## Regular Term of District Court Now in Session

### Only One Criminal Case Is Scheduled For Trial at This Term

The regular term of district court opened here Monday morning with Judge Brian Montague, of Del Rio, presiding. Other court officers in attendance are Roger Thurmond, district attorney, Mrs. Belle Sutherland, court reporter, both from Del Rio. Local officers in attendance were J. S. Nance, sheriff, J. M. Hayre, county attorney and Marvin Allen, deputy county clerk.

As there was no business to be considered by the grand jury, that body which had been summoned for Monday did not meet, having been notified in advance for their consideration.

The only criminal case on the docket, that of W. H. Bricker charged with rape, took up the attention of the court. Most of the three days were required to get a jury in the case.

Late Wednesday afternoon when the court had recessed only nine jurors had been accepted out of a total of 61 men that had been summoned for the regular petit jury service, and as special veniremen. A special venire of 20 men were summoned to appear at 9 o'clock Thursday, and by noon that day the twelfth juror had been selected.

Evidence in the case started at two o'clock Thursday afternoon, with both the defense and the State having several witnesses to be placed on the stand.

Jurors accepted to hear the case included: J. W. Leatherwood, Campbell Kerr, Albert Weigand, W. W. Sudduth, Gene Thorne, Bill Benchoff, James Word, W. T. Shurley, John T. Williams, Ruel Adams, O. C. McDonald and Elton Loden.

The defense is being represented by Morris and Morris, attorneys of San Antonio, while the State is being represented by district attorney Roger Thurmond assisted by J. M. Hayre county attorney.

It is expected that hearings in the case will take up the rest of the week with a chance of it going to the jury maybe sometime late Friday.

There are very few civil cases on the docket, most of them being divorce cases, with several being continued by operation of law, and some to be heard this week. One divorce was granted that of Lee Allen McBee, vs Dottie Lee McBee. The plaintiff, Lee McBee was granted a divorce and the maiden name of Dottie Lee Dourghile granted defendant.

The following civil jury cases have been set for hearing in September:

Helen B. Odum vs Geo. R. Tucker Est., set for trial Monday Sept. 9, 1946 at 10 a. m. Attorneys for the plaintiff will be Morris and Morris of San Antonio, while representing the Geo. Tucker Estate will be Collins Jackson and Blanks, Scott Snodgrass.

A. F. Fitzpatrick vs Oscar B. Bendele, title as for damages has been set for Wednesday Sept. 11, 1946. Boggess and Lowery, attorneys of Del Rio will represent the defendant.

In the civil case of Stuart Henderson vs J. J. Russell, suit for interest in land and livestock, order was signed as per agreement by parties, and charging the receiver to surrender to J. J. Russell and G. E. Hall all lambs now in custody of receiver.

### Competitive Exams Scheduled in August By Merit Council

The Merit System Council serving the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, the United States Employment Service, and the State Department of Public Welfare, is announcing August 17, 1946, as the date for competitive examinations for ten different positions for which qualified workers are urgently needed in these State agencies. The positions for which examinations will be given are Claims Examiner III, Claims Examiner IV, Field Worker, Child Welfare Worker, Stenographer I, Stenographer II, Junior Stenographer, Apprentice Clerk-Typist and Clerk IV. The entrance salaries for these positions range from \$1380 for Junior Stenographer to \$2046 for Field Worker. Meritorious service in these positions may be awarded by increases in salary and promotions in rank.

Persons interested in these examinations may obtain application blanks at their local United States Employment Service, Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission or State Department of Public Welfare offices, or by writing to the Merit System Director, 808 Tribune Building, Austin 21, Texas. All applications must be filed in the Merit System office or post-marked before midnight of July 30, 1946.

