very spectacular. Claims made for the animal's speed were funny; certainly not all true. Living conditions in Russia were not as high as those in America in the pit of our depression; never have been before nor since. It was a splurge, better than Russia had before, but far below American achievement.

There is nothing new about Central Planning. It's as old as horse-drawn equipment. Kings tyrants and dictators have always used the idea. Some have done better with it than others.

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



# SHADES with LIGHT LININGS



# **REFLECT UP TO** 30 to 50% More Light

If your lamp shades are not white or very light-colored on the inside, you're losing a lot of valuable light. Dark linings soak up light like a sponge-in some cases as much as 30 to 50% of the light is lost. Clean your lamp shades regularly, or if they're too dark or discolored with age, replace them with clean whitelined shades that reflect light instead of absorbing it. You'll find you'll get a lot more light from the same bulbs.

# HOW TO CLEAN LAMP SHADES

Parchment paper shades should be dusted with a clean cloth. Silk shades with fancy trimming such as appliqued ornaments, and shades of shrinkable material should be dry cleaned. Plain silk or rayon shades can often (but not always) be washed successfully provided they are stitched to frame and not glued. To wash, first remove all surface

dirt with soft brush; then hold by wire frame at top and dip up and down repeatedly in lukewarm suds made from mild soap flakes. Rinse through three or four lukewarm rinses using same up and down dipping motion. Dry very fast, hanging in shade outdoors in warm, breezy weather, or suspending over radiator or stove, using fan to accelerate drying, in inclement weather

and electric refrigeration have nothing to do with it, and there is no known food or combination of foods that have any influence on the cause or cure of cancer." Dr. Cox said.

Cancer can often be cured if liagnosed in time. If the earliest symptoms such as an enlargement or change of color in any mole or wart, bleeding from any body cavity or chronic indigestion with an aversion to meat are heeded as warnings, and early diagnosis is secured, x-ray, radium, or surgery may save the life of the patient.







SENON COLORES HERNANDEZ

Was born in July of 1911 in San Diego, California, the son of the late Fidencio Hernandez and Octaviana Hernandez. From San Diego the family moved to Marathon, where they resided for some time. Later Senon went to school in Fort Stockton for a time and was employed there at the Rooney Hotel by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Downum for six years. In April of 1933 the Downums came to Sanderson to assume management of the Kerr Hotel. "Sammy" accompanied them and was employed by them for ten years. He was inducted into the Army April 19, 1944, at Fort Bliss, Texas, and sent from there to Little Rock, Arkansas, for four months' infantry training. He was stationed at Fort Meade, Maryland for a short time before shipping overseas from New York December 22, 1944. Senon landed in France on Christmas Day and went into combat. On January 11, 1945, he was killed in action, during operations against the German salient in northern Luxembourg. Senon's company was ordered to capture the center section of a small town. He was an ammunition bearer for the mortar section of his platoon and was killed instantly by enemy machine gun fire as he moved up the slope towards the town. Private Hernandez was a member of the 357th Infantry, and is survived by his wife, Mrs. Reynalda Hernandez, and a son.
