> Following is an excerpt from the letter: "Since the town of Sanderson is unincorporated and has no sewer system or garbage collection facilities, we understand that it will be very difficult to promote sanitary measures in a community where people may not cooperate by maintaining a strict sanitary program. Everybody should be urged to take the typhoid vaccine and all open toilets should be cleaned and made fly proof. Ashes and lime should be used. Flies must be kept away from food and proper sterilization should be provided for dishes. It is advisable to try and locate the typhoid carriers in the community Specimens should be taken especially from those who have the disease during convalescence in order to determine whether or not they will continue to carry the disease. Such specimens then should be sent to the State Health Laboratory for study."

Modern Machinery





Before Albert entered the service, he was engaged in the ranching business. In November of 1944 he was inducted at El Paso, Texas, and sent to Camp Roberts, California, for basic Infantry training for approximately four months. After a furlough in February, 1945 he went to Fort Ord, California, and soon shipped out for overseas duty. For a while he was stationed in the Hawaiian Islands before moving on to Guam. Albert was with invasion troops landing on Okinawa. On June 6 Pfc. Appel was reported wounded in action. The following day, June 7, he was reported as having died of wounds received.
