A large delegation of citizens from points long the route of Highway 87 will visit Chihuahua City, Mexico, next week-end on a long planned international tour planned by the Highway 87-Big Bend Trail Association to promote goodwill between the two republics and to further interest in construction of a modern highway linking the Texas border at Presidio-Ojinaga with Chihuahua City and other Mexican points.

The Pecos County Chamber of Commerce has handled reservations for forty-three Pecos County citizens who plan to make the trip by driving to Presidio Saturday morning and boarding the special train there.—Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

The long-awaited, new \$157,000 Maverick County Memorial Hospital, in Eagle Pass' Fort Duncan Park, will definitely open November 1, its board of managers has announced—though on a somewhat limited basis.

The hospital will be open to the general public October 31 all day, Mrs. W. A. Hewatt, chairman of the directorial board, announced. The board extends a cordial invitation to all who are interested, to visit and inspect the completely modern, Spanish-style, L-shaped structure, with all its equipment received to date.

Mrs. Doris M. Ryman, trained nurse, is superintendent of the new hospital, dedicated to local war dead, which will serve all the citizenry of Maverick County.—International News Guide.

A Tuesday telegram to the Chamber of Commerce gave information that Marfa Army Air Field and auxiliary fields had been declared surplus by the War Department.

Several weeks ago the Air Corps announced that it was in excess to the needs of that branch. It is expected that the war assets Administration soon will offer for sale the physical property of the military installation.—Big Bend Sentinel.

The Alpine FFA chapter was one of the two Texas chapters to win the Gold Emblem award, highest honor in the nation, at the FFA National Victory convention held at Kansas City this week, it was announced Wednesday.

Alpine and Jasper chapters were the two Texas units win-

ning the coveted award, they being two of the 16 in the nation so honored.

Two members of the Alpine FFA chapter were also awarded the coveted American Farmer degree for the year 1946 at the convention. They were Keesey Kemball and Joe Lane. They were selected from more than 200,000 VA students in the United States and were among the 178 so honored in the nation.

Only 19 Texas boys won the honor this year.—Alpine Avianche.

The show is being put on through the co-operation of the Santa Anna Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce. The location of the Schleicher County Memorial Park has been chosen, in what it is hoped will be the first step in actual construction of building and surrounding recreational facilities.

The commissioners have decided that because there is sufficient room on the courthouse grounds for the recreational center, it would be a waste of tax payers' money to buy additional land. The site will be at the east of the courthouse building, and will extend to the street, eliminating the fence and including the unused strip between the fence and the city street.

The Commissioners have on hand a tentative plan, which includes an H-shaped building for general community use and such recreational facilities as swimming pool, wading pool, dressing rooms, concession booths, tennis courts, slides, swings, cement walks, etc. To provide living quarters for the manager of the project, an apartment will be included somewhere in the general plans.—Eldorado Success.

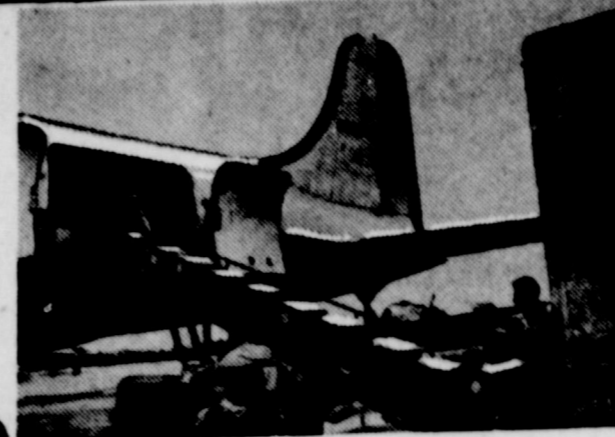

HEALTH NOTES—

AUSTIN, Oct. 32.—Inasmuch as the incidence of whooping cough in Texas is expected to show an increase during the coming months, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, released a statement today urging that strenuous efforts be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease.

