Texas Safety Ass'n Urges Six-Point Traffic Control

AUSTIN, January 12—On the eve of the 50th legislature, the Texas Safety Association today addressed an open letter to legislators calling for passage of a six-point traffic control program for Texas streets and highways.

The letter, signed by A. F. Allen, Dallas, president of the association, was concurred in by 58 Texas organizations which had ratified the proposed legislation as a "must" for a safer Texas.

The action came on the heels of an announcement by the Texas Department of Public Safety that the 1946 traffic fatality toll likely would exceed 2,000 deaths. The association said that more than 50,000 persons had suffered personal

injuries with an economic loss to Texas approximately 100 million dollars last year.

The six point program, developed through a series of state conferences by traffic authorities and patterned after recommendations of President Truman's Highway Safety Conference, calls for enactment of the following:

1. An increase of 200 additional men for the Texas Highway Patrol to bring total strength up to 450 men (Texas now ranks 39th in numerical strength).
2. Adoption of Model Traffic Code for uniform traffic regulations.
3. Broader authority for traffic courts in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and Fort Worth to try drunk driving, hit-and-run, and juvenile traffic cases.
4. Restriction of driver license fees to administration of Driver License Law and for operation of Texas Highway Patrol.
5. Controlled Access Highway

Law.

6. Adequate appropriations for program of driver education and training courses in schools under administration of state education department.

"The answer to the favorite question 'Where is the money coming from?' is that the people of Texas have made, and are making, regular and heavy deposits in the state's bank account for an efficient and safe modern transportation system," declared George Clarke, managing director.

"These deposits are in form of gasoline taxes, driver license fees, chauffeur and commercial operator license fees. Since 1941, the General Revenue Fund has accumulated \$1,700,000 in surplus revenue from driver license fees—despite the crying need for adequate appropriations to make the driver license law the effective enforcement arm it can, and should be, for the protection of law-abiding motorists.

"Surely the people of Texas have a right to draw upon that deposit rather than to see it used for some other purpose totally unrelated to traffic control.

"The total cost for operation of a Texas Highway Patrol in the strength of 450 men will approximate \$1,800,000 annually. Texas voted emphatically last November for adequate policing of its highways in approving the amendment for anti-diversion of the gasoline tax fund.

"The Texas Highway Commission has approved the recommendation of 200 more patrolmen which will be paid from that fund subject to legislative action.

"Aside from the humane necessity of preventing continued bloodshed and suffering, practical business sense demands action to stop an annual one hundred million dollar loss from traffic accidents.

Organizations backing the legislative program include the American Legion, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, the Texas Good Roads Association, The Texas Press Association, the Texas Newspaper Publishers Association, Texas Police Association, League of Texas Municipalities, Dallas Citizens Traffic Commission, Fort Worth Safety Council, Houston Traffic Safety Commission, San Antonio Safety Council, Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, regional chamber of commerce, Kiwanis Clubs of Texas, Rural Letter Carriers Association, Sheriff's Association of Texas, State Medical Association, Texas Highway Users Conference representing 25 Texas commercial and trade organizations, Outdoor Advertising Association, Texas Association of Insurance Agents, Texas Automobile Dealers Association.

HEALTH NOTES—

AUSTIN, Texas, January 23— "Carelessness and ignorance represent two of the most powerful factors in spreading communicable diseases from man to man. No more emphatic example of this fact exists than the continued ravages of tuberculosis. In spite of the knowledge of its cause and spread, and of curative methods, tuberculosis is still a very serious problem not only in Texas, but throughout the United States," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is true that tuberculosis no longer is first on the list of killing diseases, as it was formerly," Dr. Cox said, "but despite having been reduced to fifth place in Texas, it still is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease. And this fact exists even though the majority of tuberculosis patients could have their condition arrested if it were recognized early and proper treatment applied.

Treatment of the early recognized case is essential. It is of equal importance, from a public health viewpoint, that the spread of this devastating infection be prevented. A more intelligent appreciation of this fact would result in the saving of thousands of lives.

"When a diagnosis of active

tuberculosis has been made, examination of all of the other members of the immediate family should follow as a matter of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any special susceptibility to the disease, but because it is communicable, being usually transmitted through close and prolonged contact with the active case."

To reduce the number of deaths caused by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox suggests periodic examination of all duties, a check-up by physicians of the known active cases and contacts, regular examinations of high school children, isolation or hospitalization of the active tuberculosis case, and a more intelligent application of hygienic living principles.
