Another pioneer resident of Sanderson and Terrell County has passed on with the death on last Wednesday of Lee Grigsby, 72. His body was returned here that afternoon in a Doran Funeral

A native of Montague County Texas, Mr. Grigsby was born on November 7, 1873 and spent his early life in that County. For 16 years he was foreman on the Tom Shaw and J. K. Burr ranches near Eagle Pass and for four years, prior to moving to Terrell County, he was in the U. S. Custom Service, being stationed 3 years in Langtry and one year in Presidio, Texas. Dr. Geo. W. Cox Offers Suggestions In Curbing Polio

Austin, Texas, May 23, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomeylitis which is now occuring in certain sections of the State.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis may be another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control For County and District Clerk: measures must include cleanup campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes County Judge: and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be aspal sewage disposal systems are sured. Where adequate municinot in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary spetic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should, under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be closed immediately
