Sam Bell, Jr. Among Personnel Praised V-E Day

ENGLAND, VE - DAY—Among the 185,000 men and women of the Eighth Air Force congratulated today by Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, who assumed command of the Eighth in January, 1944, is S-Sgt. Sam K. Bell, Jr., Sanderson, Texas.

'I wish to extend my personal congratulations and my heartfelt appreciation to every one of you for the magnificent job you have done,' Gen. Doolittle said in a message to all personnel.

The Eighth Air Force was the world's mightiest strategic bombing force. Its personnel of 185,000 was the equivalent of 12 infantry divisions, and it could send 21,000 airmen in 2,000 four-engine bombers and 1,000 fighters over Germany at one time, a combat effort possible only through the support of tens of thousands of non-flying specialists.

Since August, 1942, when combat operations began, flying fortresses and Liberators of the Eighth dropped more than 700,000 tons of bombs on enemy targets. Fighter pilots shot down 5,250 Nazi planes and destroyed 4,250 others on the ground. Bomber gunners shot 6,000 German interceptors out of the air.

The Eighth dropped an average of a ton of bombs every minute of the last 12 months. Airmen of the Eighth were the first Americans to attack Germany. The early crews flew a handful of unescorted bombers against the powerful Luftwaffe and proved the feasibility of an American idea—precision daylight bombing over the Reich.

As the Eighth grew, it was assigned the task of crushing the German Air Force, which had to be done before the Allies could invade France. Bombers of the Eighth smashed Nazi aircraft production centers. Its fighters destroyed thousands of enemy planes in the air and on the ground.

After beating the Luftwaffe into relative impotency, the Eighth threw its growing weight against Germany's rail system and vital sources of oil. These campaigns, in conjunction with the British Royal Air Force and the U. S. 15th Air Force, disorganized all transport in Germany, restricted German military operations in the air and on the ground, and paved the way for the march of Allied armies across Europe.

LOOKING AHEAD BY GEORGE S. BENSON

BAITED HOOKS Two years ago when national legislation affecting schools was proposed (S-637), nobody who favored the bill ever called it the "federal school control bill." That alone would have defeated it. No sincere friend of America's public schools wants them bossed by the national government. The thing was referred to always as "federal aid to education." That sounded much better.

Amended by Senate

On the floor of the Senate the "federal aid" bill underwent some changes. As changed, no part of the federal funds there-in provided nor any part of the local funds thereby supplemented could be used to make or maintain any distinction between races. That's federal control, beyond dispute. I am not discussing the merits of the amendment. I am saying this: Federal control will follow federal aid as night follows day.

It is Federal Law

The Supreme Court of the United States, the most powerful tribunal on this war-cursed earth, has established a precedent in favor of federal control. The Supreme Court has ruled that the federal government can control that which it subsidizes. Little, protesting sentences in the preamble of new legislation figuratively fade away in the light of this Supreme Court ruling.

The Entering Wedge

Both bills call for a 300 million dollar annual outlay of federal funds, and it's only a start. Testimony of people who journey to Washington boosting the idea is very clear. It translates the handwriting on the wall. They expect federal aid to grow rapidly after the first bill is passed. I also think it would grow in less than ten years from federal subsidy to federal control.

I am opposed to federal aid therefore for several reasons: (1) It will lead directly to federal control of education. (2) When the national government controls the local schools, the children's parents have nothing to say about what takes place at school. (3) If it happens, popular education, so dearly bought, will be nothing but a handy stepping stone toward political dictatorship. Mr. and Mrs. Raymon Powell returned Tuesday from Waco.

