Train Schedule Changes Made Effective June 2

New and faster train scheduled of the Southern Pacific Lines serving Sanderson went into effect on last Sunday June 2.

The Sunset Limited, both eastbound and westbound, will have every seat reserved. No ticket will be sold for either train unless a seat is available. I. G. Robertson, acting agent, announced this week.

Since the trains are limited, no stops of the eastbound train will be made between here and Del Rio nor between Del Rio and San Antonio. If space is available tickets will be sold for Del Rio, or San Antonio or other points east where scheduled to stop.

On the westbound trains, if seats are available tickets may be purchased for Alpine or Marfa and to El Paso and points west, where scheduled to stop.

The westbound Sunset Limited will arrive in Sanderson at 7:40 a. m., and leave at 7:50 a. m. The eastbound Sunset Limited will arrive in Sanderson at 7:00 p. m., and depart at 7:10 p. m.

Changes have also been made in the schedule of the local trains, No. 5 and 6. The eastbound Sunset Limited will arrive in Sanderson at 7:00 p. m.

Changes have also been made in the schedules of the local trains, No. 5 and 6. The eastbound train No. 6 will arrive here at 5:40 a. m. and depart at 5:59 a. m. The westbound train No. 5 will arrive here at 12:05 a. m., and depart at 12:20 a. m.

Train No. 5 will handle local express and will have on it a mail clerk. Train 6 will also handle local express and has a mail clerk on it.

On trains 1 and 2 only perishable express will be carried and mail only in pouches will be handled.

DEL RIO FIGS SHIPPED TO DETROIT BY AIR LINES

An experimental shipment of brown turkey figs to Detroit was made Tuesday over the Texas Airlines.

Half a bushel of the Del Rio figs, packed in a corrugated container, were shipped to the Aunt Mid Corporation in Detroit as an experiment to see if the fruit will stand the trip. From Del Rio the figs went to Houston and from Houston they were placed on a transport bound for Detroit.

The figs were from John Quaila's farm.

If the shipment is successful, Jas. C. Nettis, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said, as much as 100 bushels daily may be shipped from Del Rio by air.

OZONA STOCKMAN—Guy Fortenberry, who served two and a half years as animal husband-man at the El Paso Valley Experiment Station near Isleta, and experienced in the work of a county agent, last week assumed his duties as Crockett County agent, it was announced by County Judge Houston Smith.

Mr. Fortenberry succeeds Tommie Stuart, resigned, in the combination office of county agent and veterans service officer. In addition to his duties as county agent, serving the county's agricultural industry and heading 4H Club work in the county, Mr. Fortenberry will assist and advise veterans in applying for benefits under the GI Bill of Rights or any other problems with which they may be confronted.

ALPINE AVALANCHE—R. C. Mitchell, teacher of vocational agriculture in the Alpine schools for the past five years, announced his resignation yesterday. He will return to his former home near Lubbock where he and his brother will take over the operation of a large irrigated farm owned by their father.

During the five years "Mitch" has been here as VA teacher the Alpine FFA chapter has established a nation-wide reputation winning many top honors of the state and nation. It has won the state chapter contest four consecutive years and was selected as a top chapter in the nation for the last two years, on the basis of its accomplishments and those of its individual members.

FT STOCKTON PIONEER—Long-awaited steel fire escapes for the Fort Stockton High School and Elementary School buildings finally arrived at the two buildings.

The fire escapes were ordered last year, but delivery could not be obtained until the school term was at an end.

EAGLE PASS GUIDE—The Maverick County Water District's proposal to issue \$3,100,000 in new bonds passed by a large majority in the election Monday, even though an unusually light rate was cast. It was announced today by Sam Schwartz, Walter District president.

Of the 204 qualified voters who cast ballots in the election, 188 favored the issuance of new bonds, and 16 voted against it.

HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 6—Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports during summer months was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with beaches and commercial pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted. Swimming close to a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

The three federated civic clubs of Marfa, namely History Club, Century Club and Marfa Study Club were hosts for the meeting which had its headquarters in the Methodist church.

