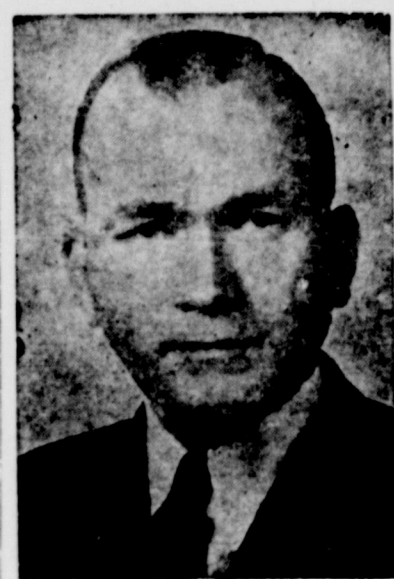

Announce Gathering Of Peace Officers For Conferences

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 18 (Sp.)—Signs of returning gangsterism will be studied by law enforcement officers of the San Antonio FBI Field Division and additional plans devised to cope with any potential crime wave when officers meet in nine conferences during October and November. M. W. Acers, Special Agent in Charge of the San Antonio FBI Office, announced here today.

The conferences are scheduled at the following places: Kerrville, Oct. 23; Brady, Oct. 24; Caldwell, Oct. 26; Eagle Pass, Oct. 30; Laredo, Oct. 31; Brownsville, Nov. 1; New Braunfels, Nov. 6; Temple, Nov. 8; and Austin, Nov. 13.

Acers, who will lead the discussion on "Signs of Returning Gangsterism," said, in announcing the conferences, that gangsterism has shown signs of revival during the war. "There have been gang wars in places where they used to thrive," he said. "Hijacking, shake-down rackets, black markets, and bootlegging have been on the increase."

Another feature of the program will be a lecture and actual demonstration on "Testifying in Court." This portion of the session, which will include a hypothetical courtroom trial will be handled by Special Agents James C. Kennedy, and J. Vernon Tuckey.

Special Agent Jack Dillard will discuss "Confidence Men and Their Methods of Operation," explaining the various rackets including the race horse game and stock swindles, used by the scores of confidence artists operating in this country.

Commodities To Be Marked "OPA Price"

Shoppers may see the words "OPA Price," instead of "Ceiling Price" on many of the commodities they buy now, Carl B. Cochran, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, has been advised by Arthur Boaz, commodities and services officer of the San Antonio district Office of Price Administration. This price may be shown either on the commodity itself or on its container or wrapper.

This action extends to all goods subject to individual marking requirements, the board chairman continued. It will affect many types of textiles, apparel, furniture, house furnishings, household appliances, and many reversion goods. In fact Cochran added, these tags will be on most of the things consumers buy, with the exception of food. It does not apply, however, to those goods that the manufacturer has already ticketed.

Victor Salinas Dies In Del Rio Hospital Of Gunshot Wounds

Funeral services were held Wednesday, October 17 for Victor Salinas, age 29 years and nine months.

Salinas was killed Monday in Comstock when a gun being examined by another man was accidentally discharged.

He resided in Sanderson for a number of years, but at the time of his death was employed in Comstock.

Dr. Randall Urges People to Call For Their X-Ray Records

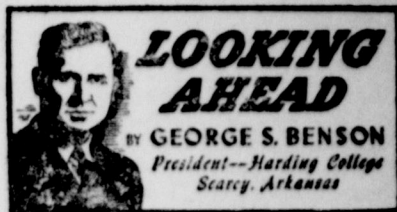

JUNGLE FEVER

When a man loses the right use of his mind, his friends put him in a state institution, but when a whole people start turning imbecile they commit themselves to the tender mercies of government. That, in one sentence, is what I think about the so-called Full Employment Bill, already passed by the Senate and scheduled for early consideration by the House.

If our congressmen saddle upon government an obligation to provide jobs for everybody, they will be saying, "We represent a commonwealth of incompetents, unable to take care of themselves." America's vast resources, enormous productive capacity, trained minds, skilled hands and huge markets will be nothing if our people lost their initiative, self-reliance and self-starters.

Men Have Spines

God in His wisdom meets out privileges and duties in proportion. No man and no nation can revel long in liberty and shirk the accompanying responsibilities, for human freedom is a gift from above. Much responsibility for the future of civilization hangs on the American people; we may be glad our liberties are many. This is no time to flop in an armchair among the old world's decadent tribes.