Whooping cough can only be contracted by direct exposure to the disease, and isolation of cases must be universally practiced if the incidence is to be controlled, "Dr. Cox stated.

"The infectious agent of germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," Dr. Cox said. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous to susceptible persons; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious."

The first sign of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists day and night and tends to become increasingly severe. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Cox stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school or come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.

"Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum. Dr. Cox asserted, and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so, and allowing the young child to suffer an attack of this disease, may seriously impair his future health."

## Europe Still Needs American Food

New York, N. Y.—"Europe's population still suffers from the aftermath of years of war and hunger," Mrs. William N. Haskell, wife of Lt. General William N. Haskell, Executive Director of CARE, reported during an interview at CARE headquarters in New York. She added that the prohibitive prices of food in the black market were placing it beyond the reach of the great majority of people there.

Mrs. Haskell has just returned from Europe, where she accompanied General Haskell on his recent food-inspection trip.

Describing the assemblage of people who were gathered to receive the U. S. Government's Medal of Freedom, Mrs. Haskell said that they had two unmistakable things in common. Their heroism, of course. And a look of hunger. But their fierce pride asked for no sympathy, she added.

"Even the children in the parade that followed huddled together in the light summer rain that had started," Mrs. Haskell said. "It was as if their stringy little bodies found the dampness

Mrs. Haskell told of one Sunday afternoon when she and the General attended an impressive ceremony in Chartres, where a street was being named for General George Patton. The citizens of Chartres all regard General Patton as their personal liberator, Mrs. Haskell explained, because it was his men who arrived in time to save the town from the Nazis.

"The stirring singing of the 'Te Deum' by the townspeople, and the official christening of the street in General Patton's honor, was followed by still another ceremony," Mrs. Haskell said. "This was to honor the citizens of Chartres, who had risked their

lives after too many years of war and meagre rationing." "And conditions in other European areas are even worse," she said, urging Americans sending food to friends and relatives, not to forget others, "whose need made them a special kind of friend."

CARE, the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe, Inc., is the non-profit, government-approved organization through which Americans can send food packages containing 29 pounds of balanced food to people in 11 European countries. Headquarters of the organization is 50 Broad Street, New York 4, N. Y.

### March of Dimes Director Named



D. Wilson, of Houston, has been named Texas State Chairman of the 1947 March of Dimes. Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, has announced.

A prominent civil and religious leader, Mr. Wilson was formerly president of both the Board of Trustees of Houston University and the Board of Education of Houston's Public Schools. He is vice chairman of the Harris-County Chapter of the American Red Cross and is one of the Houston chairmen of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Mr. O'Connor, in making known Mr. Wilson's acceptance of the chairmanship, revealed that in coping with the 1946 outbreaks of infantile paralysis the National Foundation sent to its chapters in the field more than two and a half million dollars in epidemic aid up through September.

"Many of this year's polio patients," Mr. O'Connor said, "will require hospitalization and care for a long period of time. The after-care of these patients will be more expensive than treatment in the acute stage of the disease. The high cost of epidemics points up the real need for the services of public-spirited men such as Mr. Wilson. His efforts will prove of great value in the forthcoming appeal."

Mr. Wilson is also Chairman of the Harris County Chapter of the National Foundation and was formerly County Chairman of the 1945 and 1946 March of Dimes.

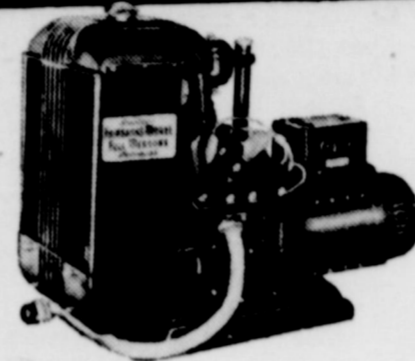
