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THE CONFUSED GIANT

Amazement and concern is felt throughout the world at the spectacle of endless confusion besetting the United States.

The reasons for this country's confusion are a collection of little acts that add up to a mighty destructive force.

As an illustration of the process consider a few newspaper items of the day. From Coos Bay, Oregon, appears the notice of the mayors of seven communities holding a conference to consider the possibilities of public electric power.

Until this basic conflict is resolved one way or the other America will continue to be a confused giant, increasingly unable to supply his own needs.

SIGNIFICANT

The controversy between socialized medicine and private medicine has become explosive again in Congress as committee hearings get underway on the Wagner-Murray compulsory health insurance bill before the Senate Committee of Education and Labor.

Dr. Lowell S. Goin of Los Angeles, past president of the California Medical Association, has expressed his views in advance of his appearance before the committee. He points out that "In every nation where compulsory health insurance has been adopted, since it was first conceived in lock-step loving Germany—politics has played havoc with the progress of medicine."

"Every person who values his health—should—oppose this step toward bureaucratic regimentation—and substitution of the state doctor for his family physician."

"No matter what safeguards may be written into compulsory health insurance legislation when government collects the money, and pays the bills, doctors, for all practical purposes become government employees and the private practice of medicine will end."

What the doctor tells in three brief paragraphs is monumental in significance in a country which has proven that individual initiative and endeavor are the inspiration for progress and accomplishment.

A GOOD RECORD

The War Finance Division of the Treasury Department in a letter to a national food chain organization praised retail distributors for the part they played in selling war bonds.

Not only in war bonds but in other aspects the amazing efficiency of the national distribution system did much to preserve peacetime customs and conveniences for consumers.

Yes, retailers, chains and independents and every other type, have good reason to be proud of the record of the distribution industry.

INTELLIGENT PUBLIC POLICY NEEDED

With the grim experience of war fresh in everyone's mind the first thought when "strong railroads" are mentioned is national defense. The war could have been disastrously lengthened by failure of rail transportation.

A few railroad tax statistics bring home with a shock the dependence of the community upon the railroad as a source of tax-income—let alone jobs. The school taxes paid by the railroads enable more than a million children to go to school.

What is meant by strong railroads? The real strength of a railroad lies in its management its earning ability, the efficiency of its personnel.

If this country wants strong railroads in the future, public agencies representing the 135,000,000 people having the most at stake in the railroads must make sure that conditions over which the railroads have no control—competition, taxation, regulation—are adjusted so as to treat all forms of transportation alike and fairly.

OZONA STOCKMAN—Reorganization of the Ozona Parent-Teachers Association, inactive during the present school year, was accomplished at a meeting of interested parents and teachers held Monday afternoon in the high school auditorium.

The group, called to consider the reorganization question voted unanimously for reviving the association, effective with the opening of the 1946-47 school term next fall.

FT STOCKTON PIONEER

A committee was named Wednesday for the Fort Stockton Lions Club to study the possibility of erecting a permanent memorial honor roll listing the names of Fort Stockton or Pecos County members of the armed forces in World War II.

Two types of memorials are available—plastic construction for an indoor roll, or bronze for permanent out-of-doors erection. W. E. Lawrence, W. P. Rooney, G. C. Moses and M. E. Fincher were appointed on a committee to study the question and report to the club.

The Club also voted to sponsor an appearance here in June of R. C. Suran, agent in charge of the El Paso office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Highlight of the program will be the initiation of American Legion candidates by a San Antonio degree team Sunday morning during the joint session of the Legion and Auxiliary. It will be the first time an initiation has ever been staged in Eagle Pass.

Such a state highway would provide an airline route from this section into the Big Bend Park, since it would connect directly at Marathon with the main state highway leading to the national park, only one in Texas.

BIG BEND SENTINEL—Long on the expression by members of their opinions and short on organization and formality, the Business Men's Forum—a discussion group for men—recently had its inception in Marfa and has scheduled a meeting for the first Monday evening in each month. The next one will be May 6 at 7:30, at the Marfa Civic Center if that building is available at the time.

THINGS TO CHECK

—before calling an electric refrigerator serviceman



Sometimes a needless service call can be avoided if a few simple checks are made first. Not infrequently the cause of unsatisfactory refrigeration is a simple thing that can easily be corrected. If trouble develops, check these points before calling a refrigerator serviceman:

IF REFRIGERATOR UNIT DOES NOT RUN:

- 1 Check to see if plug is making contact in wall outlet. 2 If plug is making contact in outlet, check outlet with light cord and bulb to see if current is on. 3 If current is not on at outlet, check for blown fuse in housefuse panel.

