

The old Comstock-Sanderson line, which was the first toll line, and the only toll line out of here at one time, is being replaced with a new line, which will follow the highway. The old toll line has been in use many years, at least 25 years. and was erected by Robert W

With the comppetion of this new line, Mr. McAdams states that a better rural service will be given for Dryden. The new line is being put on to the polls that carry the toll line to Del Rio. Formerly the old line cut across the mountains and was very hard to get to when trouble developed along the line. The Frank Harrell ranch and the Roger Rose rnch will still be on the old rural line, Mr. Mc-Adams stated.



War Department Names Honor List Of Dead and Missing

The first consolidated listing of Army dead and missing in World War II-a compilation of the names of nearly 310,000 men and women who gave their lives in the Nation's servicewas released by the War Department on Thursday, June 27, 1946. The list, made up in booklet form, was received by the Times office on last Saturday. The figures are for the Army only.

Texas Army men dead and missing totaled 15,764, making the Lone Star State standing the sixth greatest loss of life in the Nation. Total Army dead and missing for the nation is 308,978

The list was made up of fifty booklets, one for each state, one for the District of Columbia, and one for the Territories and Possessions of the United States. Each booklet contained a foreword, explantory of the methods of listing, a breakdown by counties and types of casualty, and an alphabetical listing by county of the name. serial number and grade of each indivitual and the manner in which he met his death.

In releasing the booklets, the War Department pointed out that the listing was a preliminary one, and might, because of its scope contain errors which would be corrected when determined. In adition to possibility of error in preparation, it was emphasized that misinformation often is given unintentionally by an individual when he enters the service such as a mistaken identification of his home county, and other inaccuracies are from time to time apt to be introduced into the individual's record.



EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM SHOULD SERVE COMMUNITY

Termite Menace COLLEGE STATION, July 5-

Termites are found in every section of Texas and do as much damage in this state as elsewhere in the nation, according to Charles A. King, Jr., entomologist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who is recommending a vigorous war against these undercover agents.

It is especially important now to conserve lumber and other cellulose building materials necessary for repairs, remodeling, and essential construction, he points out. Termite damage in the nation is estimated at 37 million dollars every year.

The next few weeks termites still will be swarming, which makes them easy to discover. Termites are what is known as white ants and can fly during the swarming season. Later they lose their wings. The pests form concealed canals in which they travel and can eat away wood until "you'll step through the dining room floor before you know they're around," King warns.

If infestation is discovered consult local county Extension Service agents on control, King advises. Measures also are listed in Farmers Bulletin 1911 issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Where new construction is planned, King recommends LOST-Saturday night in front these precautions: Remove all of Western Union, a pair of wood or cellulose materials gold rimmed glasses. Reward from the building site. Don't for return to James House. Itc. place any untreated timber in contact with the ground. Make NOTICE-No swimming in tanks sure there is at least 18 inches nor trespassing on any of our of clearance under buildings property bordering on Highway which don't have cellars, base- 90 ments, or concrete slab foundations. Provide good drainage and cross ventilation under buildings of frame construction. Allow at least two feet of screened opening for every 25 pitch. Inspect for termites at Hotel. least twice a year.

Study Made On Veteran Adjustment To Campus Life

AUSTIN, Tex., July 5-Eight University of Texas sociology students completed a survey on how the veteran has adjusted himself to the campus life. The work was carried on under the direction of Dr. Harry E. Moore, associate professor of sociology.

Some of the facts and conclusions determined by the survey have been announced. Thirty per cent of the veterans are from 21-22 years of age Chances are 72 out of a 100 that the veterans' education was interrupted by his service. Onethird of the veterans are married and of these, two-thirds married during the war. Only 16 per cent live on their government allotments; the majority of those who do not do so supplement their allotment from savings.

The veteran, according to the survey, wants people to cease thinking of him as a problem child, wants to be a civilian and treated like one, wants to get an education, a job, marry and live a normal life. He is remarkably free from "the world owes me a living for what I have done" attitude. Yet at the same time he wishes the government would see fit to be more generous in allotments.
