

"Through city, county or state health departments doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of ex. The State Health Officer emphasized the fact that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration returned from a 3-months trip However, there is no limit to the that included Florida, Nassau number of times it can be used and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June or July.
