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## Range Conditions Still Fair Over Most of State

COLLEGE STATION, August 23—Range feed is dry and curving over most of Texas, but is still supplying fair to good grazing in most areas.

Only by drawing upon reserve subsoil moisture has much of the state escaped serious drouth, according to a report received by the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service from the Bureau of Agricultural Economics at Austin.

A serious range condition exists in the Southern Plains and Northern counties where moisture has been short all season, the report indicated, and range feed is critically short. Soaking rains are now urgently needed in the entire western half of the state to revive grass growth.

In upper coastal and some eastern counties, July rainfall was sufficient and ranges in those areas are still supplying good grazing.

For an over-all picture of grazing in the state, the report showed that all range food is at 76 per cent of normal condition.

Due to favorable market prices and dry ranges, marketing of cattle and calves has been unusually heavy during the past month. In dry areas, cattle are losing some flesh. Sheep and goats are holding up well in most areas, except in the very dry Northern Plateau counties. Ranchers may market lambs early unless good rains start new grass soon, the report indicated.

## College of Mines To Install Lights For Night Football

EL PASO, Aug. 25—Heralding the return of the Texas College of Mines to the intercollegiate football wars is the installation of a \$28,000 lighting system to illuminate the Miners' Kidd Field for night play.

Despite present shortages, College of Mines officials have obtained materials to install a lighting system which will be on par or better than any in the country.

Six steel towers 18 inches in diameter are now being installed. Each tower will be equipped with 24 Crouse-Hinds narrow beam floodlights with clear lens and cross-arm base, each using a 1500-watt bulb.

When completed, the engineer says the new unit will generate 45 foot candle power on the playing field. Experts say that is approximately twice the candle power of night stadiums previous to the war.

Number two big improvement slated for the home of the Miners' El Paso gridiron battles will be the installation of 3000 new seats by the City of El Paso, pushing the total seating capacity for Kidd Field to 15,000.

With good prospects for a strong team and a fancy schedule of seven home tilts, night games are expected to be just "what the doctor ordered" to enable the maximum number of football fans in El Paso and vicinity to see the Muckers in action this fall.

## Baylor University Gets Library Gift

WACO, Aug. 23—Baylor University has received the personal library of the late Dr. J. B. Tidwell, long-time head of the Bible department at Baylor, as a gift of Mrs. Tidwell, President Pat M. Neff revealed this week.

The collection consists of more than a thousand volumes, principally in the fields of religion and biography, and many thousands of pages of manuscripts of Dr. Tidwell's speeches and books.

## Navy Seeks Vets To Travel With Recruiting Units

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 23—Authorization to recall Navy veterans now in inactive reserve for duty in Naval Reserve travelling recruiting units in each of the eight states of the Eighth District has been issued by Capt. Arthur A. Ageton, USN, district director of Naval Reserve.

The recruiting units, to consist of one officer of the rank of Lt. (jg) or about and four enlisted men, will tour their states to enlist naval reservists for the 46 Naval Reserve units now being activated in the district, Capt. Ageton said. ## Announce Plans For School Bus Operator Schools

AUSTIN, Aug. 23—Dr. L. W. Woods, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, announced plans today for school bus operators schools to be conducted under the supervision of county school superintendents.

These training institutes are optional one or two day programs and will include discussion of the authority and responsibility in transportation of students, qualifications of school bus operators, care and maintenance of school bus and discipline of students on the bus.

These institutes are to be a joint project of the State Department of Education, the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Safety Association.

"No person in our school system has a more responsible position than our school bus drivers," Dr. Woods stated in announcing the program. "The fact that 6,100 school bus drivers transport daily to and from school more than one-third of the school children of Texas and the fact that last year eleven children were killed as a result of school bus accidents offer a serious challenge to us to do everything possible to upgrade the driving ability of each of these drivers," he said.

Similar institutes were attended by 5,500 school bus drivers last year. It is hoped by leaders of the program that the county school superintendents will schedule institutes this year so that one hundred per cent attendance will be had.

Plans call for completion of institutes not later than October 15.

## Meteorite Recovered From Swimming Pool Near Marathon

Fragments of a meteorite which fell in a swimming pool at the Forker and Catto ranch southeast of Marathon about 1:15 p. m., last Friday have been recovered, it was learned yesterday. A Mexican employe saw the meteorite fall into the pool near the house and later the pool was drained and a fragment weighing 29 lbs. and a few smaller pieces were found.

H. H. Morse and Oscar E. Monnig of Texas Observers, Fort Worth, were notified of the meteorite and came to investigate. They had a boy dive for the meteorite and he came up with the main part of the mass which weighed 104 lbs., making a total of around 140 lbs. of the meteorite recovered.

The two scientists are interested in finding persons who saw the meteor as it flashed across the sky, asking that any such person notify them at 1010 Morningside Drive, Fort Worth.

