Lt. (jg) A. F. Thomson, Regional Enrolling Officer for the 10th Area of the United States Maritime Service was notified today by the Medical Section of National Headquarters that the physical standards for apprentice seamen enrollments has been modified to permit the enrollment of men with a minimum weight of one hundred and twenty (120) pounds. 

LOUIS FERRELL WOODWARD

was born October 15, 1922, in Fort Stockton, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fonnie Woodward, Sheffield, Texas, who moved to Terrell County in 1925, making their home in the northeast part of the county. Louis attended school for three years in Sanderson, finishing his grade and high school years in McCamey, where he graduated in 1940. Afterwards he attended Sul Ross College at Alpine for two years, volunteering for service in November, 1942. Louis got Infantry training Fort Benning, Georgia, and Columbus, South Carolina, until August 6, 1943, when he shipped overseas from Boston, landing in Iceland August 12. After eight months in Iceland, during which time he was given Ranger training and did security patrolling, he went to England in April of 1944 and saw action in France, Belgium and Germany. Seriously wounded January 18, 1945, Pfc. Woodward returned to the States May 7 of this year and is at present at McCloskey Hospital, Temple, Texas. He served with the Second Infantry Division and wears the Purple Heart