#### ON VACATION TRIP

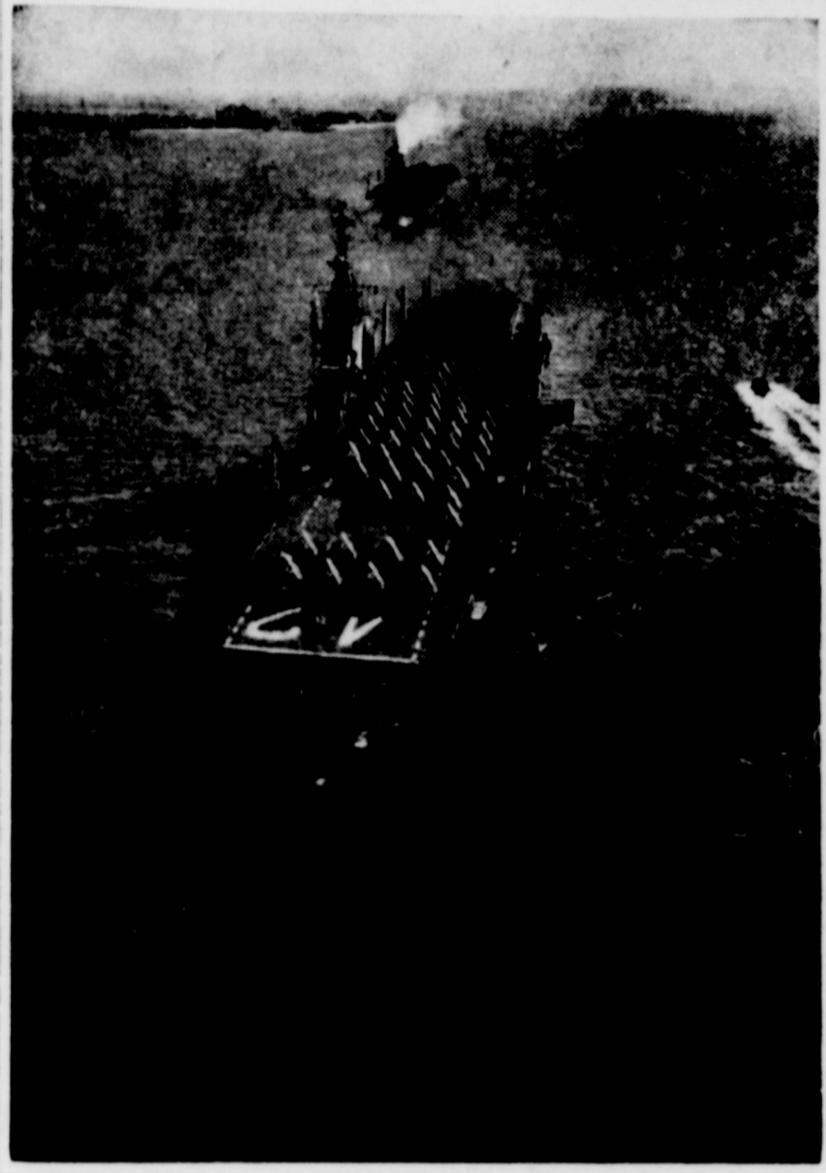

The horse racing committee for which it is made up of Frank Jones; Billy Crews, Dell Renfro and Mannie Fowlkes, well known in the highland section.

This is the first year that horse racing and the colt show have been a part of the rodeo. Billy Crews of the racing committee has said that an electric starting gate is available for the races and it has been decided that extensive work will be done to put the track in such shape that owners of horses will be encouraged to match their animals.

Colt show arrangements are being handled by Tyrel Smith Haynes Mitchell, and J. S. Livingston. Tentative plans are that only yearlings and two-year olds will be shown.

Sellers Bros., Del Rio, are to furnish the rodeo stock and to be in charge of the arena. Prizes totaling \$2,320.00 have been set up in the following contests: Bareback bronc riding—\$320; Bull Riding—\$400; Wrestling—\$400; Team-Tying—\$400.

### Thomason Secures Information On Big Bend Park Plans

Congressman R. E. Thomason had a conference with the Director of the National Park Service with reference to development of Big Bend Park and received the following information as to the program which is planned in this respect.

The 1947 program will include \$25,000 for maintenance and improvement of existing roads and approximately \$20,000 for survey of new roads.

The tentative program for 1948 includes \$350,000 for road constructions; \$200,000 for cabin development; \$15,000 for road maintenance and \$100,000 for physical improvements.

There have been 25 cabins recently made available in addition to those already in operation.

### No Absentee Ballots For Run-Off Yet

Although absentee balloting was slated to begin Monday, no ballots are available in Sanderson, deputy clerk Marvin Allen stated Thursday.

**ALPINE AVALANCHE**—The commissioners court deferred action in awarding a contract for the courthouse enlarging-modernizing program, scheduled to have been let Monday, until a future date as no acceptable bids were received. It was stated this week.

Negotiations with prospective bidders will be carried on in the meantime in an effort to secure a bid that meets the commissioners' and architect's approval. It was stated.

Eight new offices will be added and the entire building modernized under the plan the commissioner have approved.

**BRACKETT NEWS MAIL**—With the completion of the Laguna road as a farm-to-market thoroughfare, this county now has most of its roads in the all-weather group. Three highways—90 East, 90 West and the Eagle Pass highway—are paved all the way thru. The Rocksprings and Laguna roads re topped thru a large part thereof. Highway 90 was recently given a seal coat.

### HEALTH NOTES

**AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 25**—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is appealing to young women high school graduates to seriously consider the public health nursing profession as a career, when entering school this fall.

"Public health nursing\* offers young women opportunities for lifetime careers which are highly useful and satisfactory. Demands for professional nurses now exceed the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said. "Possibilities of travel, varied experience, income, and other features of the profession compare very favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 37 schools in Texas and enrollment is now under way for fall classes, which open about September 1. All schools still have vacancies. Applicants should be graduates of high school or have some college credit, with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of high moral character. An interest in people and their problems, also ability to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Prerequisite training in public health nursing includes a 36 month course including vacations. Medical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, psychiatric and communicable disease nursing are studied. Completion of courses entitles the individual to the diploma of the School and to take State Board Examinations leading to the R. N. Certificate.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurse's organizations and local health departments, as well as the Texas State Department of Health.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of

the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof\*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roads; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at

which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roads; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof."

