One Killed and Two Injured in Train Wreck

Work Train Crashes Into Rear of Freight

As a result of a rear-end collision of two freight trains at Fedora, a T. & N. O. section about eight miles east of here, early Monday morning, Harry Arfman, engineer, was instantly killed, and his fireman, George Strothers, and the head brakeman, C. T. Davis, were injured. Both trains, at the time of the collision, were headed east and were traveling thirty minutes apart.

The wreck occurred at 6:58 a. m., and main line traffic into here was tied-up for more than three hours.

The first freight, out of here at 6:15 a. m., was first 244 as a local with Fred Matthews as engineer and Joe Bailey as the conductor. It had stopped at Fedora to pick up a water car and had switched the car onto the train and was on the main line between the switches. The second freight was a work train out of here with Arfman as the engineer and E. O. Elmore as conductor. It left here at 6:45 a. m., and had 17 cars of slag.

As a result of the collision, several freight cars were demolished and overturned blocking the main line. So great was the impact of the engine into the rear of the first freight that Arfman was thrown off the steps of his engine. The fireman and head brakeman jumped before the crash occurred.

Soon after word was received here of the accident, the O. T. Sudduth ambulance was rushed to the scene, as well as Dr. J. W. Pate, local physician, Sheriff Jim Nance and Justice Peace Hal Rowlett. Following the inquest, the injured crewmen, Strothers and Davis, and the body of Arfman was taken to Del Rio, their home. Other members of both crews of the trains, were residents of Del Rio also.

The wrecker service of the T. & N. O. was dispatched out of here shortly after the wreck occurred and have been busy for several days clearing up the wreckage and removing the demolished cars.

Jury Returns Verdict of Not Guilty in Bricker Case

Only Criminal Case Scheduled For This Term

A verdict of "not guilty" was returned by a jury here late Tuesday night in the case of W. H. Bricker, charged with rape, which had been tried at the regular term of District Court.

The case had occupied the attention of the Court for the past week as it was set for trial on Tuesday of last week and more than two days were required to secure a jury which was completed by noon Thursday of last week. The regular petit jury, a special venire had been exhausted and a second venire of 20 men had to be summoned before the jury could be completed.

Jurymen selected to hear the case were: J. W. Leatherwood, Campbell Kerr, Albert Weigand, W. W. Sudduth, Gene Thorne, Bill Benchoff, James Word, W. T. Shurley, John T. Williams, Ruel Adams, O. C. McDonald and Elton Loden.

Examinations of witnesses was started last Thursday afternoon and late Saturday, after a number of witnesses, both for State and Defense, had been heard, Court recessed until Monday morning. Hearing of evidence in the case was completed late Monday afternoon, with both the State as well as the Defense having a number of witnesses on the stand.

Most of Tuesday morning was taken up with preparing the charge to the jury, which was given to them that afternoon around two o'clock.

Arguments in the case was presented to the jury first by County Attorney Jack Hayre, for the State, followed by Will A. Morris Sr., and his son Will A. Morris Jr., both of San Antonio for the defense.

At the night session held Tuesday, District Attorney Roger Thurmond, of Del Rio, closed the arguments to the jury, addressing that body for more than an hour. The jury filed from the court room at 9:35 p. m. and after being out an hour and ten minutes they brought in their verdict of "not guilty." John T. Williams was foreman of the jury.

Court recessed here Wednesday afternoon until September 9th at which time, it will convene and try several civil cases set for hearing commencing on that date.

Funeral Services For Harry Arfman Held in Del Rio

Funeral services were held in Del Rio Tuesday afternoon at 6 o'clock in the Doran Funeral Home, for Harry Arfman, 55, railroad engineer. Rev. Calvin W. Froehner of the First Methodist Church officiated at the services and burial was in Westlawn Cemetery under the direction of the Doran Funeral Home.

Arfman, a native of Del Rio was instantly killed early Monday morning in the collision of a freight and a work train at Fedora, a T. & N. O. siding eight miles east of here. He suffered a fractured skull and numerous abrasions.

Arfman was born March 22 1891, in Del Rio, Texas, the son of Henry and Katie Sturm Arfman. He attended school in Del Rio and Castroville before going to a business college in San Antonio.

A locomotive engineer, he was appointed fire chief and fire marshal of Del Rio January 13 1932, during the depression, and served in that capacity for several years until he resumed work on the railroad.

He married Miss Lizetta Schweers June 24, 1914, in Hondo, who survives him. Other survivors are two sons, a daughter and a grandson. The sons are Harry Arfman Jr., who is attending A. & I. at Kingsville after returning from the European Theatre, where he had been a prisoner of the Germans, and Lt. (jg) Harold Thomas Arfman, serving with the Navy in the Pacific.

The daughter who survives is Mrs. Douglas Newton and the grandson is Douglas Newton Jr. Mr. Arfman was well and favorably known in Sanderson and his untimely passing is regretted by his numerous friends here.

New Fire Truck Purchased This Week for City

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department is the proud possessor this week of a new fire truck which was driven in Tuesday afternoon from Ft. Sam Houston, where it was purchased on Monday of this week from the War Assets Administration.

The truck, a 1½ Ton Ford, is completely equipped with all standard equipment and is in first class condition. It has been driven only a little better than 600 miles, with more than three hundred miles of that total being put on it in delivering it to Sanderson. The tank capacity of the truck is 600 gallons.

