

Daily, more and more doctors and nurses are going into the armed services or into full-time employment with industries so that industrial and defense plants may be kept at peak production. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Without imposing on the family doctor's time for needless calls and attention there is a real necessity for every individual to seek regular medical advice on living habits and for thorough physical check-ups, and it is important to have any illness treated properly," Dr. Cox said, "because if disregarded they may cause more serious trouble without resultant necessity for medical attention.