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicles registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roads, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roads, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at

**A JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seven Thousand (\$75,000.00), Dollars, so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of building on the campus of college pursuant to debt authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary to exceed Seven-thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN LETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN LETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, of such thereof as may be necessary, if hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such publication and election.

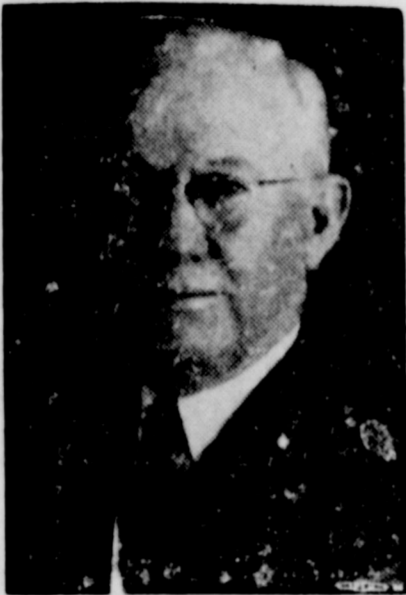
W. Cox, State Health Commissioner, is appealing to young high school graduates to consider the public health nursing profession as a career when entering school.

CANNING RECIPE FOR PEACHES GIVEN BY EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

COLLEGE STATION, July 25—In selecting peaches for canning or other methods of preservation, color and texture of skin are sometimes misleading, for the best tasting peaches ripen from the seed out. Gwendolyne Jones, food preservation specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says that peaches of the finest quality have a fresh appearance and when broken open are thoroughly ripe around the seed as well as under the skin.

Care must be exercised with ripe peaches, as they deteriorate quickly and should be canned as soon as possible after picking. If they must be kept for several days, cold storage at 36 to 40 degrees F. is the best method for holding them.

A standard bushel of peaches weighs about 48 pounds and should yield about 30 No. 2 cans or pint jars, or 20 No. 3 cans or quart jars. This bushel of peaches, if a light syrup is used, will need about three pounds of sugar. For a light syrup, to each 3 cups of water use one cup of sugar.

Corn syrup or corn sugar may be substituted for part of all of sugar. One cup of sugar and two cups corn syrup to six cups of water makes a desirable thin syrup. Brown sugar or syrups that have strong flavor are not desirable for canning. Honey may be used to replace a small part of the sugar, but it affects the flavor of the fruit more than corn syrup. Never use saccharin in canning as heat makes it bitter. If used at all, add when the fruit is served. Miss Jones advises consulting a doctor before using it, because too much saccharin may be harmful.

For complete instructions on canning peaches, ask the local county home demonstration agent for a copy of C-224, Can Fruits in a Water Bath or write the Extension Service, A. and M. College, College Station, Texas.

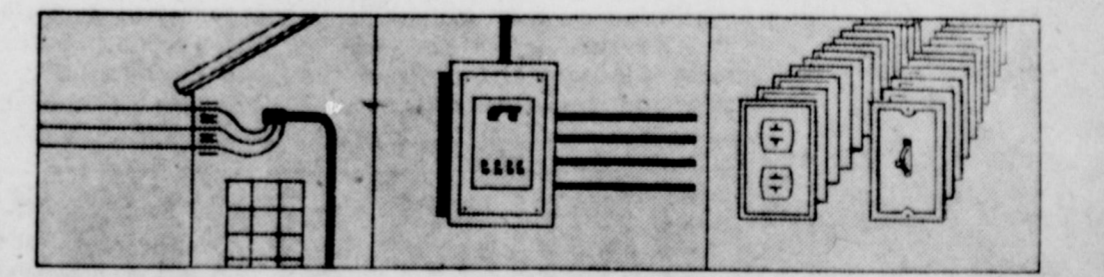

H. J. R. No. 62 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereof.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be

prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State

Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

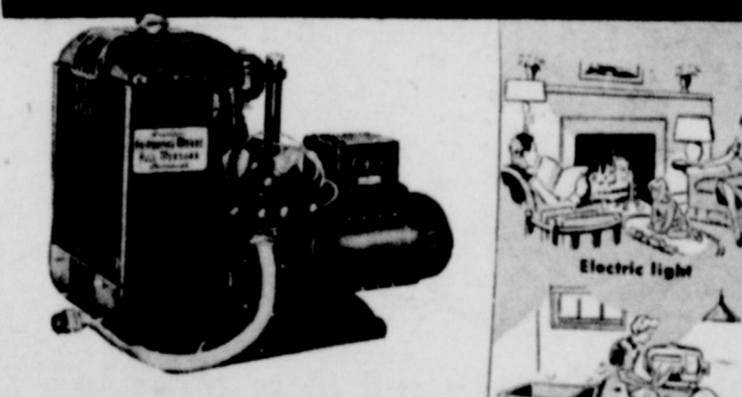
