

A REDUCED COMMERCIAL ELECTRIC RATE for Sanderson Users

We are pleased to announce a new all-purpose rate for commercial users of electricity which will result in substantial savings to customers of this class.

Under the new schedule, all electricity used by a commercial establishment will be billed under this single all-purpose rate instead of under the four different commercial rates used in the past (commercial lighting, commercial heating and or refrigeration, small power, and awning and display lighting. The most substantial savings will accrue to commercial lighting users, although all commercial customers will enjoy benefits from the new rate.