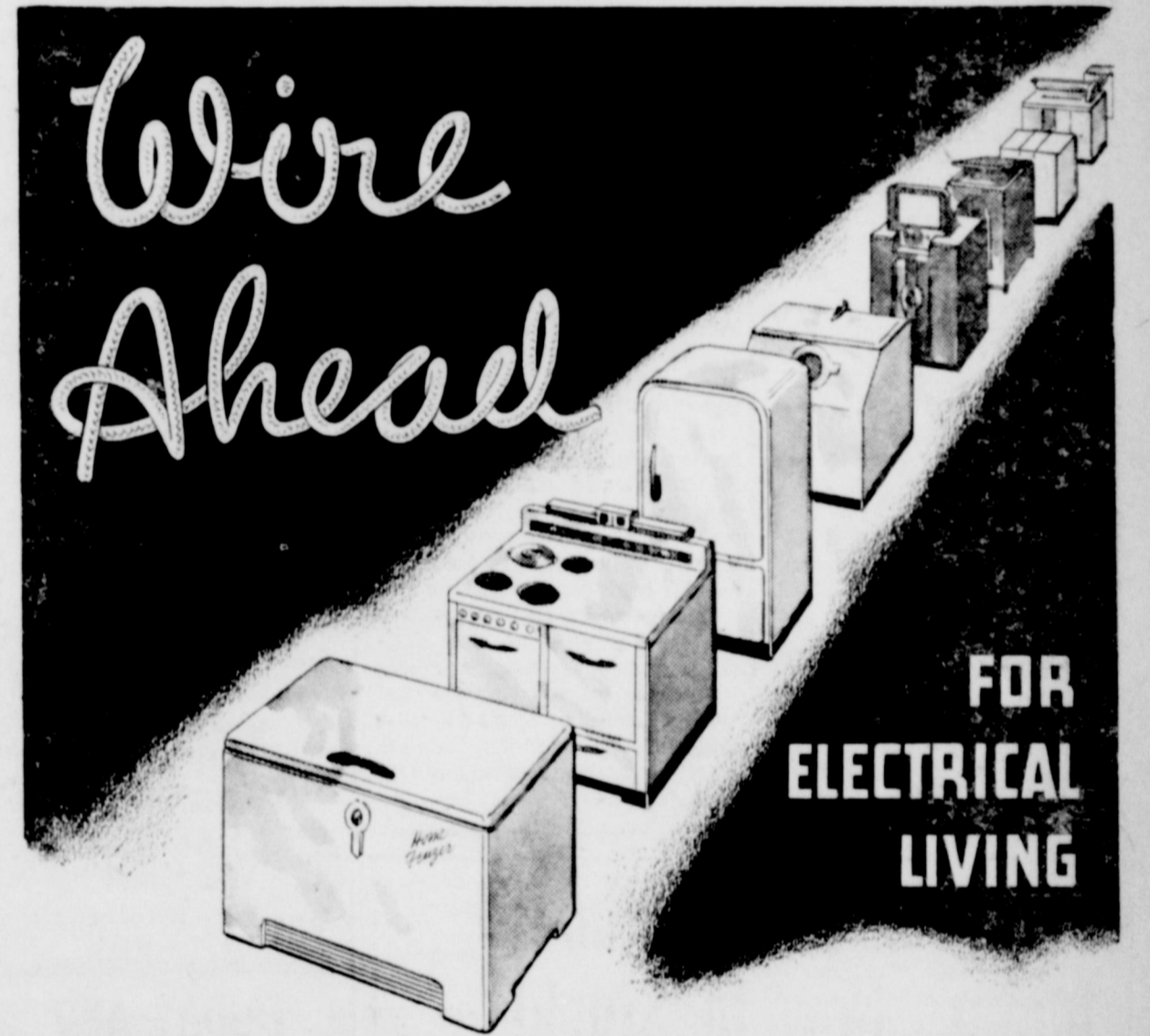

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DDT After Shearing Gives Almost 100% Fly Protection

Almost 100% protection was secured from fly and screw worm infestation in fresh-shorn sheep through use of DDT as a spray in an experiment conducted by Malone and C. C. Mitchell on their ranches between Fort Stockton and Sanderson.

Interest among ranchmen has been intense in the outcome of the tests, and County Agent W. T. Posey has checked results and reports that in 9,000 sheep sprayed with a DDT solution, each ranchman found only 1 sheep—or 2 in the entire lot—affected by worms. A neighboring ranchman reports he has treated worms in at least 50 head from a smaller flock which was doped in the conventional manner with smear on the cuts. Thirty lambs sprayed only with DDT after docking, some with worms already, healed without further treatment.

Cattle sprayed with DDT were free of flies from three to five weeks. There was no apparent difference in results obtained with oil or water base DDT, and the cost was about the same. Cost of treatment per head averaged 8¢ both for sheep and cattle.—FT. Stockton Pioneer.
