Near-Record Vote Cast Here

Beauford Jester Polls 165 Votes; Rainey and Sellers Get 138 Each

More than seven hundred votes were cast in Terrell County in the Democratic Primary which was held last Saturday. This is one of the heaviest vote ever to be cast in a primary in this county. Voting was steady in this precinct all during the day and at no one time was there much delay in waiting for booths to clear so that voters might cast their vote.

In the race for U. S. Senator Tom Connally led the race receiving a total of 473 votes in the county, with Floyd E. Ryan receiving 33; A. B. (Cyclone) Davis 30; Laverne Somerville, 8, and Terrell Sledge, 26.

Beauford Jester, candidate for Governor, received the most votes in that race, his total being 165 votes. Homer P. Rainey and Grover Sellers were second high, each receiving a total of 138 votes. Other candidates and the votes received were: Shaw, 5; McNutt, 2; Smith, 67; Hutchinson, 5; Brinkley, 1; Minton, 1; Sadler, 49; Burks, 3; Brown, 0; March, 16.

For Lieutenant Governor, Allan Shivers carried the County receiving a total of 236 votes; House, 97; Mills, 61; Winfree, 122; and Walker, 35.

George H. Sheppard received a total of 491 votes for comptroller of Public Accounts; and Butler received 81.

In the State Treasurers race Jesse James, incumbent, polled 441 votes to 121 for Williams, his opponent.

In the Attorney General race Pat M. Neff Jr., carried the county, receiving a total of 414 votes to 169 for his opponent Price Daniels.

W. W. Sudduth was re-elected as chairman of the Terrell County Executive Committee, receiving 22 votes, and his brother, O. T. Sudduth received 3. Neither one were candidates for the office.

C. P. Peavy was elected as Democratic Chairman for precinct 1; Chester Smith for precinct 2; H. A. Couch, precinct 3, and in precinct 4, L. G. Arledge. Commissioners elected in the other precincts were as follows: precinct 2, Dryden, E. B. Carson; precinct 3, Sid Harkins; precinct 4, C. M. Turk. All are present Commissioners and had no opponents.

Justice of the Peace elected for precinct 2, Dryden, was Lee W. Russell, who received 6 votes in a write-in campaign. Others receiving votes and whose names were written in were: Archie Milam, 3; Jim Powers, 1; J. J. Russell, 2.

J. J. Russell received 6 votes for Constable, Precinct 2; Dan Ross, 1; Bob Phillips, 1; John Williams, 1; Lee W. Russell, 1.

In precinct 3, Clarence Jessup received 2 votes for Justice of the Peace; C. H. Arvin, 1; J. M. Corder received 3 votes. All names were written in.

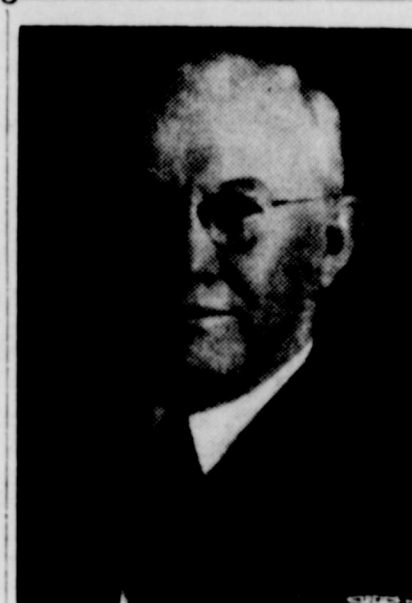

Army Recruiting Caravan to Be Here This Month

The U. S. Army recruiting service display "caravan" from El Paso, Texas will be in Sanderson, Texas on 3, 4, 5 of August. This caravan operated by the recruiting service is designed to interest young men in service in the peacetime army.

Included in the caravan will be a display of captured enemy small arms including machine guns, and interesting display of pictures of the Atom Bomb, with samples of the fused sand caused by the first Atomic explosion.

Technical Sergeant Jenks in charge of the caravan will show free movies to the public each evening. In addition to moving pictures, there are many historic and interesting photographic displays. These films will be shown each evening at the High School Auditorium commencing at 8 o'clock.

A special sound broadcasting unit has been installed in the caravan, and the public will be given a concert of the latest tunes, classical music, and novelty items.

Sergeant Jenks and his assistants in the huge silver and blue trucks will be available to young men in the regular army.

The army is now in the midst of a drive to enlist a million volunteers, and has not passed the three-quarter mark.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of

the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for

the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicles registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at

which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five hundred (\$5,000,000) Dollars, much thereof as may be necessary, if hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such public election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary to exceed Seventy-five thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency action by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday of November, A. D. 1946, at which ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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HEALTH NOTES—

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 1 "From a health standpoint children are not ready to enter school until they have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox."

