Christmas Seals Are Mailed Here First of Week

Residents of Terrell county with millions of others throughout the United States, received in their mail the first of the week, sheets of 1946 Christmas Seals. The Seals will bear greeting from the local Parent - Teachers Association, sponsors of the Seal sales, and a reminder that the continued work of the association in fighting tuberculosis in this area depends upon the use local residents make of the Seals.

This will be the 40th annual sale of Christmas Seals in this country and, according to Mrs. G. D. Vincent, chairman of the Health committee and, according to Mrs. G. D. Vincent, chairman of the Health committee of the P. T. A., 2900 associations will conduct Seal Sales this year to raise funds for local and state tuberculosis control programs.

Back in 1907 when the first Seal Sale was held in the United States, it was confined to an area around Wilmington, Del., and Philadelphia. The next year it was conducted on a national scale.

The 1946 Seal shows a lamp-lighter his lamp against a starry blue sky and is symbolic of the returning hope of the world after the dark years of war. To commemorate the 40th annual sale, each sheet of Seals has a center insert of four special Seals bearing the likeness of one woman and three men who made outstanding contributions to the first Seal Sale in 1907.

They were Jacob Riis, Danish-born American who has been called "one of America's most useful citizen"; Miss Emily P. Bissell, social worker of Wilmington, Del.; E. A. Van Valkenburg, newspaper publisher and editor, and Leigh Mitchell Hodges, newspaper, newspaper columnist.

The designer of the 1946 Seal is Lloyd Coe, a former teacher at the Metropolitan Art School, New York, and at present an instructor at the artist and as an illustrator. Coe drew the Seal from an idea suggested by Miss Mary Louise Estes, executive secretary of the Duval County Tuberculosis Association, Florida.

The polls will be opened all day, December 11 at the County Court House. Ranchers may go to the polls on that day and vote or any day prior to the election day if they so desire.

If the members who have been nominated are not the choice of the one who is voting, he may write in the name of some other person who he wishes to serve on the committee.

There are approximately 75 ranchers in Terrell county who are eligible to vote in the election this year and all are urged to go and vote. Eligible ranchers are those who are participating in the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program, and this includes both lessees and lessors, provided both earn a payment; however, a landlord (lessor) is not entitled to a vote unless he actually earns a payment.

Because of the community property laws in the State of Texas, the wife may vote if the husband is eligible whether he be the lessee or the lessor.

A new Demonstration Agent for Schleicher County may be secured by the first of the year, according to Judge C. L. Meador, who states that there is a possibility of getting one by then, according to word received from College Station.

After experiencing a period of inactivity, the mohair market came back to life last week and the Ozona Wool and Mohair Co., disposed of the last of its fall accumulation from Crockett growers.

Sale of approximately 100,000 pounds of mohair at 59 cents for adult hair and 79 cents for kid hair, the same price as sales made earlier in the season, was reported this week by Melvin Brown, ware-house manager.

The hair went to Russell Martin, buyer for Collins and Aikman—Ozona Stockton.

Fall movement of cattle, in high gear in this area the past month, is approximately 90 per cent completed, local ranchmen estimated this week.

Most of the stock shipped out this fall, especially calves, was contracted earlier in the year

at an average price of around 14 1/2c for heifer calves and 15 1/2c for steer calves, it was stated.

October shipments billed out over the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads from here included 8165 mixed cattle, 1389 calves and 40,518 sheep, totaling approximately 50,000. This does not include movement by trucks.

Favorable weather has prevailed during most of the Fall shipping season and ranchmen have made good time in rounding up and getting their stock to the shipping pens.

Ranges in most parts of the area are said to be in good shape to carry stock through the winter despite the fact that rains were late this year in most localities—Alpine Avalanche.

HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 28.—Rheumatic heart disease is now the first cause of death among aged 10 to 14, and is second only to tuberculosis at ages 15 to 25. Despite the importance of this disease its epidemiology is not completely established. No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox, and whooping cough has yet been developed for its prevention or control. We do know, however, some of the danger signals and with the physician's accurate diagnosis some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented.

Exposure to frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows, or wrists. The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads it to the others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for

these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever.

According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once, and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.

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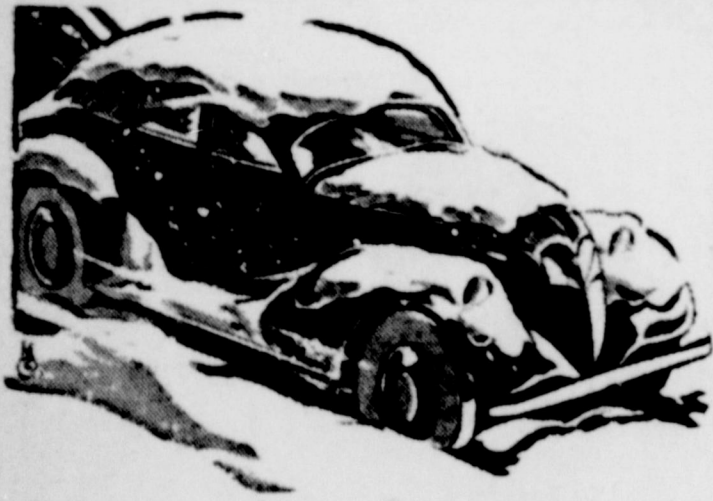
