



CHICKENPOX AND MUMPS HIGHEST IN SEVEN YEARS

With the incidence of chickenpox and mumps more than 50 per cent higher than records indicate for a seven year median Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, issued a statement today declaring, "It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of measles, chickenpox, mumps scarlet fever, or any other of the communicable diseases of childhood as though they did not amount to much. That sort of treatment makes it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children and their resulting impaired resistance makes them easy victims to other forms of

"Some of the most serious outbreaks of chickenpox which we have had, have been traced to mild cases-that is, to case too light for the doctor to be called. In some instances the children have continued to go to school and to associate and play with other children. In others where they have been kept at home for a few days, they have returned to school and have scattered these germs around among their schoolmates. Even developed from the carelessly handled mild case. The resul was another epidemic that could have been prevented."

The State Health Officer said that the family doctor is the best judge of the seriousness of such childhood diseases, and suffering and anxiety will be avoided if the child is put to bed and a doctor's advice sought and

TERRELL COUNTY HEROES IN SERVICE



AURELIO VELA CHALAMBAGA

Was born November 19, 1910, in Rosales, Coahuila, Mexico, the son of Elisandro and Elvira Chalambaga. In 1920 the family moved to Del Rio, Texas, where Aurelio began school. The Chalambagas moved again in 1922 to Sanderson, and he studied here for a few years before going to work as a sheep shearer. On March 17, 1942, Aurelio was inducted into the Army at Fort Bliss, taking his first training at Camp Barkley. After being stationed there about a year, he went on maneuvers in Louisiana for two months and was moved to camps in Arizona and California for further training. Aurelio left New Jersey for overseas duty in the last of April, 1944, arriving in England in May. He participated in the invasion of France on June 6, 1944, and on July 4 was wounded in action in Normandy and sent back to England for four months hospitalization. He received the Purple Heart for wounds sustained. By October 31 Aurelio was back at the front, fighting in Germany and Luxembourg. During the week of Christmas Aurelio had a short rest before returning to action January 1 of this year. He was killed in action in Luxembourg January 10, 1945. Pfc. Chalambaga served in the 90th Infantry, with Patton's Third Army. His mother, Mrs. Elvira Chalambaga, resides
