Chronology of Local Events of 1946

As we pause on the threshold of a New Year, we turn back, in memory and our thoughts are of the happenings during the year 1946, which is drawing to a close.

In so doing we chronologize the past year events as follows and as recorded each week in the Times.

Matched Goal Roping Held Last Saturday

A matched roping was held last Saturday afternoon at the Carl Cochran ranch 2 miles east of town.

Accepting a challenge that was made some time ago, Joe Moseley and Vick Newton, switchman for the T. & N. O., at Valentine roped against R. C. Bell and Jess Fisher, switchman of the T. & N. O. here. The purse was \$50 and was won by the Sanderson switchman with a total time of 522 2-5 seconds to 836 4-5 second by the Valentine ropers. Five goats a piece were roped.

There were several other matched roping during the afternoon.

In a matched roping of five goats each, held between Roy Cash of Langtry and Fogger Dunnagan of Dryden, Dunnagan won the match with a total time of 126.5 seconds to 154.2 seconds made by Cash.

Roping three goats each Jess Fisher and Buster Babb was in a contest with Babb winning. His total time was 52.1 seconds to Fisher 64.1 seconds.

In a match roping between Dick Hamilton and Buster Babb, each roping one goat, Babb made no time while Hamilton's time was 17.

There will be a return match between the Valentine switchman and the Sanderson switchman with the time and place to be announced later.

Line Change Is Made Past Week By T. & N. O. RR.

Completion of the new road bed and laying of rails by the T. & N. O. Railroad was made last Saturday and the first train passed over the new track that afternoon. The line change over was in the vicinity of Pumpville.

A railroad siding has been named Shaw Siding in honor of Simon Shaw, 88, a retired railroad section foreman, and who is the father of Simon Shaw Jr., section foreman at Dryden, and George Shaw T. & N. O. conductor who is well known and lives in Del Rio.

The announcement of the new siding, which has been completed, will eliminate two miles between Sanderson and Del Rio on the T. & N. O. Railroad.

Simon Shaw, who lives in San Antonio at 243 Porter St., with his daughter, Mrs. Annie Cissna, has had a varied career. He started when a young man, to work for Luther Burbank, famous naturalist, who has a town in California, a potato and many flowers named after him. He left Burbank to join the San Francisco police force.

In 1882 Shaw accepted the position of section foreman with the Southern Pacific Railroad. The railroad was building from San Francisco east to connect with the G. H. & S. A., building west. He was at the ceremony when the lines met near Del Rio, or 425 miles east of El Paso.

Since his retirement in 1921, Shaw has spent the last 25 years grafting trees and working in his garden.

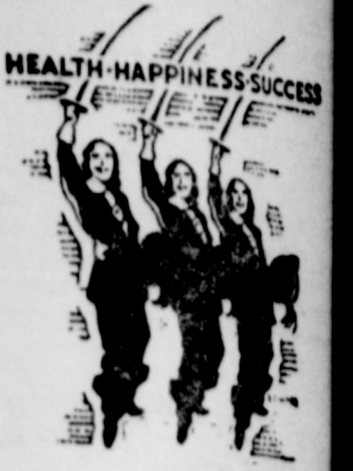

Veterans' News

In order to afford veterans all possible protection against over-priced properties in the current high market, the Veterans Administration announced that effective January 2, 1947, VA, and not the lender, will pick the appraiser to evaluate "reasonable value" for purposes of G. I. loans.

Under the revised procedure, VA will designate by name the person to appraise each piece of property offered for sale to veterans under the guaranty loan provisions of the G. I. Bill.

This contrasts with the system in effect for the past 15 months, under which the lender was permitted to select any appraiser he desired from a panel of local appraisers whose general qualifications had been reviewed and approved by VA.

The revised procedure, VA said, will eliminate the tendency on the part of some lenders to use exclusively the services of "obliging" appraisers who are amenable to turning in a high appraisal where necessary to meet the asking price.

As of November 30, more than 31,000 G. I. loans had been approved in VA's Dallas Branch Area of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. These loans amounted to \$164,900,315, of which VA guaranteed \$78,072,915.

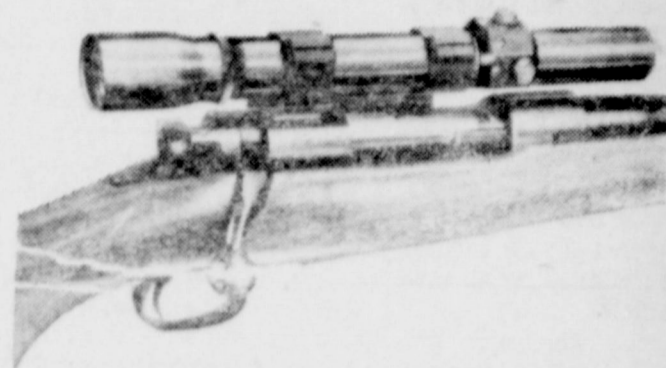

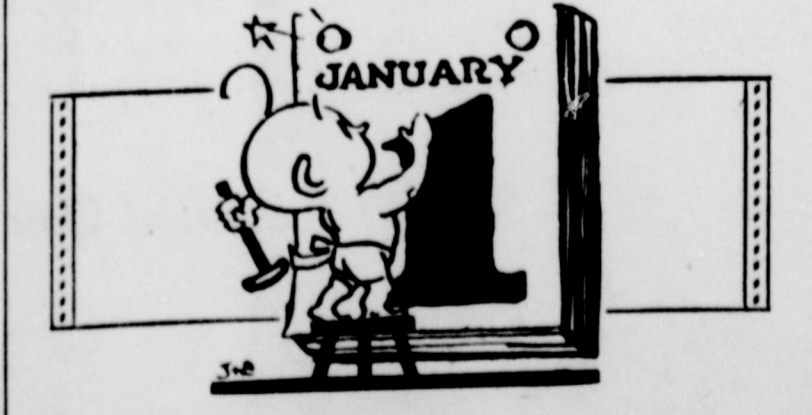

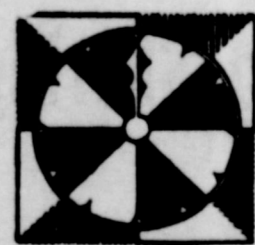