What supports the idea that government ought to (or can) guarantee jobs for everybody? Answer: Warped notions brought to America by immigrants from the backward lands of Europe and Asia. Those "cases" can't quit thinking that citizens must serve the state instead of the state serving the citizens. They actually imagine that rulers can think better than other people.

Poisonous Insects

Foreign philosophies, carried quietly through schools, shops and playgrounds, have poisoned the minds of American boys and girls under their loving parents' very eyes. It is a matter that long ago demanded attention. When our soldiers landed on Guadalcanal they met Japanese attack from land, water and sky, and they overcame it. But the tropical bugs did more damage and quietly.

Insects with bills like hypodermic needles, hardly big enough to see without a glass, seemed like irritants of small consequence. But they turned out to be more dangerous than the man-size enemies. Their noise was small, their wounds were negligible, but they planted a venomous pestilence in the blood stream, extravagant of life and ruinous to the moral of those who survived.

There is a Cure

How parallel to Guadalcanal has been the defense of representative, constitutional government on the home front. The deafening weapons of the Axis powers failed to destroy this republic. American ingenuity, sharpened by hope of achievement; American skill, whetted by ambition to advance; America's power to produce, fused in the furnace of open competition: They won the war.

These same things will not cure the plague of poisoned minds however. That's another problem. Helplessness, dependence on the state and false economy are like tropical fever—in the blood. If it has penetrated all the way to Capitol Hill, if we enact federal law encouraging the malady, then the case is serious indeed. The fate of the Full Employment Bill will determine whether the United States is becoming imbecile.

WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

THE FORT STOCKTON PIONEER—Appropriation of \$105,000 for purchase of site and construction of a federal postoffice building in Fort Stockton is included in a list of recommended Public Buildings Branch by the Federal Works Agency, Mayor G. C. Moses was informed by letter Tuesday from Congressman R. E. Thomason.

Recommendations of the federal agency would depend upon appropriation of funds by Congress, and subsequent approval of the more urgently-needed projects in Mr. Thomason's district, and he advises Mayor Moses that no action can be expected soon, but that he would assist in every way to obtain this needed community improvement.

THE ALPINE AVALANCHE—Rains which started in the Big Bend-Davis mountains area Sept. 23 and have continued almost daily since have probably set a new high in precipitation for this time of the year in this far-west Texas country, it is believed, with a total of 5.10 inches for the period, according to the weather bureau records at Sul Ross college.

Ranchmen say that the rangelands are soaked as they haven't been in many years at this time of the season and the moisture will be of inestimable value through the coming winter.

The moisture in the immediate Alpine area has ranged from slow soakers to hard downpours the heaviest measuring 1.36 inches in the 24-hour period ending at 7 a. m., Tuesday of this week. It was the first moisture of note since August when only 2.18 inches was recorded here for the whole month.

THE BIG BEND SENTINEL, Marfa—Highland calves have again showed superiority and an Illinois 4-H Club youth is as proud of the showing as is Mrs. Wert Love on whose Presidio county ranch the steer calves were bred.

Mrs. Love has received information telling that the Grand Champion of the McHenry County, Ill., 4-H Show, held in August, was a Love steer calf which she sold last year. Bernard Johnson of the Huntley Boys 4-H Club was the exhibitor.

Another Love steer calf was second place winner in the show held at Woodstock, Ill.

THE UVALDE LEADER-NEWS—Slow, beneficial rains have fallen over this entire section of the State this past week and with a few days of good warm sunshine will put this country in excellent condition.

In Uvalde the rainfall for the past week was 1.34 inches bringing the total for the month to 4.54 inches, according to Harry Carper, United States weather bureau observer. The average normal rainfall for the month of October is 2.37 inches.

It was reported that good rains fell in the northern and eastern part of the county. Good rains were also reported in Farris community. Montell reported around 1 1-2 inches.

Rains reported from surrounding towns include Carrizo Springs 7 1-2; Crystal City, 2 1-2; Asherton, 4 1-2; Cotulla, 5; Del Rio, 3; Eagle Pass, 2; and Rock-springs, 1 1-2 inches.

Give him better light for easier seeing

Eighty-seven per cent of what a child learns he absorbs through his eyes. That's why good light for home study is so important.

For safe, easier seeing for your child do these four things: (1) Make sure bulbs in his reading or study lamp total at least 100 watts; (2) see that lamp is properly shaded to prevent glare from exposed bulbs; (3) place lamp close enough to work area for maximum light; (4) have enough general room illumination to prevent harsh contrasts of bright light and deep shadows.