Entire cost of the truck was \$1106, which is a bargain as it came fully equipped, and should one been purchased through other channels, the chassis alone would have cost more.

With the two fire trucks that the Fire Department now has, the Volunteers will be well equipped and able to fight any fire that may occur in Sanderson.

The truck, which is painted in the regulation army color Khaki, will this week be given a new paint job and will be painted red.

Commissioners Set Valuations At Regular Meeting

At their regular meeting held on Monday of this week Terrell County's Commissioners set the tax rate for this year at \$2.22 on the one hundred dollar valuation. Of this rate seventy-two cents is the county ad valorem rate on the \$100 valuation and the school tax rate was set at \$1.50 on the \$100 valuation, with thirty-two cents of this rate going toward the bond indebtedness and the balance for the maintenance of the school.

The State has set the rate this year at 37 cents on the \$100 valuation, the lowest that it has been in some years.

UVALDE LEADER NEWS—\$230,000 of bonds for a three-project city-wide improvement were approved by a majority vote in an election held last Saturday, August 3.

Also approved by the city voters was the annexation of the Ansley Addition within the city limits. The Ansley addition is in the southwest section of Uvalde adjacent to the Crystal City highway.

The bond program will provide funds for re-topping paved streets, paving all gravel streets, elimination of culverts, extension of the sewerage system wherever possible, and enable the City of Uvalde to completely own all the buildings, land and other improvements at Garner Field.

H. J. R. No. 10 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of

the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

H. J. R. No. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for

the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicles registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the

State of Texas is hereby declared to issue the necessary proclamation for said election to have same published as required by the Constitution Amendments thereto.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of building on the campus of college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary to exceed Seventy-five thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Section 4. The sum of Fifty thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such public election.

Record Shows Shivers Opposes Additional Taxes

AUSTIN, TEXAS—"I want the people of Texas to know there are certain types of taxes to which I am opposed, both personally and as shown by my record of 12 years in the senate," Allan Shivers, who led his runoff opponent in the lieutenant governor's race by approximately 100,000 votes in the first primary, said here this week.

"I oppose a general sales tax and always have, because I feel that it would place undue burdens on the people. I oppose a state income tax, because that field is pre-empted by the Federal government."

"If any additional taxes do become necessary, and I don't think they will in the near future, the burden should be spread on as broad a tax paying base as is possible," he continued.

"I have always considered myself a conservative, both in expenditures and in taxation, and on many occasions have opposed appropriations of the taxpayers money because I thought the expenditures was unwise and unnecessary. I have also opposed many tax bills because I thought they were levied on the wrong principle or that they were unnecessary."

"I have had to work hard all my life and that is probably the reason that I am conservative about the expenditure of tax money. I feel the same way about expending my own funds."

Annual Antelope Hunting Dates Are Set By Commission

Plans have been completed for another antelope hunt this year in the Trans-Pecos country of Texas.

The State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission scheduled hunting dates as follows: Brewster, Reeves, Pecos, counties, October 1, 2 and 3; Presidio and Jeff Davis counties, October 5, 6 and 7; Hudspeth and Culberson counties, October 9, 10 and 11.

The bag limit will be one buck antelope.

In 1944 and 1945, the commission authorized the issuance of up to 500 and 529 antelope permits, respectively. In 1944 402 permits were issued, and in 1945 permits issued were 424. The 1946 counts have not been completed, but a total of 422 places have been found.

The deadline for applications in the Austin office is September 1.

Each participating landowner is authorized to assign 20 per cent of the permits for his ranch to anyone he wishes. He is also authorized to charge not more than \$40 for each hunter assigned to his ranch. This arrangement is to provide some recompense for livestock forage consumed by antelopes on the range.

Recovering From Injuries Received In Train Collision

According to reports from Del Rio, George Strothers and C. T. Davis are making satisfactory recovery from injuries received early Monday morning.

Neither suffered serious injuries, nor broken bones, a report from the hospital said. Both men were reported to have jumped before the collision.

HEALTH NOTES—

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 15.—In discussing the possible danger of inflation to the American way of life, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has declared that he believes one phase of this menace which should not be overlooked is the danger of inflation in the incidence of disease.

"Just because we have won a war is no reason why we should allow the disease and death rates in the country to become higher than in recent peacetimes," Dr. Cox said. "Indeed, it is an urgent reason why we should sharply reduce these rates among our people and use every effort to keep the health levels among our civilian and military population at their highest possible peak."

The State Health Officer emphasized once again, as he has often done in the past, the necessity for using the more acceptable, common-sense safeguards of health. Immunization against several of the more killing diseases is available to all at little or no cost. Such protection should not be neglected and the person who allows himself or his family to suffer from a preventable illness, whether he realizes it or not, actually handicapping the nation's reconversion effort. Another health precaution which can and should be practiced in every home and community is careful sanitation; clean clothes, clean body, and clean home environments do much to prevent the appearance of illness in the home and the same sanitation practiced throughout the community will help to insure the good health of that community.

"Good, wholesome, nourishing foods, home and community sanitation, and the protection afforded by immunization can do a lot to prevent the needless inflation of the disease and death rates in this country," Dr. Cox asserted.

H. J. R. No. 62 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be

prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board for the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on

their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
