Fire of Unknown Origin Destroys Buff Cafe Saturday Night

A fire of undetermined origin completely razed the Buff Cafe last Saturday night. Starting in the rear of the cafe, the fire had gained considerable headway before it was noticed and the alarm turned in, about 8:30 p. m. The cafe had been closed only a short time and all employees had left about 8 p. m.

Volunteer fireman fought the blaze for more than 2 hours before they could get it under control and confine it to the building. The brick building occupied by the Brookshire Barber shop, the Princess theatre and the Whistler Drug was at no time in immediate danger as fireman kept the roof well soaked with water and the rest of the building was practically fireproof.

The building that the cafe occupied was an old land mark in Sanderson having been erected here in the early part of 1900. It was owned by Jim Kerr while the cafe was owned and operated by Frank Laura who had several weeks previously purchased same from George Turner of Balmorhea.

It is understood that insurance covered the building as well as the cafe contents. Sunday afternoon about 6 o'clock firemen were again called to a fire that was a short way off Highway 90 west, when in some manner, a pile of old discarded tires were set on fire.

ONLY THE FIT SURVIVE

Many persons have the curious notion that larger businesses have no problem of survival that they are beyond the hazards of competition and depression. This notion is a grim joke to those who have witnessed the unremitting effort that goes into keeping some of the country's leading enterprises going.

An address by the head of a well-known chain retailing organization at a meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce reveals a few of the post-war headaches of retailers. Among other things he touched on the personnel problem of his company with the comment that "wartime conditions played havoc with the retailers' regular sales force. Enlistments and departures to war jobs were tremendous. In our company alone over less and poorer service to our customers."

"Today we must rebuild our sales forces—with our returning veteran employees and by training new and promising sales people. We must bring back, as soon as possible, the courteous and efficient service the public requires and is entitled to and which the retailer must give if he is to succeed in business."

Here is an established retailer, that the uninformed would assume held an entrenched position, and yet he speaks of what he must do if he wishes to succeed—he knows he must please consumers. Could there be any more reassuring evidence of the healthy competitive conditions existing in the distribution? Certainly such words belie the old-fashioned crepe hangers who think they hear the crack of doom whenever anyone mentions chain stores.

TOMORROW MAY BE TOO LATE

Those who own their own home in this period of inflated values and housing shortage are very fortunate. But a large percentage of them have become overly complacent. They own their homes, yes. Yet they neglect to adequately protect themselves in case of fire. The fire insurance industry is making a concerted effort to impress upon all home owners that fire insurance policies should be checked periodically to see if they reflect current values. In the last few years property values have risen 30 to 60 per cent or more. A home that was fully insured ten years ago is probably not much more than half insured today. If it is destroyed by fire, the owner would awaken to the sickening realization that replacement on the strength of his outdated insurance would be impossible.

So don't procrastinate. Appraise your insurance policies immediately. Don't jeopardize the most important element of security for yourself and your family—your home.

People buy insurance for protection. Fire insurance companies would be subject to criticism if they did not warn the public when inflation undermines that protection.

STAY ON YOUR SIDE

Out on the highway there is painted line. It is the line that separates life from death; happiness from despair; safe driving from dangerous driving. It is the line that goes down the center of the highway.

Stay on your side and live. Thousands annually cross over that line and meet death or serious injury. Statistics show that passing another automobile out on the highway is one of the most dangerous things a person does.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer makes a timely plea when he calls for strict observation of highway markings and signs. Traffic volume is already well above prewar peaks in Texas, tire and car shortages notwithstanding. It will soar further upward as new cars get on the road. Authorities predict the nation's 1946 death toll from motor accidents will pass 38,000 unless motorists can be persuaded to assume more cautious driving habits. At the predicted 1946 death rate, only seven years will be required for motor vehicle accidents to kill as many Americans as were killed in World War II from Pearl Harbor through V-J Day.

It will be as impossible to remove defective cars from our highways overnight as it will be to rebuild all highways overnight to conform to the most advanced safety standards. It is up to the driver in 1946 to overcome the defect in his car and in the highway, in addition to reducing the number of accidents attributable to the driver himself.

While enjoying the beautiful Texas landscapes adjacent to our highways, may each driver alert for those yellow signs which warn him of danger. May he stay on the right side of the center stripe and never attempt to pass another vehicle when the dashed line is on his side.

Safety is one of the battles of peace. It will be fought by every person who gets under a steering wheel. His weapons are caution and never-ending practice of a few simple safe driving rules. How well he uses these weapons will determine which is the more fatal: the battles of war or the battles of peace.

Questions—Answers

Q. In reinstating a National Service Life Insurance policy that has lapsed, is a veteran required to take a physical examination?

A. Veterans who have let such policies lapse may reinstate them without taking a physical examination if they submit a signed statement to the Veterans Administration that they are in as good health as at the time of the lapse. This provision will remain in effect until January 1, 1947.

Q. May a guaranty of loan be secured from the Veterans Administration to buy an automobile?

A. Yes; but only if an automobile is necessary and if to be actually used in the conduct of a business or a farming operation.

Q. How does a veteran apply for weekly unemployment allowances?

A. Application should be made at a local office of the United States Employment Service. Discharge papers must be presented at the time of application.

Q. How may application be made for hospital care of a veteran?

A. Veterans Administration Form P-10, which may be secured at all VA offices, should be completed and forwarded to the nearest Veterans Administration office.

Q. Can a seeing-eye or guide dog be secured from the Veterans Administration for certain blind veterans?

A. Blind veterans who are entitled to disability compensation or pension for a service-connected disability are entitled to seeing-eye or guide dogs.

Q. Must a veteran have experience in business to get a guaranty of loan for business purchases?

A. The ability and experience of the veteran, and the conditions under which he proposes to pursue such occupation, must be such that there is reasonable likelihood he will be successful.

The ruling and instructions were given out by the Texas Department of Public Safety and warns all motorists that they must have with them at all times their drivers licenses when they are driving cars, buses, trucks or any motor vehicle on the Texas Highways.

Following are the instructions that were received by Mr. Townsend.

"You are instructed that when you stop any automotive driver, for any violation, or for any reason, and find that they do not have a valid operator's license to drive said vehicle on Texas Highways, you will file a case in the proper Judicial Court, for failure to have a valid license in their possession.

The Statute involving the operator's license has been in force for some length of time and every Texas operator has had proper notice and opportunity to have in their possession the proper operator's license."

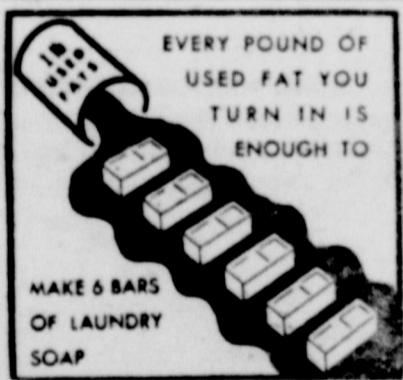