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, reminds parents who expect to enroll their youngsters in September, "Many school districts make vaccinations an entrance requirement, and children who have never been vaccinated, and also those vaccinated in babyhood, should be taken to the physician for vaccination now, so that the scar will be well healed before school opens."

Immunization against diphtheria is also strongly recommended for further protection. Parents are urged to have their children protected from diphtheria by immunization with toxoid. Children who had this protection in infancy should receive a booster dose before entering school in order to maintain immunity at a high level.

"These two types of protection against disease should be considered 'musts' for preschool children," Dr. Cox declared. "Any other immunizations that the physician may recommend will, of course, provide additional health security."

In addition to this protection against specific communicable diseases each child getting ready to enter school should also receive a complete physical examination by his private physician or at the nearest clinic. Any treatment or correction of defects advised by the doctor should be undertaken immediately in order that the child may enter school in the best possible physical condition.

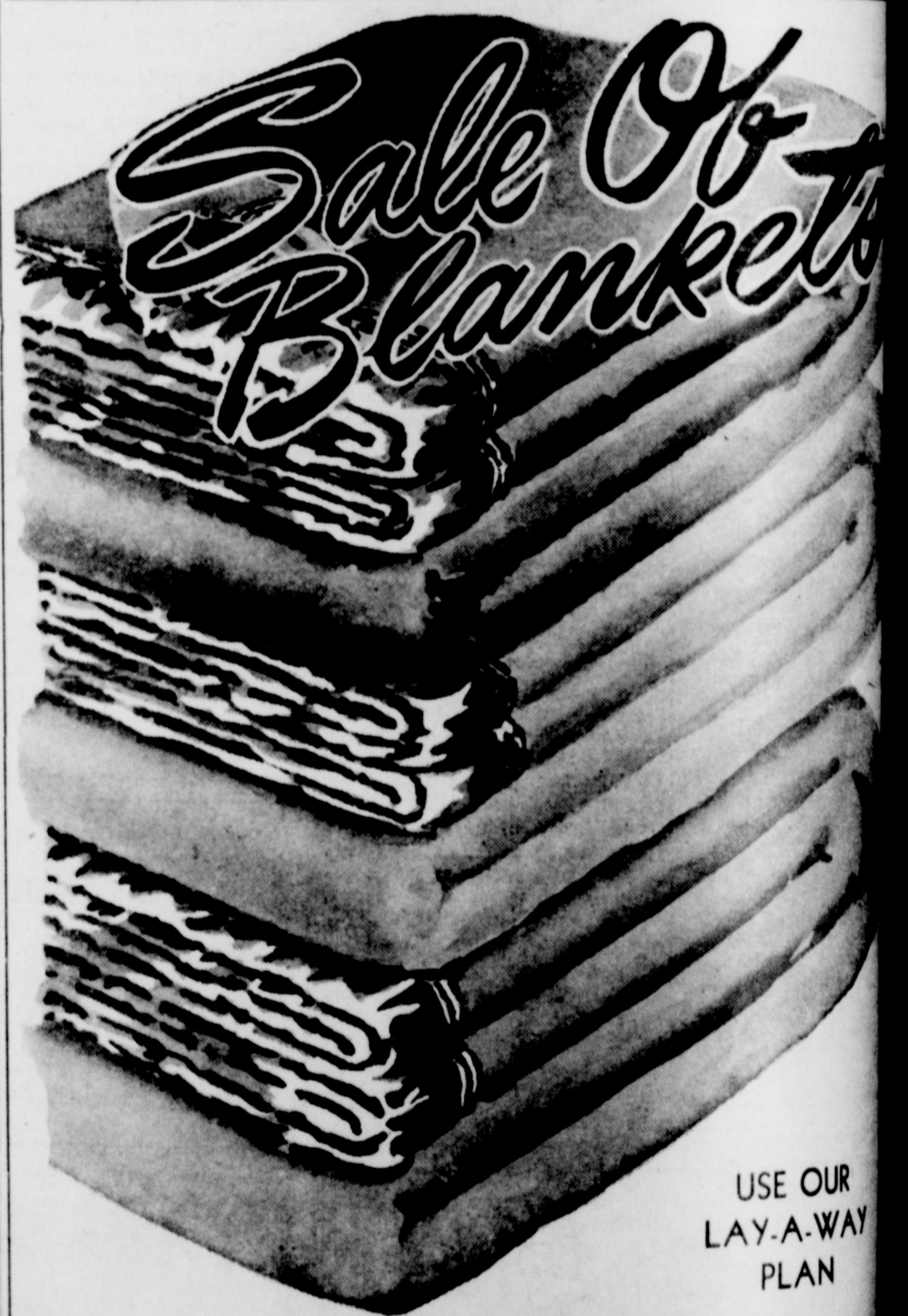
