

ROGER JULIAN BASSETT

Was born May 9, 1922, in San Antonio, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Julian M. Bassett. The family moved to Terrell County in 1930. Roger attended grammar school in Gila, New Mexico, through the fifth grade, completing the rest of his grade school work in Sanderson. In the spring of 1940 he graduated from Sander-son High School and enrolled in Texas A. & M. the same year. Roger enlisted in the Army Reserve in 1942. On March 23, 1943, he was inducted into the Army at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where he was stationed for two months prior to receiving his appointment to Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia. Roger received his commission as second lieutenant from the school November 23, 1943, and was transferred to Camp Laguna, Arizona. In March of 1944 he was sent to Fort Dix, New Jersey, and on June 20 of the same year Roger was sent from there overseas, landing in England. He remained there for a short time before going into France. Serving in the Infantry with a heavy mortar outfit, Roger crossed France with the Third Army to the Saar River, saw action in Luxembourg and Belgium, and was wounded in the Bastogne vicinity. 1st Lieutenant Bassett, 80th Division, is now in a hospital in England recovering from his second wound received on December 27, 1944. He wears the Purple Heart.





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
