### Warning Issued In Wearing Of U. S. Uniforms

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 12 .- A friendly warning was issued today to fadists who might be wearing portions of armed services uniforms without autho-

The law provides a heavy penalty for any person not an officer or enlisted man of the United States Army, Navy, Marie Corps, or Coast Guard who wears "a uniform any part of which is similar to a distinctive part of the duly prescribed uniform" of the military services, Eighth Naval District headquarters said.

Commenting on the recent fad among high school girls in New Orleans for wearing portions of uniforms brought back from service by friends and relatives, the district legal office quoted a section on "protection of the uniform" in the federal law governing military dress. It provides that convicted offenders "be punished by a fine not exceeding \$300, or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

The law allows for wearing of military uniforms by such organizations as the Boy Scouts, militia, and cadet corps, and by veterans on occasions of ceremony, Cdr. I. N Klein, USN, acting district Le-

Alert farmers are simplifying farm jobs, cutting chore time 15 to 50 percent. Five Indiana farmers, by carefully planning their work, are raising market hogs with one-quarter the average hours of labor. A Minnesota farmer rearranged his barn, adopted correct milking practices, saved 300 hours of work and 138 miles of walking a year. By rearranging his watering system, a poultry man saved 22 miles of walking a season. Some farmers are making hay in 90 man-minutes per ton.