The men explained that a meteor is the flash seen in the sky while the meteorite is the rock itself. They plan to publish a paper on the meteorite later it was stated.—Alpine Avalanche.

## Veterans Urged To Check Eligibility To Purchase Sugar

Veterans are urged by Cal C. Straughan, sugar rationing officer of the San Antonio district Office of Price Administration, to make inquiries at the sugar rationing office, 508 Transit Tower, San Antonio, Texas, before entering into the manufacture of fountain syrups, carbonated drinks, are any other sugar-containing products.

Many veterans purchase equipment for the manufacture of fountain syrups and other sugar-containing products, only to find that they are not eligible, in some cases, for sugar.

Straughan explained further, that in order to get sugar for bottling soft drinks, a veteran must own 51 per cent of the business. The sugar rationing office has from five to twenty calls a day from veterans who have gone into the bottling business as a "partner" without realizing the various eligibility in connection with the manufacture of sugar-containing products.

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GOVERNMENT SPENDING AND YOUR DOLLAR

Of all the issues which will face the next Congress, none will be more important than that of a balanced budget.

In depression times, the advocates of free spending enthusiastically backed the John Maynard Keynes theory, which, to put it simply, is that government must go in the red and prime the pump when conditions are bad.

A sound fiscal policy now must have three progressive phases. First, the budget must be balanced. Second, there must be an orderly program for reducing and eventually liquidating the public debt.

This is a long-term program. Its results will only be apparent over decades. But it must be the backbone of any fiscal policy which will spare us from government-induced inflation.

THE PROBLEM OF MEDICAL CARE

The problem of extending and improving medical care for the American people breaks down into two phases. First, we must avoid the ruinous mistake of subjecting the doctor to political dictation which would destroy much of his initiative.

The pending Murray-Wagner-Dingell health bill fails on both these counts. It would create an enormous bureaucracy with sweeping, centralized powers over doctors, clinics and hospitals.

The best solution thus far offered for the medical care problem is the voluntary group medicine plan, under which families, in effect, insure themselves against sickness.

In addition, rural areas, of their own volition, are experimenting with other ideas. One of such efforts, progress is made.

IT'S THE LAW

There is one almost absurdly simple way in which Texas could reduce the annual traffic accident toll of dead and injured, and that is to observe the now archaic admonition of the old railroad crossing sign: "STOP, LOOK, LISTEN."

The most important third of that advice is "STOP," since every driver with normal vision and hearing presumably looks and listens as he drives.

That unfortunate habit of the truckers probably explains the Rio Grande Valley, in which persons riding in trucks have been killed or injured.

The grade-crossing stop law should be enforced. It should be enforced by local and State authorities and by the owners of trucks and truck lines.

Remember, the crossing sign's warning applies to the man on the road, not to the engineer in the locomotive.

H. J. R. No. 10 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided for the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of

the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

H. J. R. No. 49 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for

the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the publication of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicles registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

State of Texas is hereby called to issue the necessary proclamation for said election to have same published as required by the Constitution Amendments thereto.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seven Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction building on the campus of college pursuant to the authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary to exceed Seventy-five thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, A. D. 1946, at which ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING STRUCTURED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Fifty thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, so much thereof as may be necessary, if hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such public election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State: (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for

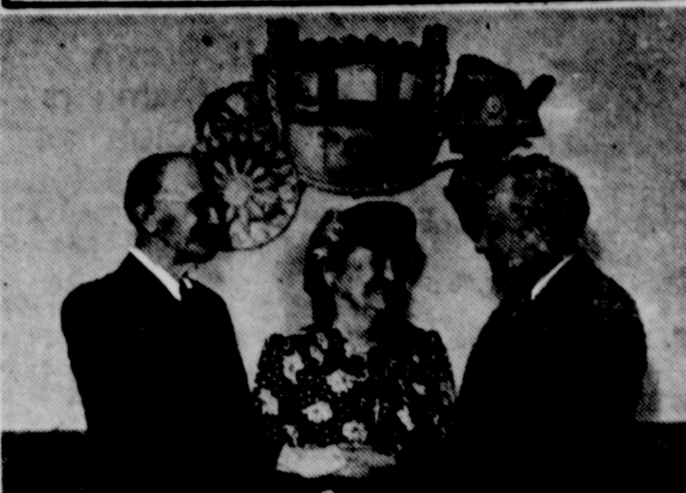

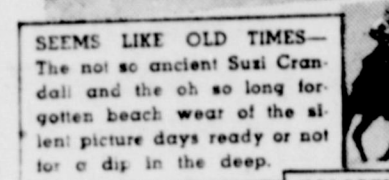

a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so

much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### HEALTH NOTES—

Austin, Texas, Aug. 8—Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span, nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are annually causing a decreasing number of deaths in this country, diabetes is still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group," Dr. Cox said.

"Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major problem, but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed."

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupations call for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.
