Lee Grigsby Succumbs Wednesday in Del Rio

Funeral Services Conducted Here Friday Morning

Another pioneer resident of Sanderson and Terrell County has passed on with the death on last Wednesday of Lee Grigsby, 72. Mr. Grigsby became ill Tuesday morning and that afternoon he was rushed to a Del Rio hospital for medical treatment, where he died Wednesday morning. His body was returned here after noon in a Doran Funeral Coach.

A native of Montague County, Texas, Mr. Grigsby was born on November 7, 1873 and spent his early life in that county. For 16 years he was foreman on the Tom Shaw and J. K. Burr ranches near Eagle Pass and for four years, prior to moving to Terrell County, he was in the U. S. Custom Service, being stationed 3 years in Langtry and one year in Presidio, Texas. He was a 32 degree Mason and a member of the Methodist Church. A resident of Terrell County for 33 years and of Sanderson for 29 years, he was during that time employed in the Water Service Department of the T. & N. O. Railway, retiring in November 1943.

On September 6, 1900, he was married to Miss Elsie Bowles, of Eagle Pass, who survives him in addition to four sons, three grandsons and a grand-daughter. The sons are Gerald Grigsby, Sanderson; Lee Roy Grigsby, McCamey; Ervin and Walter Grigsby, Sanderson; grandsons are Harold Lee Grigsby, McCamey; Francis Grigsby, U. S. Marine Corp., and Willie Grigsby, Sanderson; granddaughter, Sarah Pat Grigsby, Sanderson; all of whom were here for the funeral services. Other survivors include 2 sisters, Mrs. Van Bell and Mrs. Lewis Stamper, Carrizo Springs; 5 brothers, Owen O. Z. and Bonner Goodwin, Carrizo Springs; Will Goodwin, San Antonio, and Ezelle Goodwin of the U. S. Civil Service.

Services were held on Friday morning at 10 o'clock from the Methodist church with Rev. John Klassen, of Ft. Sumner, N. M., former pastor of the church, conducting the services, assisted by Rev. J. M. Hendrix, present pastor, and Rev. John W. Byrd, Presbyterian Minister. A mixed choir from the various churches sang hymns, and Mesdames Seth Davenport and L. D. Hasty sang solos. Interment was in the Cedar Grove Cemetery under the direction of the O. T. Sudduth Funeral Home. At the graveside the local Masonic Lodge held their burial services.

Fulfilling a request, recently made by Mr. Grigsby, his four sons, Gerald, Lee Roy, Ervin and Walter, and two grandsons, Harold Lee and Francis, carried his casket from the hearse to the graveside. Active pall bearers were Jim Nance, Sam Harrell, Ernest Jessup, E. McSparran, Simon Shaw Jr., and Sims Wilkinson.

Clean-Up Drive Now in Progress In Sanderson

Sanderson citizens are urged to clean up their premises, removing all places that are apt to breed mosquitoes and flies, and to clean off weeds, check outdoor toilets and cess pools, in a clean-up campaign that is being sponsored by the members of the Lions Club and the Sanderson Culture Club.

The first of the week handbills—both English and Spanish, were distributed over the town under the sponsorship of the above two clubs and in which Dr. J. W. Pate, county health officer, requested that all outbuildings and premises should be cleaned, all cess pools closed, and that all garbage be covered, thus to rid the town of flies and mosquitoes and to control possible source of infection.

To prevent an epidemic here proper sanitation is essential and every one should take every precaution possible and see that their places are clean. Breeding and feeding places of flies and mosquitoes should be obliterated. Frequent spraying of such places with DDT is helpful.

The County is getting a supply of DDT and a crew of men are now, and have been busy for the past week, going over town spraying outhouses, cess-pools and garbage dumps and any place that looks as tho it is a breeding place for flies or mosquitoes.

Prevention of polio or similar types of epidemics in Sanderson in 1946 can only be averted by a joint and wholesale clean-up campaign and keeping Sanderson clean and in a sanitary condition.

Dr. W. D. Craddock, prominent physician of Ft. Stockton, was seriously injured late Saturday afternoon, when the plane he was soloing in, crashed at the Webb Townsend ranch headquarters.

Dr. Craddock had circled over the Townsend ranch house several times and Mr. and Mrs. Townsend were out in the yard waving at him. He banked the plane to make another circle, when it evidently hit an air pocket, crashing nose downward. Some difficulty was encountered in getting Dr. Craddock out of the plane.

His injuries consisted of a badly lacerated forehead and both legs were broken, as well as suffering from back injuries.

Dr. Craddock was taken in the Sudduth ambulance to Ft. Stockton and from there he was rushed by plane to Dallas, where he is in a hospital.

Late reports are that he is doing fairly well despite his very serious injuries.

Railroad Here Out On Nationwide Strike

At 4 p. m., Thursday local Trainmen and men, employed by the T. & N. O. Railroad here, went out on strike. Immediately all rail traffic was at a standstill.

Passenger train, No. 2, arrived here at 7:25 p. m. and was held here and early morning all passengers were transported by bus to San Antonio.

Transport buses having left during the night from the Field to transport the passengers. Passenger trains, Westbound, and No. 6, were run only as military trains carrying only military personnel who were traveling on orders.

Friday there was no train as to when the strike would be settled and the men to their jobs.

The second walk-out of men, as on last Saturday, went out and it was several days before the men received word here that the strike had been deferred for five days. At that time there was a temporary disruption of railroad service, but by early Sunday morning trains were again running on schedule.

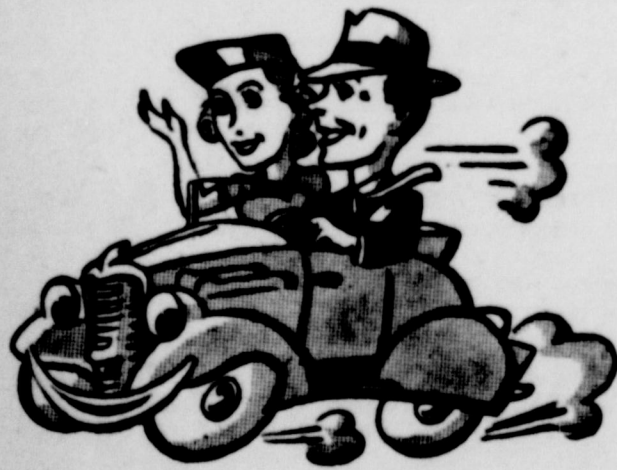

Dr. Geo. W. Cox Offers Suggestions In Curbing Polio

Austin, Texas, May 23. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is now occurring in certain sections of the State.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis may be another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must include clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal water supply is not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should, under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be closed immediately.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitary standards.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theaters be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.