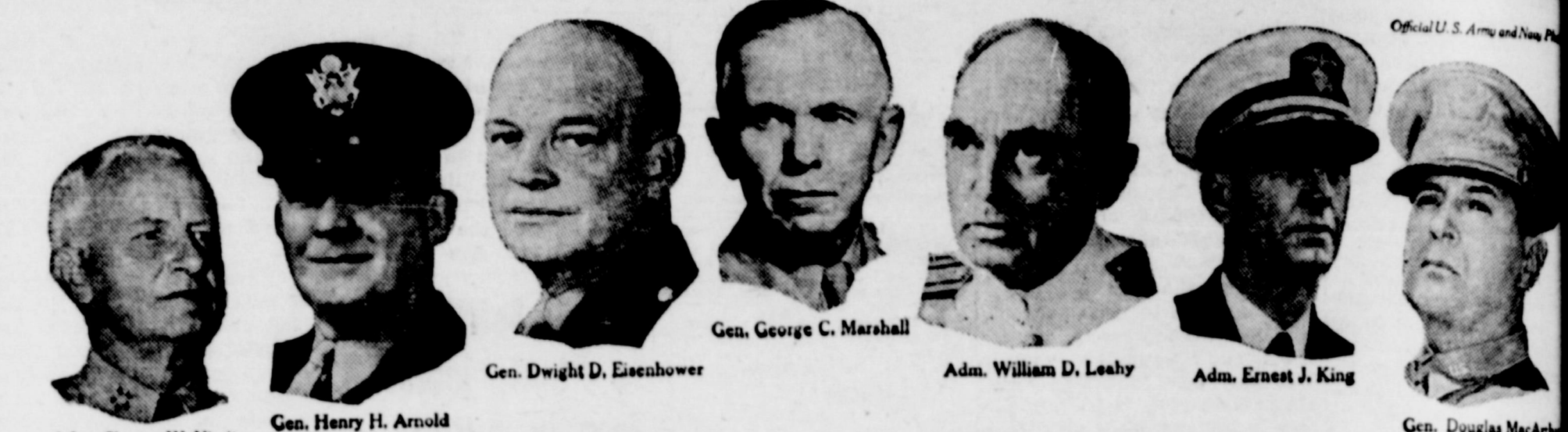

Morales, courageous young matador, has made excellent records in Mexico City the past season, and is highly praised for his art and skill in the bull ring.

These two daring matadors will fight to death four pure Spanish bulls from the famous "Las Playas" herd. The fight starts promptly at 4:00 p. m. Sunday, June 3.

STATE HEALTH FUNDS ARE SHORT, SAYS ASSOCIATION

The Texas Public Health Association in a recent news letter to Texas citizens included an article published in the Texas Dental Journal, expressing concern over the low per capita expenditure in this state for public health. The article follows in part:

"Did you know that Texas ranks 43rd among states in their Public Health Program? Texas with resources of tremendous possibilities indicates exceedingly low interest in taking care of her citizens' health. Texas spends 6.7c per capita on health for her population of 6,500,000. Compared to some of our neighbor states we find—Oklahoma spends 9c per capita; Arkansas, 14 1/2c per capita; Louisiana spends 31c per capita; New Mexico spends 15 1/2c per capita; Mississippi spends 30c per capita; Tennessee spends 23c per capita. And Texas spends—look at it, 6.7c per capita.

"The Legislative appropriations for public health in Texas in 1944 amounted to \$507,758.00—\$37,150 for fees collected. Appropriations request for a suitable program of public health in Texas for 1945 amounts to \$1,563,167.00. Recommendation of the Board of Control for the Health Department for 1945 has cut this to \$537,481.00. In other words, the Department of Public Health has surveyed the needs and requested a minimum of a million and a half with which to properly care for the public health. The Board of Control has recommended an appropriation of only half a million to care for a population of six and a half million citizens. This is about on the same basis as was needed thirty years ago (What was good enough for grandpa must be good enough for us.)

"Salaries allowed in the Health Department by legislative direction are not sufficient to attract and hold the type of personnel desired. Every good employee of this Department is serving at a sacrifice. Texas is responsible for the deaths of 8,466 babies under one year during 1943 and we have no funds appropriated to correct this. 443 mothers died from childbirth and no funds are appropriated to help prevent this sad and unnecessary loss. 3,287 deaths occurred from tuberculosis in Texas in 1943 and Texas refused to appropriate one cent for tuberculosis control program. We have a tuberculosis institution in the state with many beds vacant, yet our streets are crowded with advanced cases of tuberculosis. 1,740 cases of typhus in Texas and 55 deaths in 1943 but no funds appropriated by the Legislature for control. Texas reported 5,557 deaths in 1943 from cancer and your Public Health Department has no STATE appropriated funds for fighting this disease. 245 county health officers and about 600 city health officers demanding biological products for immunizing children and adults against disease, but Health Department laboratories inadequately staffed to meet demands to provide complete immunization material because of insufficient funds."

The end of the war in Europe was no surprise to Pfc. Clay McIver of Winters, Texas. In a long-range prediction, he hit VE-Day right on the nose!

In March of 1943, the Texan made his prediction, and wrote it in a book in a London service club. More than 2,000 other soldiers also wrote their predictions, but McIver was the only one to ring the bell.

And another Texan has predicted that the war with the Japs will not end until the fall of 1946. He is a man who knows a lot about the Nips, too, for he spent three years in a Philippine prison camp before being freed after the American liberation of Luzon.

Capt. BUSTER EARL EDWARDS

Was born November 17, 1908, in Juno Texas, the son of W. R. Edwards, El Paso, and Mrs. Effie Edwards, Seattle, Washington. In 1913 the family moved to Comstock and later to Del Rio, where Buster attended school. Before being inducted in the service, Buster was employed in construction work at the Dryden airport. He went in the Navy November 21, 1943, at El Paso, and was sent to San Diego, California, for boot camp training. After a five-day leave in January, 1944, he returned to San Diego and shipped out there the following March. Buster has participated in action on Saipan and in the Central Philippines invasion, and is now at Okinawa. He is a member of the crew serving on the USS Saranac, which received a unit citation for the action at Saipan, when the tanker was bombed June 17, 1944. Edwards holds the rank of coxswain, and wears two Battle Stars. His last leave came in July of 1944. Mrs. Zena Edwards, his wife, and his three children, Anna, Bobby, and McNiell, reside in Sanderson.
