Eligible ranchers are those who are participating in the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program, and this includes both lesees and lessors, provided both earn a payment; however, a landlord (lessor) is not entitled to a vote unless he actually earns

a payment. Because of the community property laws in the State of Texas, the wife may vote if the husband is eligible whether he be the lessee or the lessor.



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