IF MECHANISM RUNS TOO MUCH:

- 1 Make sure door seal is tight. 2 Clean the condenser. 3 Temperature control may be set for too cold a temperature. 4 Refrigerator may need defrosting.

IF MECHANISM RUNS . . . but there is little or no refrigeration:

- 1 Stop mechanism by turning off switch or removing wall plug. 2 Allow all frost to be melted off cooling unit. 3 Start once more and see if cooling unit gets cold.

IF IT TAKES TOO LONG TO MAKE ICE:

- 1 Check temperature control. It may be set on warm position. 2 Too much frost on freezer unit may be retarding cold-making.

If your check-up fails to relieve the trouble, then call a serviceman without delay. Servicemen are busy now and will be extra busy during the midseason rush. You'll save possible inconvenience and food spoilage later by having needed repairs made now.

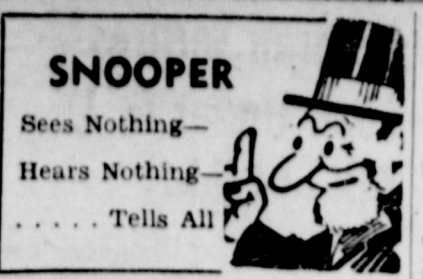

Scholastic Record For Terrell County Shows Slight Drop

Editor's Note—We are indebted to Mrs. Berta Clark Lassiter, Principal of the Lamar Ward School, for the following interesting article in regard to our scholastic record for Terrell County.

Do you know how many children there are in Terrell County who will be six and under eighteen years of age on September 1, 1946? There are 798. That is four less than a year ago. Why? Because Terrell County was lucky in March 1945 for at that time the Brown-Root Construction Company was operating out of Sanderson. Within a year Terrell County had 87 scholastics to move from this district. As before stated a number of these were children of parents who were with the construction company while the remainder moved for the usual reasons, change of employment and new homes.

The 798 scholastics are divided three ways, 280 Anglo-Americans, 517 Latin-Americans and one Negro. The only family registering as many as seven was the Manuel Celaya family. This family has twins who are 17 this year, so the Celaya family will lose the distinction of furnishing so many scholastics in 1947.

If you have never taken census, then you have never had the troubles that we had, keeping records straight. For instance, there are three children named Raul Flores. Not a child had a middle name or initial until the teachers gave them one. Two of the "Rauls" are in the sixth grade this year. But what stumped the census taker was when twins were handed in with the same name! Both named Maria and born January 14, 1939. However, the mother finally gave some enlightening information, to one Maria was added "de la Luz" and to the other, "Ampara". The family name with the greatest number of children listed under it is that of "Flores." There are 29 Flores children. Some of the Flores children spell the name with a "z" at the end while others use the "s". And children vary in the spelling using the different spelling at different times to suit their moods.

Several letters of the alphabet have no listings, the "is", the "qs", the "us", and the "xs". The letter "C" has the total of names, 79. The letter "G" has the greatest number of Latin American names, 54, and the letter "C" has the greatest number of Anglo-Americans 34.

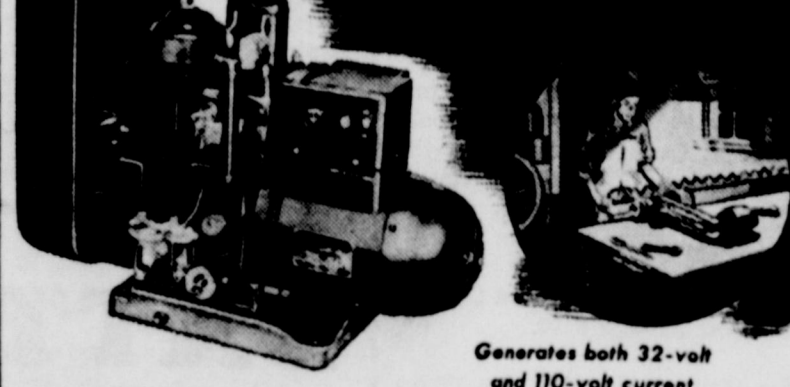
